REMEMBRANCE

As we move into November we begin a season of Remembrance. The centrepiece of the month is, of course, Remembrance Sunday, and I have said much about that on other occasions. This autumn has also had a Remembrance focus for me. Two events have been significant. First, I was invited (wearing my RAF hat) to dedicate a memorial in Spalding. In September 1953 Pilot Officer George Furniss, an Auxiliary Pilot with 616 Squadron was flying his Gloster Meteor near Spalding when it caught fire. He lost power but rather than ejecting and saving his own life he stayed with the aircraft gliding it away from the built up area of the town. It crashed in a field near Vernatt's Drain and George Furniss did not survive. He left a wife and twin daughters who were only 12 months old. George's daughters, who have been researching their father story, were present at the ceremony to unveil the new memorial to their father who sacrificed his live to save the lives of many. The second event was closer to home. Charles Penson had been a pupil at the William Alvey School. He had originally joined the Royal Navy but transferred to the RAF. He was part of the crew performing test flights on the R38 airship over the Humber in 1921 when the airship folded and collapsed, descending in ball of flames into the Humber. Charles Penson's funeral service took place in our Parish Church, and he was buried in the town cemetery 100 years ago. Children from the Alvey School have been learning about his story in their history lessons and we held a memorial service in the church to mark the centenary of his death. Both of these deaths occurred in peace time and are not normally remembered on Remembrance Sunday when we tend to focus on those who died time of war, but these two stories have caused me to reflect on who we remember and why we remember.

Over the past 18 months many people from this church and town have died. Some of Covid, some with Covid, and others unrelated to Covid. In the early days of the pandemic I took many funerals with only one or two people present. Many had the hope that the pandemic would soon be over and they could have a memorial service for their loved one. But the months have rolled by and they are probably at a different place in the bereavement journey that they were at the time of death. The pandemic forced us to be creative in how we marked the loss of a loved one and how we remember them. That task is far from being completed as the pandemic is not yet over.

At every funeral I commend the soul of the person who has died to the love of God ... that happens whether the church is full or whether it is just me and the undertakers ... but the way remember is very personal and they way we do it can change over time. The stories of Charles Penson and George Furniss remind us that memories can be very long and that it is important to remember because our history is our story.

EDWARD EVANS - RN Surgeon

In the south-east corner of our churchyard is a grave with the following inscription: "To the memory of MR. EDWARD EVANS who died Jan 20 1780 aged 58 years. He was Surgeon to His Majesty's Ship The Egmont and after a successful voyage from America; (being a patron of the musical science) he gave an Organ to this Parish in the year 1772."

Information about Mr. Evans seems had to discover, but there follow a few fragments about his life and work.

§ He was already surgeon's mate on HMS Lightning. [She was launched in 1740, was an '8-gun bomb vessel' and was captured off Livorno/Leghorn, NW Italy, during the War of the Austrian Succession in 1746. [On 5 June, 1744, he requested to be appointed surgeon's mate about HMS Anglesea, built by Hugh Blaydes in Hull. [During the same war, this vessel too was captured in an engagement with the 50-gun French ship of the line, Apollon, and became L'Anglesea.]

§ On 3 September, 1771, Mr. Evans probably applied for a pension. The records state: "Edward Evans, Surgeon, haas served 12 years (on which ship?) and is eligible for superannuation. He has sworn that he is in the 51st year of his age."

§ HMS Egmont: various ships have borne this name, For us the relevant vessel and events in its career its described thus :"HMS Egmont was a 74gun third rate ship of the line of the Royal Navy launched on 29 August 1768 at Deptford. She was designed by Sir Thomas Slade, and was the only ship built to her draught." [There is a model of this HMS Egmont in the National Maritime Museum.]

§ HMS Buckingham: In the 'Ship's Journal" of Edward Rye [kept in the Northamptonshire Record Office], it mentions that Mr. Evans was indeed on board HMS Egmont on 23 Jan 1771, when the journal commences. However, he "was discharged to HMS Buckingham on 18 Mar 1771".

§ The organ was built by Samuel Green, cast £300 and was used until 1891, and it was transferred to Bradshawgate Primitive Methodist Church in Leigh, Manchester. Alas, we do not know its location - a branch of Iceland now stands on the site! Research continues.

WILLIAM ALVEY SCHOOL Bishop's Visitor update

As October draws to a close the children are enjoying their Half Term holiday. As usual it has been a busy term and with fewer restrictions in school though not totally back to "normal". Early in the term I went in to school to read a Letter from Bishop Nicholas during an assembly. These are still "virtual" so classes join on-screen – no gathering altogether in the school hall. I was with the Headteacher in his office and the classes and the Vicar joined on the screen. I also donated some books and other items belonging to my grand-daughter, and now outgrown, which were never taken home to Mexico but kept here for her visits to Sleaford. They were distributed to different age groups as appropriate.

On 30th September the Charles Penson Memorial Service was held in St Denys church and led by the Vicar. This was to commemorate the old pupil who died in the airship disaster over Hull 100 years ago. His funeral was held in the church at the time and he is buried in the Cemetery. It was a very moving event. The KS2 children (Y's3,4,5, and 6) from the Alvey were there and a number of special guests including myself. A group of musicians from RAF Cranwell provided the music and 2 representatives of Hull Minster including a flag-bearer participated. His medals were paraded down the aisle as the school has recently raised funds to buy them. You probably saw the account in the local paper. After the service the guests walked to his grave at the Cemetery and wreaths were laid and prayers said. Then we went into school for refreshments and chat and a look at the Air Raid Museum.

Another boy who died in a tragic accident in Eastgate in 1946 whilst a pupil at the school was remembered in a ceremony in Spalding Cemetery at his grave. He was called Brian Malcolm Fowler and his friend Bob Snowden, who witnessed the accident at the time and has never forgotten, took part, with representatives from the school.

When the children return to classes in November thoughts will turn towards preparations for Christmas no doubt, so hopefully we can look forward to carols, making decorations and celebrating the Nativity.
