

3 D quilt Class with Amy Crunk

We had a full house on Saturday May 2 for thee 3 D quilt class with Amy Crunk. She showed us a number of approaches for these interesting quilts.

For those who missed out—the 3D effect comes from using 60 degree diamonds cut from three different shades of fabric—light, medium, and dark. These can be cut from either solid fabric or from strip sets where different fabrics of the same value are sewn together.

Cut lights and darks with the 60 degree angle going right and cut mediums (twice as many mediums as darks or lights) going to the left. Sew the blocks in columns then sew the columns together to make the quilt.

Quick tip— If you aren't sure what value a fabric has (light, medium, or dark), use your camera phone on black and white to view the fabrics. With no color in the picture, you can see the value more clearly!

Educational Corner — Miniature Quilts

Photos here are of quilts shown by Donna Nicholson at the April meeting. To illustrate the power of a miniature quilt, she showed us one quilt in both "normal" size and miniature size.

Sometimes minis are known as dollhouse guilts.

- Fabric choice is key in miniatures as larger prints are unlikely to work well in tiny pieces.
- Minis are often paper pieced. Paper piecing allows for a great deal of precision. An "Add an eighth" rule can be very useful here. Also, a lightbox.
- Minis need little or no extra batting. The material in the seams is often enough to make the quilts quite thick, given the small scale.
- Binding works well by just folding the backing to the front. Single fold binding can also work, but double fold may be too thick. A single knife edge binding may be an option.
- Try fussy cutting a motif to make a medallion
 quilt, paper piecing around it to make it look more elaborate. Mini flying geese can be easy but impressive.
- Minis can be a variety of size, very small—such as 9 inches square or as large as 24 inches square. They can be used as wall hangings. Quilting can be by hand or machine, but is expected to be small scale to match the size of the quilt.
 Whole cloth minis can be very intricate.
- A great place to start your miniature experience is to buy a book with patterns or an issue of Miniature Quilt Magazine—



which is out of print now. There are many copies online available. However, a simple long cabin, pineapple, or 9 patch does can be attempted without a fancy pattern.

Rouladen

Thin steaks, pounded and seasoned with salt and pepper

Sliced bacon and chunks of sweet onion
