

Field Trip Info

The November 16th field trip will be to Summit about 65 miles from here, 15 miles north of Cedar City. We will be on paved road, except for the last 2 miles. The last 300 yards of

the road is pretty rocky and requires a high clearance. We may be able to car pool the last part or people could walk.

The field trip is in two sections the 1st is a short hike and a little boulder hopping. The second is a short drive from the 1st and hike over a bushy trail with glyphs along the way. Some of the glyphs can be seen from the trail, most of the glyph you will need to climb/scramble over boulders to get to them, which are about 30 to 50 feet high. I would rate the 1st section as a 2 to 3, the second would be a 4 if scrambling up to the glyphs.

Bring a lunch, snacks and plenty of water.

Remember, you must be a member of DAS to participate in a field trip. You must be at the meeting in order to sign up for a field trip.

Meeting Report

The October lecture was "The Duck Story in Rock Art" that was given by Boma Johnson with assistance from Kat.



The Zuni story is about Kiakklo who during a migration becomes blinded by snow. A duck comes to his aid and leads him back to his people.

This story is represented in pottery, kachina dolls and in rock art as an image of a human with a duck on his head. This image is found throughout southeast Utah, as well as southern Utah. This motif is seen locally in Rosy Canyon and south of Cedar City.
