# The 2nd Greatest Love Story Ever Written

During the month of February, many people take deliberate time out to express their love for special persons in their lives, and to pay tribute to the commemoration that has been titled, "Black History Month." I had left this page blank as I mulled over which theme to highlight— Love or black history?

Valentine's Day cards, love songs, as well as our own imaginations and intellect seek to appropriately define what love is. However, in 1 Corinthians 13, love's true meaning is made plain. God inspires the Apostle Paul to tell us exactly what love is and exactly what love is not. As I examined Paul's breakdown of love, taking in both the depth and simplicity of its meaning, I also began to see some of the images that continue to form our great American story.

I considered a mother letting go of her daughter's tiny hand as she crossed *Bridges* of racism into an all white elementary school with an angry bigoted mob screaming hatred in her direction; I considered a former slave who became free and changed her name to represent the *Truth* about slavery that she would travel the land on foot to speak; I considered a group of *Tuskegee*-trained pilots who organized and flew with pride and precision during WWII, never returning to a hero's welcome, but rather to segregation and discrimination; I considered the Edmund Pettus Bridge in *Selma*, Alabama, the *Harlem* Renaissance, and the *Hidden Figures* within NASA. And I came to realize there was no need to choose between love or black history. The blood that was shed, the sacrifices that were made, the toil that was endured by black men, women, and children while our story was being formed, could not have been sustained without love.

Later in this newsletter, we will hear from a few St. Paul members as they shine light on a few attributes of love as written by the Apostle Paul. The attribute I chose to expand on is, "Love is not self-seeking." This means love has no concern for advancing its own welfare or its own interests before those of others. Love is not selfish.

During this month of February, I invite all of us to take time to thank God for the unselfishness of those who came before us, and for those who continue to put their own comforts aside for the advancement of our race. Let's celebrate black Americans whose deeds have embodied a love that reached far beyond what they themselves could gain. We reap the benefits of their unselfish love each and every day.

Black history just might be the 2nd greatest love story ever written.

#### Trustee's Tablet

First an update from the St. Paul Re-entry Committee. The Re-entry committee, lead by President Clarence Highsmith and Vice-President Trina Ridgley, oversees various details and procedures regarding safely getting people back into the church building. Some of these details include, how people will be screened; attendance and seating monitoring for the purpose of contact tracing; how to manage those who have been vaccinated vs those who have not; and how the church will continue to be sanitized. Pastor Adams, also part of this committee



reminds us that the position of the C.M.E. Church as a whole is that, "Mass gatherings are not advised or supported." "Until Covid leaves our world, this will probably be our world for a while," Pastor Adams added. In addition to the professional sanitizing completed within St. Paul, the church has also purchased its own sanitizing fogger for ongoing use. The church also has ownership of ample digital thermometers.

Important discussion continues about replacing the southern-most doors in the front of the church. "Because that entry will be the entry used for the newly established 501C3, those doors will be the business entry as well as the handicapped accessible entry," says Vice-President Trina Ridgley. "Therefore, the door frames, size, etc. must be in compliance with ADA regulations. Pictured above, this doorway is already equipped with a ramp. Frances Evins and circle leader, Francettia Worlds for keeping her legacy alive and keeping our children involved.

Liberty Station, a ward of the ME South Church since 1848, became known as the founding church. Our denomination now has con-

gregations in the majority of the United States, Jamaica, Haiti, and Africa. During these 150 years, the CME Church has been committed to sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ, witnessing to the love of God and being an influence and contributor to communities large and small. 1 Corinthians makes it quite clear! The pages following this, feature a few St. Paul members offering insight into a few of love's characteristics as spelled out in God's word.

#### 1 Corinthians

**13** If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. <sup>2</sup> If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. <sup>3</sup> If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast but do not have love, I gain nothing.

<sup>4</sup> Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. <sup>5</sup> It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. <sup>6</sup> Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. <sup>7</sup> It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

<sup>8</sup> Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. <sup>9</sup> For we know in part and we prophesy in part, <sup>10</sup> but when completeness comes, what is in part disappears. <sup>11</sup> When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me. <sup>12</sup> For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.

<sup>13</sup> And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

It is important that we make a conscious effort not to do such actions. 


#### **Love Never Fails**




#### St. Paul Star of The Month



# JOHN ROBERT LEWIS 1977-2020 A CONTINUOUS LIFE OF SERVICE

Last month's column ended with John Lewis' accomplishments up to 1977. In 1977 he accepted a position with the Carter (President Jimmy Carter) Administration as Associate Director of ACTION. He was responsible for running the VISTA program, the Retired Senior Volunteer Program and the Foster Grandparent Program.



In 1986 Lewis, in a run-off election between himself and Julian Bond, defeated Bond 52% to 48%. In the November General Election, Lewis defeated Porta Scott and became a member of the United States House of Representatives where he was reelected 16 times. He ran unopposed in 1996, 2004, 2006, 2008, 2014 and 2018.

Lewis was one of the most liberal Congressmen to have represented a District in the Deep South. He was called a hard-core liberal by some papers. The Washington Post described him as "a fiercely partisan Democrat but...also fiercely independent." The Atlanta Journal-Constitution stated Lewis was the "only former major civil rights leader who extended his fight for human rights and racial reconciliation to the halls of Congress." Many U.S. Senators and congressional aids called him the "conscious of Congress."

Lewis spoke out in support of gay rights and national health insurance. He opposed the Gulf War in 1991 as well as many other acts of military intervention in foreign countries. He fiercely opposed the Iraq War and suggested impeaching President George W. Bush for "deliberately, systematically violating the law."

Lewis made an annual pilgrimage to Alabama to retrace the route he marched in 1965 from Selma to Montgomery – a route Lewis worked to make part of the Historic National Trails Program.

Lewis strongly disagreed with the movement for Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) against Israel and co-sponsored a resolution condemning the Pro-Palestinian BDS.

In 2001 Lewis boycotted George W. Bush inauguration because he did not believe Bush was the true elected President.

In 2003 Lewis spoke at an anti-war protest before the start of the Iraq War to a crowd of 30,000 people. He was arrested in 2006 and 2009 for protesting against the genocide in Darfur. He was also arrested during a sit-in near the west side of the U.S. Capital Building advocating for immigration reform.

In 2008 after first endorsing Hillary Clinton for President, he formally changed his support and endorsed Barack Obama.

When Barack Obama clinched the Democratic nomination for President, Lewis stated "if someone had told me this would be happening now, I would have told them they were crazy, out of their mind, they didn't know what they were talking about...I just wish the others were around to see this day...To the people who were beaten, put in jail, were asked questions they could never answer to register to vote, it's amazing."



John Lewis continued...

On an African-American being elected President, Lewis stated "if you ask me whether the election...is the fulfillment of Dr. King's dream, I say, 'no it's just a down payment.' There's still too many people 50 years later, there's still too many people that are being left out and left behind."

President Obama, upon being elected signed a commemorative photograph of the event. It read, "Because of you, John. Barack Obama."

In 2016 Lewis led a group of House Representatives in a sit-in in demanding House Speaker Paul Ryan allow a vote on gun-safety legislation.

In 1988, the year Lewis was sworn into Congress, he introduced a Bill to create a National African-American Museum in Washington. It failed, but he continued to introduce the Bill every year for 15 years. In 2003 he finally won bi-partisan support and President Bush signed the Bill to establish the Museum. The National Museum of African-American History and Culture opened September 25, 2016.

In 2016 Lewis compared Donald Trump to former Governor George Wallace. (Please read his remarks on Wikipedia.org)

In 2017 Lewis stated he did not see President-Elect Trump as a legitimate President (Please see his remarks on Wikipedia.org)

Lewis did not attend Trump's inauguration.

In 2020 Lewis endorsed Joe Biden for President. Lewis recommended that Biden pick a woman of color as his running mate.

On July 17, 2020, Lewis died at the age of 80 after a six month battle with pancreatic cancer.

Public ceremonies honoring his life began in his hometown of Troy, Alabama at Troy University, which had denied him admission in 1957 due to racial segregation.

Lewis lied in state in the United States Capitol Rotunda on July 27-28, 2020. He is the first African-American to be so honored in the Rotunda. Presidents Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Barack Obama spoke at his funeral. President Jimmy Carter sent a statement to be read at the service. Donald Trump did not attend.
