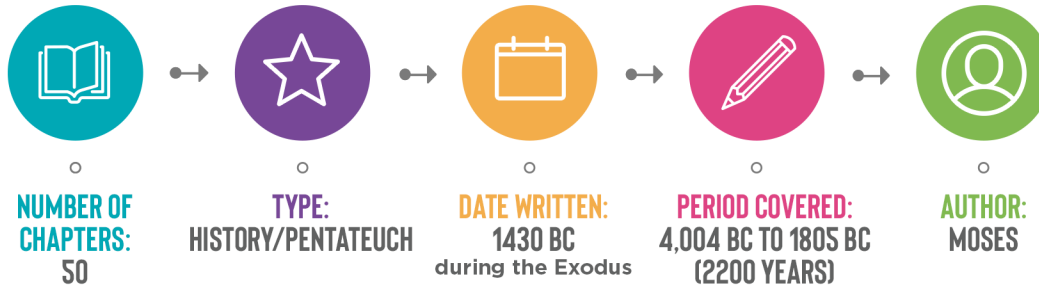

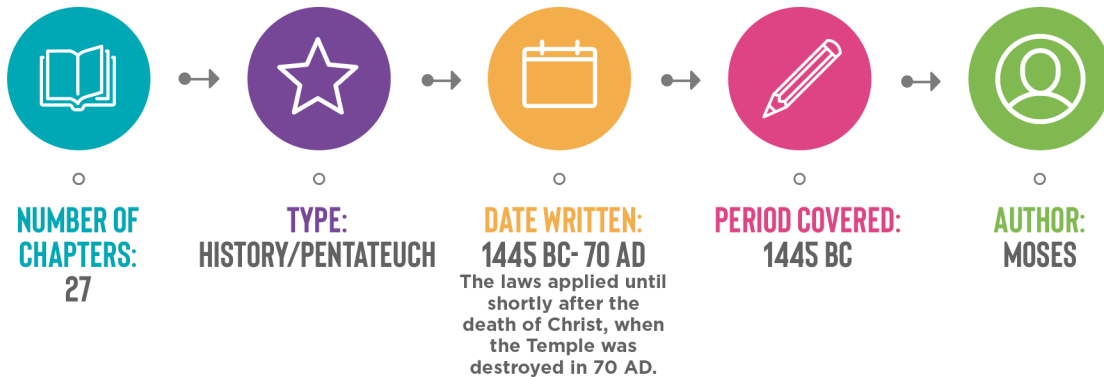

The reading can be quite engaging if the reader keeps in mind that the Hebrews were extremely accurate record keepers, both of numbers and of events. It is proof that they can be trusted to present an Old Testament that is reliable.

Deuteronomy contains speeches and instructions that may seem redundant to all spoken throughout the Pentateuch. However, it serves as a record to show how God and Moses strived to emphasize the need for loyalty and sticking to the law. The future of these people bears out how easy it was for them to stray and to reveal that neither God nor Moses was over-speaking. Numbers ended with Israel in Moab, where the Jordan River flows into the Dead Sea. The entire Book of Deuteronomy takes place there. Moses gives his farewell address and encourages the army to stay God-centered after crossing the Jordan. The book is most known in Christian circles for its exclusive coverage of the death of Moses.

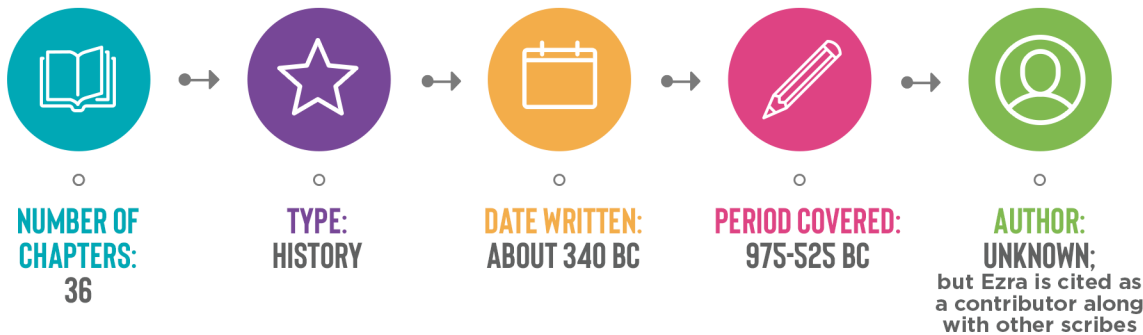

EZRA | 15 OT

Ezra covers two periods, 60 years apart, both involving the rebuilding of the Temple in Jerusalem after the Great Exile ended. The first records the struggles to rebuild, kings who stood in support and those who didn't. The second part records how quickly the returning remnant had intermarried with the pagan cultures and means to repent. The text is one story, however it is not high on the list of well-known Bible stories. It is best approached as one story, though a long one.

Inspired of the Spirit, he returns to execute its renovation and point out shortcomings among the people. This book is his account, the only book in the Old Testament written in first person. It is one story, though not often included in classic Bible story editions.

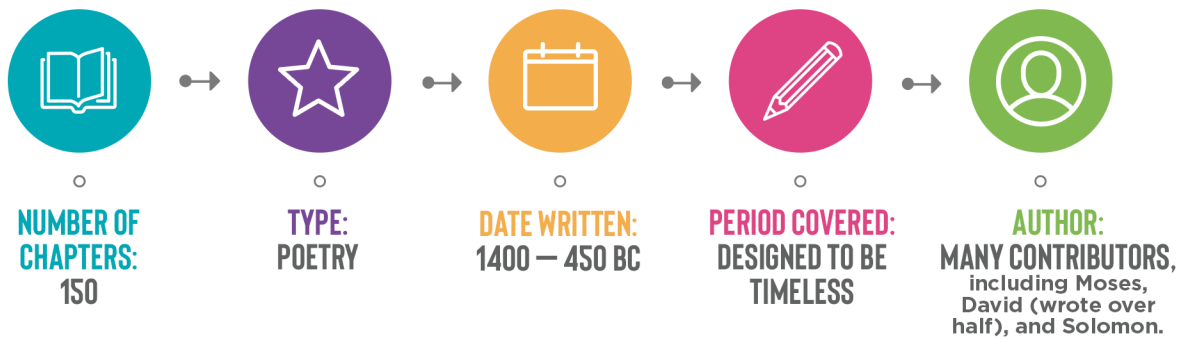

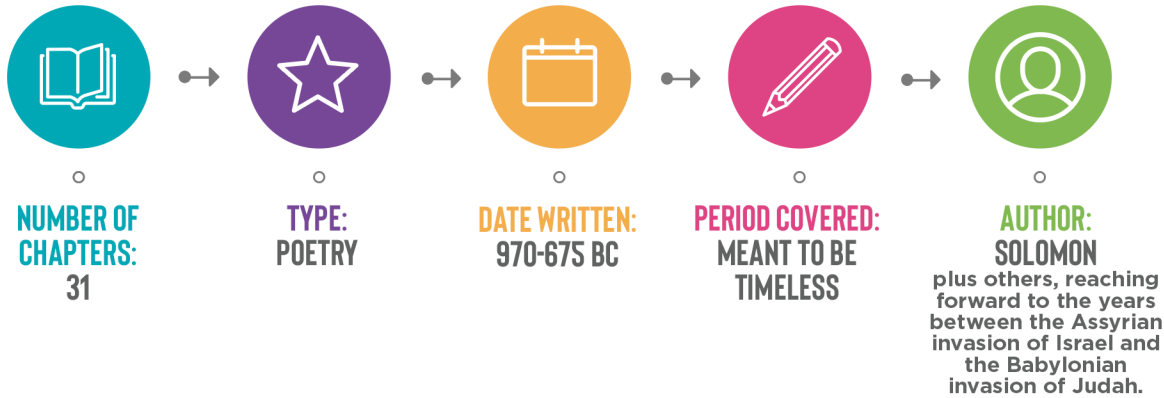

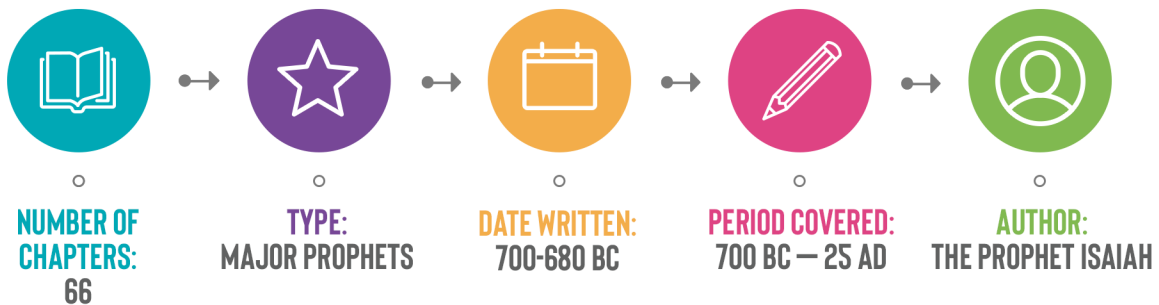

Jeremiah expressed raw emotion, as if he had just walked through the streets and alleys of Jerusalem and saw nothing but destruction and suffering and heartbreak.

Lamentations is not so much prophecy as it is a lament over what had become of Jerusalem after the invasion and how it all could have been avoided.

Ezekiel begins before the Babylonian invasion and exile. Ezekiel prophesies about it in the early chapters of the book. His warnings become so extreme: he even predicts that people will resort to cannibalism. But the people refused to listen.

Ezekiel then lived among the Jewish exiles in Babylon. He prophesied there for about 22 years.

Ezekiel gave his people hope. But he also prophesied about the end of times, and those prophesies included Israel becoming a nation again after years of wandering the earth. That came true in 1948.

Daniel was still a teenager when he was deported to Babylon with many others in the Great Exile. Babylon was extremely polytheistic, worshipping many gods, but Daniel only wanted to worship the God of Israel. His faithfulness, wisdom, and education enabled King Nebuchadnezzar to say that the God of Israel is God.

The first six chapters are history, and include Daniel in the lions' den; Daniel's friends in the fiery furnace; and the handwriting on the wall. In Chapter 7, the book makes a turn and becomes prophecy about the future. Daniel hears from the angel Gabriel, who announced that the exile will last 70 years. Daniel goes on to prophesy about our future, and things that have not taken place yet.

The book contains warnings of the coming Assyrian invasion on the northern kingdom and the Babylonian invasion of the southern kingdom. The northern invasion was right around the corner, occurring in 722 BC. The invasion of the southern kingdom by the Babylonians, would happen 150 years later. Nobody listened to Hosea.

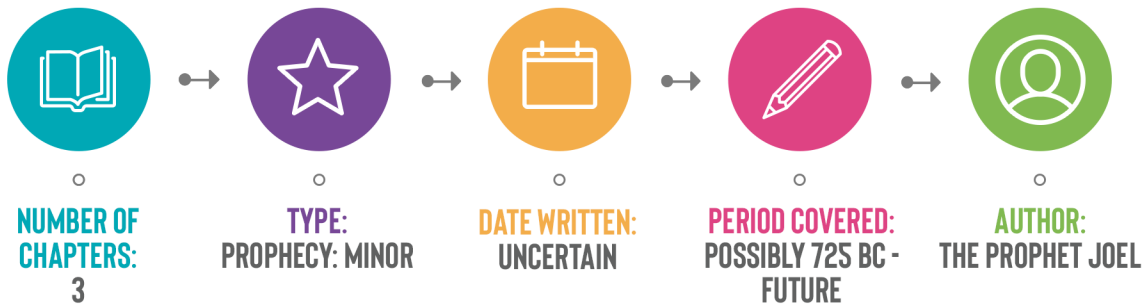

The first challenge with the Book of Joel is trying to date it. The challenge comes through the fact that the prophet has very little to say about himself. Many of the prophets name the kings under which they were serving, but Joel does not.

Joel prophesied about destruction that could apply to the Babylonian invasion or the destruction of the temple in 70 AD, or other traumatic times for Israel. He also prophesied about the Day of the Lord (another name for the Second Coming of Christ), and therefore some of his prophecies remain futuristic.

The book focuses almost exclusively on God's pending judgment against Nineveh, capital of Assyria. Assyria was very strong at the time of Nahum's prophecy. And 40-some years after Nahum prophesied the complete destruction of the city of Nineveh, its Assyrian army took Jews from the northern kingdom into exile. It looked like a very victorious time for the Assyrians. The 10 tribes of Israel that made up the northern kingdom completely disappeared into these and other foreign peoples.

However, God was good to his word brought through Nahum. The Median army took Nineveh in 612 BC and destroyed it forever. It was finally excavated - dug out of the sand - in the 1800s AD.

Habakkuk preached from the southern kingdom (Kingdom of Judah), which was still intact, but less than 50 years away from its own invasion by Babylon that destroyed the Temple. The pressure was on.

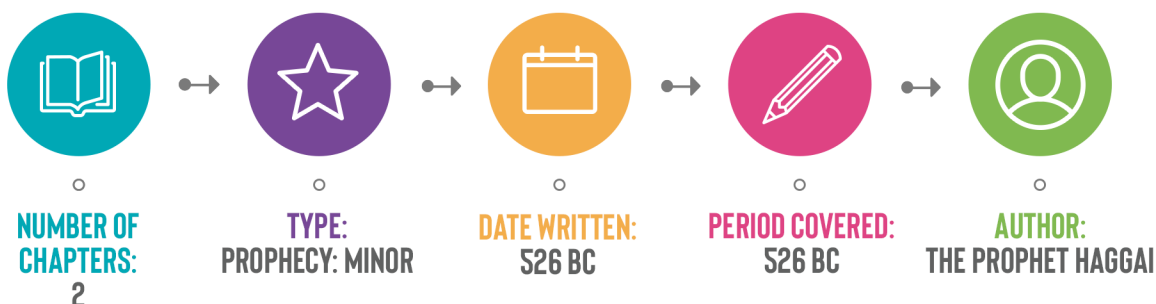

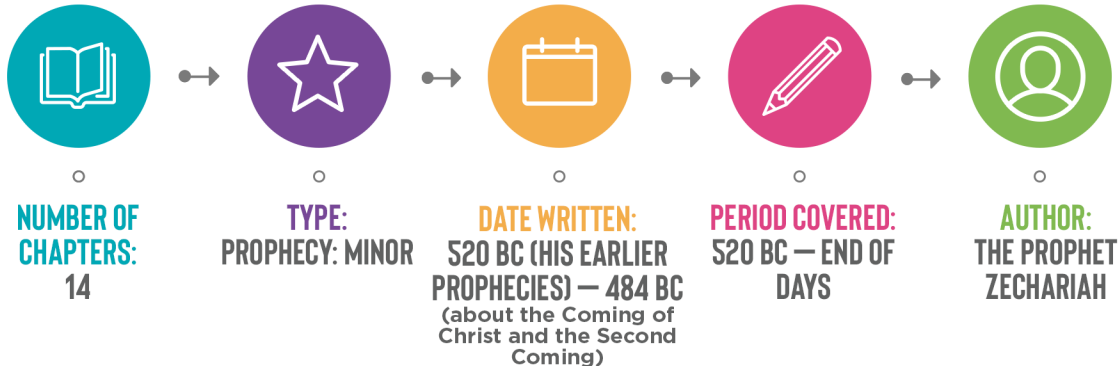
