Trevor's Column

Dear sisters and brothers,

Spring has sprung! The liquid amber tree in our backyard is covered with buds from which are emerging beautiful little leaves. Our first sweet pea has bloomed and looks like it will be the first fruits of a grand harvest. As I ride my bicycle around Burrill Lake I am struck by the beauty of the wattle and other signs of new life, yet the very beauty of the season requires two differing theological perspectives and responses especially in this pandemic.

On the one hand, *everything created by God is good* (1 Timothy 4:4). While we work with existing materials, God created beauty and form out of formlessness and chaos. He enjoyed every moment of his creative task, and stood back declaring his pleasure that all was as he had intended. Each flower was conceived in the mind of God, and because he is such a big God there is infinite variety. So roses, carnations, daffodils, dahlias & proteas are all part of his creativity, designed for his enjoyment and ours. The only appropriate human response is to praise and thank our creator God. The Psalmist reminds us that the very creation is like a choir declaring the glory of God (Psalm 148), so when we witness spectacular sights we are not just meant to say 'isn't it beautiful?' but we ought to say 'isn't God great?'. It is meant to provoke the response of praise, thanks, adoration and worship.

However, *everything created by God is also frustrated* (Romans 8:18-25). Although it was good, creation is now partly disordered by a certain sense of futility in its 'bondage to decay'. The flowers bloom, but the petals fall. Moreover, the plant has to battle weeds and pests to survive. Every garden is constantly threatened by encroaching chaos! But worse, creation can never fulfil its ultimate purpose while humans rebel against God. Imagine the creation to be a huge orchestra playing to the praise of God. The mountains are playing bass, the oceans are playing cymbals, the birds are on flute and the flowers are on piccolo or triangle. But the concert is never perfect because all the time orchestra members are dying, and the principal performer (the soloist) will not participate properly in the concert. Instead humans are full of themselves, and spend most of their time praising others members of the orchestra. This is idolatry and always puts the orchestra out of tune.

In summary, the creation shares our sentence of death, and eagerly awaits the day when the risen Christ will return to redeem his own children completely. Until that day everything created by God will be frustrated, including us. So perhaps the current pandemic is a much needed 'wake up' call for the friends of Jesus to not only keep on earnestly praying *your kingdom come*, but also to be actively sharing with others the need to find their ultimate hope in the redemption which is found only in Jesus.

A prayer for a new Senior Minister

Bountiful God, give to this parish a faithful pastor who will faithfully speak your word and minister your sacraments; an encourager who will equip your people for ministry and enable us to fulfil our calling. Give to those who will choose, wisdom, discernment and patience, and to us give warm and generous hearts, for Jesus Christ's sake. **Amen** ²⁷ Jesus and his disciples went on to the villages around Caesarea Philippi. On the way he asked them, "Who do people say I am?" ²⁸ They replied, "Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets."
²⁹ "But what about you?" he asked. "Who do you say I am?" Peter answered, "You are the Messiah." ³⁰ Jesus warned them not to tell anyone about him.
³¹ He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again. ³² He spoke plainly about this, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³ But when Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, he rebuked Peter. "Get behind me, Satan!" he said. "You do not have in mind the concerns of God, but merely human concerns."

Afghanistan

As well as continuing to pray for God's mercy on the country of Afghanistan and especially for our sisters and brothers in Christ, some of us may be able to **help practically** through the auspices of the Barnabas Fund.

This organisation is currently caring for 400 Afghani Christians (men, women and children) who have escaped to a neighbouring country, but it remains in contact with another 400 still trapped there. As first generation Christian converts from Islam they face possible death at the hands of the Taliban for being apostates. The Barnabas Fund is supporting the living costs of Christians in hiding in Afghanistan, as well as for those who have escaped. It will be funding flights for Christians to travel from the region to safer countries, as well as supporting them for a period as they settle into their new environment.
