
Adult Bible Class Starts Soon!

Stanza of the Month



I Know that My Redeemer Lives (LBW #352, v. 1)

With September we return to using the *Lutheran Book of Worship* for our worship time together. Personally, the *With One Voice* is OK, and some of the tunes somewhat novel, but I like returning to the comfortable familiarity and dependability of the tried-and-true texts and tunes of the LBW!

That notion of the <u>comfort</u> that is found in what is "tried and true" is summed up in that first verse of the hymn, *I Know that My Redeemer Lives*:

I know that my Redeemer lives! What comfort this sweet sentence gives! He lives, he lives, who once was dead; He lives, my ever-living head!

Job makes note of that comfort in the wake of a multitude of woes that have befallen him:

²⁵ For I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last he will stand upon the earth.^[b]
²⁶ And after my skin has been thus destroyed, yet in^[c] my flesh I shall see God,

Job describes a paradox: he proclaims that even after his flesh has decayed, it will be with physical eyes that he will at some future time see God. That reality is declared again by Christ Jesus in John 6:57 when Jesus says, "As the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever feeds on me, he also will live because of me." The underlying assumption is that because He lives, we live.

The comforting promise is "fleshed out" for us in the Apostle Paul's letter to the Romans in chapter 6: "...*just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his.*"

So comforting is this promise that both of these texts are incorporated into the funeral and committal services of the Lutheran church!



Council Meeting Minutes

MIC Council

August 16, 2022

The Mission in Christ Council met on Tuesday, August 16, 2022 at 6:00 pm. Those present were Vice President Doug Puffett, Pastor Burkhalter, Chris Schlee and Terri Gould. President Bill Green, and Michelle Borrett were unable to attend.

Doug called the meeting to order. Chris led a devotion entitled Keep Sowing Seeds, encouraging us to not grow weary in doing even though we do not always witness a harvest right away.

Terri then read the minutes of the last meeting. There were no additions or corrections so Doug declared the minutes approved.

The treasurer's report for July was then reviewed. At the end of July, the checking account balance was \$5,855.97. The offering total was \$5,905.97. Of that, \$50.00 was designated for the Building Fund. This left \$5,855.97 going to the General Fund. The expenses for the month totaled \$8,146.65. There was a question as to why the expenses were more than usual. It was noted that \$1,358.73 had been paid out for benevolence and \$625 in memorial money had been transferred to savings making the expenses appear larger. Chris moved and Pastor seconded a motion to approve the financial report. Motion carried.

The Worship Team had no official report. Pastor pointed out that he had been working on Service of the Word for the Sundays he will be on vacation. Doug suggested Noah be trained for the sound board duties from time to time. A question arose concerning why we are still not passing a plate for offering. The worship team will discuss these items.

Pastor then gave his report. He had three visitations in July. For joys and concerns he reported presiding at a memorial service for Kari Sullivan at the funeral home. He suggested developing a policy for giving information to families who are choosing cremation and are not using the services of a funeral home. The processional cross is still scheduled to ship August 26. Sign up for the new Bible study has been slow so far. We need to finalize plans for refreshments following Grief Support and our light meal before Bible study. Attendance in person and online is holding steady with in person increasing slightly. Pastor will be meeting with Pastor Ede August 22 to discuss moving forward. More promotion was discussed for Grief Support. Pastor will make half-sheet fliers to hand out. He will research making post cards which parishioners can mail to people. Upcoming events: August 27, IMD Convocation in Ruthven, Iowa; September 7, begin Confirmation; September 13, begin St. Croix grief support; September 16-26 Pastor vacation; October 2, Bible study class Divine Drama begins. Pastor commented he would need to cease doing Wednesday night Compline due to the Confirmation schedule.

There was no new business.

Old business began with Bill's written report on the fall dinner committee's decisions. The dinner will be promoted as the Fall Friendship Meal. Serving will begin at 5:30 PM. The tentative menu is hot ham or pulled pork sandwich, chili, one other soup TBD, potato chips and vanilla ice cream with toppings. Milk, coffee and water will be served for drinks. We will be inviting attendees to bring an item for the food shelf. Doug mentioned this could be partially paid for by Thrivent funds. We will ask Lois, who is a committee member, how to apply for this.

Other items under old business were covered in Pastor's report.

In other business, Chris reported we received the weed trimmer and it has already been utilized. Pastor reported finding a truck from Black Hills Energy on the premises one day. On inquiry he discovered that they had found a gas leak and fixed it.

Having no other business, the group decided to allow Bill to do next month's devotions.

Pastor then moved and Chris seconded a motion to adjourn at 6:53 pm. Motion carried.
