
General Class Content


- Single subject focus (e.g. Advance Directives, Home Funeral, Green Burial)
- Overview of one aspect (e.g. EOL Choices, After-Death Options, Caregiving)



 Comprehensive (e.g. Death and Dying in History, Culture, Society, Religion, Medicine

 including funeral/burial practices, metaphysical beliefs, etc.)





Code of Ethics

"The professional educator endeavors to present facts without distortion, bias, or personal prejudice."



Code of Ethics

- Be free of agendas
- Allow students to draw their own conclusions
- Know your limitations



Principles of Adult Learning

- Engage students in the learning process
- Link new material to existing knowledge and wisdom
- Teach relevant and practical information



• Have clearly defined goals

Principles of Adult Learning

- Show practical application of knowledge and action plans
- Emphasize why learning is important to increase motivation
- Present content as modules 1 lesson per module
- Honor different learning styles



Learning Styles

- Visual
 - Slides, pictures, diagrams, tables, graphics, models, handouts
- Auditory
 - Lectures, verbal instructions, stories
 - Kinesthetic
 - Hands-on activities, field trips



Principles of Learning for Millennials

- Use multimedia including social media platforms like YouTube, Facebook, Twitter
- Maintain a relaxed classroom and build rapport with students



- Creative assignments (record a podcast, write a blog, film a video)
- Service learning volunteer as a group or assign as an individual project
