Dear members of the OLSH community,

As the Governor's School of Excellence in New Ireland, OLSH International is in a privileged position to strive every day to provide an excellent education to the students entrusted to our care. We are deeply grateful to Governor Right Honourable Sir Julius Chan and the New Ireland Provincial Government for providing OLSH with 2 large solar-powered security lighting panels at a substantial cost of K20, 000.00. This facility will greatly enhance the security arrangements at OLSH.

Year 6-7 Transition Programme 2020

Although OLSH is a P-12 school on one campus, there are substantial differences between primary and secondary school: subjects and teacher expectations of students. This year we are introducing a 6-7 Transition day for the Grade 6 students on Friday 20 November. They will spend a full day attending Year 7 classes in 2 groups from Morning PC class to the end of lunchtime and have lunch with the Year 7s. For 2021, a strategic programme across all four terms has been designed in consultation with both Heads of School to give Grade 6 students an in-depth appreciation of Year 7 and secondary learning. READING FOR THE WEEK: Mathew 25:1-13
