Last year's cleanup was held on October 27, 2018. The number of volunteers from Moline Boy Scout Pack 119 doubled in size, so we were able to direct some of the eager scouts in picking up trash along Big Island Parkway. The rest of the group removed invasive species and overgrown branches to keep the primitive trail leading to Lock 32 accessible for users and safe for mowing.

Handicapped Bridge

George Bellovics, Illinois Department of Natural Resources Landscape Architect and Kyle Goetz, Assistant Site Superintendent for the Hennepin Canal State Parkway (below) take measurements for the proposed Handicapped Bridge at Lock 31. Once clearance is received from the State, BISAWPA will apply for grants to fund the project. We are also looking into installation of a boat ramp in this area for small fishing boats and kayaks ... But that's down the road a-ways. (Or should we say canal?!!!)



Remove Weeds, Plant, Mulch - Repeat Yearly...

Not so fast! Soon our Pollinator Prairie Garden at Lock 31 will be self-sufficient and will do what a prairie does, according to Martha Smith, University of Illinois Extension Horticulture Educator. She has been overseeing our garden since it was planted in 2017.

After looking at the garden this summer Martha said, "It is basically doing what a prairie does. We've lost plants ... most

likely due from overly wet soils and there is some clover and unwanted grassy weeds that can be pulled." So... Martha and her crew from the Illinois Extension Office, Master Gardeners, and BISAWPA volunteers, on one very hot day, cleaned out the clover and unwanted grassy weeds, added some new plants, and a light layer of mulch.

The garden continues to thrive due to our caring volunteers and folks from the Illinois Extension Office.

Stop By and Sit a Spell

The memorial benches and engraved rock have been completed at Hennepin Canal Lock 31. Funds from the Julie A. Warn Hubbard Trust were used for this project. We think Julie would be pleased with this peaceful area to relax and enjoy the park, as she loved the natural habitats of Big Island.

We are also working with George Bellovics, Landscape Architect from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to apply for a grant to erect a handicapped bridge at Lock 31. This, in addition to the vault toilet being built by IDNR at Lock 31, will work towards completing Phase Two of our long-term goals.



One More for the History Books ... Congratulations, Chris!

In June 2018, cyclists Dan Libman of Oregon, IL and Carl Nelson from DeKalb, IL set out from the beginning of the Rock River Trail at the Horicon Marsh State Wildlife area in Theresa, Wisconsin and were the first to cycle 320 miles to the end of the trail at the historic confluence of the Rock River, Mississippi River and Hennepin Canal on Big Island. The two made the journey in five days.

In June 2019, Wisconsin kayaker Christopher Luedke took the challenge to paddle 320 miles of the Rock River Water Trail and finish in five days. He set the speed benchmark for fastest descent of the river. Here's how his finish went down as told by Dean Mathias, Big Island Soil & Water Preservation Association Vice President and Rock River Trail advocate...

"My wife, Deb, and I first spotted Chris at Green Valley Park in Moline and then met him further down the Rock River next to the 27th Street Bridge exit. Chris pulled out of the water while it was lightning and met up with his wife Megan and daughter Millie. He then headed to the Backwater Gamblers take out. There I told him it might be a good option to end the journey since it was after 6 pm and I wasn't sure about the condition of the portage for Lock



30 due to the recent flooding and there was fog on the water and thunder in the distance. [Dean may have underestimated the determination of someone who had already paddled more than 300 miles to get to the end of his journey.] Chris had the look of determination in his eyes. As luck would have it Carlos Barreto and his wife Shelley arrived soon after and put Chris back into the Rock River after a car portage around the Sears dam on Vandruff's

Island. Due to flooding at Lock 32, Chris made a beach landing instead at the west side of Sunset Park's Potter Lake where he was presented his 320-mile award."

Whether traveling by bicycle or kayak you'll need 5 days to get to Big Island. Who knows, the next person traversing the Rock River Trail may hike it—wouldn't that be something! Any takers?
