THE LAW OF GOD......Romans 13:8–10

Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. For the commandments, "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet," and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law. THE CONFESSION OF SIN

We have sinned against you, O Lord, our Maker, our Defender, and our Redeemer. Our natures are corrupt and sinful; prone to fall away from you, sluggish to do good and swift to do evil. ## A. Limits of Wisdom (vv. 1-6)

1. <u>Be Generous (vv. 1-2)</u>

- a. Why is diversification wise?
- b. Why should uncertainty about the future lead us to generosity?
- c. <u>Application</u>: How does the Lord Jesus Christ both vindicate Solomon's wisdom and demonstrate He is superior to Solomon?
- 2. <u>Be Confident (vv. 3-4)</u>: What is the issue here that wisdom is unable to sort out?
  - a. How does wisdom approach unexpected, sub-optimal conditions?
  - b. Danger and Risk
    - (1) What is the problem with governing your life by risks?
    - (2) Rather than being paralyzed by the unknown, what is Solomon's counsel?
- 3. <u>Be Humble (v. 5)</u>:
  - a. How does Solomon show us that we may not understand humility properly?
  - b. <u>Application</u>: Even if we can't decipher all God's ways and works, what is our duty?
- 4. <u>Be Industrious (v. 6)</u>
  - a. Why does Solomon advocate working day and night?

- b. How can an overly narrow focus be presumptuous?
- 5. <u>Summary and **Application**</u>: God did not create mankind to cower in fear and indecision because of lack of certainty or possible danger, but to press on in faithfulness and trust.
- B. **Balance of Wisdom (vv. 7-10)**: How does living with one foot in the grave give freedom for this life?
  - 1. Light and Dark (vv. 7-8)
    - a. What is meant to be enjoyed?
    - b. Does Solomon assert that neither good nor bad things have any meaning or significance? What is he saying by *vanity*?
  - 2. Joyful and Solemn (vv. 9-10)
    - a. What's Solomon's advice to young people?
    - b. How does Solomon warn those who aren't young anymore?
    - c. How does Solomon's exhortation differ from the ideas of "Positive Thinking" from men such as Peale, Schuller, and Osteen?
      - (1) <u>Application</u>: Why should Christians be joyful?
      - (2) <u>Application</u>: How is Solomon's advice to young folks different from what we often hear?

- d. The Judgment of God: Why is God right to judge us for how well we have enjoyed His world?
- e. Old Age: A key part of wisdom is knowing when \_\_\_\_\_\_ is over and \_\_\_\_\_\_ has begun.

III.<u>Conclusion</u>: How does the Lord's Table encourage enjoyment of this life?


