


NOTES FROM FR. VANDEWALLE

Christ the King Sunday – The last Sunday of the Church Calendar, before we begin Advent, is Christ the King Sunday, where we recognize that Christ is the King of the Universe and all of History. The victory is ultimately His and so allow him to also be King of our hearts.

Some additional temporary regulations - With new DHM, which is through November 30th, the Diocese asked us to not only continue distancing regulations we have in place, but also (1) to encourage people to wear masks and (2) that there be no congregational singing at this time. Thank you for your efforts to cooperate. These are sacrifices. However, we have been blessed to be able to have our churches open, whereas not every place is so fortunate. We pray that that will continue to be the case. There are many things for which we can offer up these sacrifices, such the salvation of souls and the good of our parishes and families.

Christ the King, Victorious - Jesus is already victorious; by his death and resurrection, Christ has conquered death so that those who die in Him will live in a better life forever. That victory is fulfilled for us in heaven. BUT the victory is already here on earth. It is, however an on-going fulfillment, often unseen that is accomplished by Christ in us and in His Church. It is gradually accomplished in us through our cooperation and though it can be seen in certain ways, it is often invisible. "We must strive to follow and fulfill in ourselves the various stages of Christ's plan as well as his mysteries.... They are complete ... in the person of Jesus, but not in us and His Church." We are currently completing them by our free will cooperation with his graces. We don't have to always know what they are, but if we are (1) in the state of Grace, (2) trying to cooperate with God's will, then (3) the good we do IS actively accomplishing His Kingdom... "on earth as it is in heaven." Christ's Kingdom is accomplished in good times and in bad. St. Paul seems to indicate that it is especially in suffering, the glory is being accomplished in us! A greater suffering can result in a greater glory. Mother Teresa showed that the key is doing God's will. She wanted to do God's will whether God wanted her to be a beggar or a "princess in a palace." By the way, she did both. She begged and now she is a princess in the palace of heaven. And St. Maximilian Kolbe should be an encouragement for us who are going through suffering, for in that darkest place of a starvation bunker in Auschwitz, he was leading his fellows in singing hymns of praise and thanks to God. He was NOT conquered by evil or death, but by the power of Jesus' death and resurrection he was conquering and bringing about the kingdom. He lived the message of St. Paul: "In all circumstances give thanks; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." So even in the most trying of circumstances we can offer praise and thanks to God if we understand that God is growing us toward complete fulfillment in heaven. It may be difficult and we may fail at times, but we ask God for the grace to do it. As the song says: "Christ Jesus victor, Christ Jesus ruler, Christ Jesus Lord and Redeemer."

Thanksgiving Mass – "In all things give thanks, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." – St. Paul. It seems it may be difficult to give thanks when things around us seem to be falling apart, but first, we can look to the many good things that God has given; second, the amazing things God will give to us forever in the complete Joy of Heaven; third, thanking God for the gift of Himself which those who make it to heaven will possess in complete bliss forever; and fourth, that the sufferings of this time are part of God's mysterious plan to get us saved and for our own particular growth in holiness or as Matthew Kelly says, to become the best-version-of-ourselves according to God's will. plus there is Turkey! "The worst moment for an atheist is when he is really thankful and has no one to thank." – G.K. Chesterton. We are glad to know Whom to thank!
