
On Saturday, July 9, 2022, members of the Grand Council were present in Liberal, Kansas and assisted in making new Select Masters for that York Rite Body.

This in-gathering will bring both of the Councils of Knight Masons together to confer their degrees on new members and to allow other Knight Masons in good standing to receive the honorary Order of St. Patrick. Past Great Chief, Kevin Samples, of Missouri, will be in attendance and will be conferring the Order of the Knight of the East and West. It is an honor to have a past presiding national officer visiting our Councils.

The three Councils of Allied Masonic Degrees will meet after lunch and will confer the degree on several new Brothers who have been invited to membership in the AMD. After the initial conferral, there will be an exemplification of the Knights of Constantinople and the Order of the Secret Monitor. Worthy Companions of the AMD will be permitted to receive the First Grade of the Scarlet Cord, another honorary body which is available only to AMD Companions who have received the Order of the Secret Monitor. This is the first time the Scarlet Cord will have been conferred in the state of Kansas. The Sovereign Grand Master will be in attendance during the degrees. It is an honor to have him visiting our Councils.

The Council meets on February, May, August, and November. The Commandery opens in March, June, September, and December. December is the annual installation of officers.

The bodies have begun to perform their own degree work so they can be better equipped and ready to assist the Grand York Rite bodies by having members who already know and understand the degree work for state wide conferrals.

## Commandery Inspections

The annual inspections of our constituent commanderies within the Grand Jurisdiction of Kansas has begun.

Ellsworth Council No. 9 on the week of August 16, 1899. A new deposit was made on Labor Day, 1999, by the Grand Councils of Kansas and Colorado.



# Saving Our History

It is always a sad moment when our masonic bodies decide to either turn in their charters, or to merge with another body within the state of Kansas. There are no word adequate enough to explain how we feel when this occurs. Yet, there is something we can each remember to do if we are cognizant of what is happening.

Too often we throw away our history. Not our minute books, as they are forwarded to the grand presiding bodies which grant them their charters. We forget about the little items each of our bodies possess which cannot and will not be able to be replaced. Each of our masonic bodies has something which has either been built just for them, or has been given to them as a gift. When we decide to simply discard those items, we lose a part of the history of our bodies.

One such instance occurred at McPherson Lodge No. 172. The lodge in Newton had received a consolidation from a lodge which sadly did not have enough active members to hold meetings any longer. Newton did not have room to store so many items, so they reached out the McPherson Lodge, which had been in the middle of a slight remodel, to offer those items to them. McPherson gladly accepted the items. In this case, the items were chairs which are being researched to determine their age. They appear to be from England and possible date to the mid 1700s. More research is required to discover their true age and place of manufacture.

Another instance which happens all too frequently is our members pass away and their relatives and loved ones do not understand how important their masonic regalia was to them. Companion Carr was gifted a beautiful set of early 1900s Chapter jewels by another Companion who discovered them in an antique shop many years ago. These are irreplaceable jewels and deserve a more fitting fate than to be sold to someone who does not appreciate them and only believes they are valuable.



There are Lodges who do a wonderful job of maintaining not only their own history, but that of the constituent bodies who no longer meet in their facilities. Great Bend Lodge has a beautiful collection of old masonic jewels dating from the 1800s. These are jewels from Grand Encampment Triennial gatherings, Kansas Grand York Rite meetings, and other jurisdiction's Grand York Rite gatherings. If you look really hard you may spot a Past Grand High Priest jewel from Kansas.

Remember to take care of our history. If we do not take care of it, no one will do it for us. Donate your items to someone who will appreciate them. Display them in your buildings. They are precious treasures which cannot be duplicated.



## Pass This Issue to Another!

### The York Rite of Freemasonry

The York Rite, or more correctly, the American Rite, is based on the early remnants of Craft Masonry that were practiced in the early 1700's. The formation of the first Grand Lodge of England in 1717 specified that the lodges were to confer only the first three degrees of Craft Masonry.

Three bodies were later formed to work the degrees no longer controlled by the lodges. The Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, Council of Royal and Select Masters, and the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar. All three bodies are technically autonomous Masonic entities, only the requirement of membership in the Royal Arch connecting the Cryptic degrees and Chivalric Orders together.

You may have received this from a Brother Mason and you do not know much about the York Rite. If you are interested in learning more about the York Rite of Freemasonry, or are interested in membership within the three bodies of the Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, the Council of Royal and Select Masters, or the Commandery of Knights Templar, there are several ways to learn more about membership.

Like all Masonry, there must be a petition, an investigation, and an election before you can receive the several degrees and orders of the York Rite. The York Rite is a journey through seven degrees and three orders composed within the three bodies of York Rite Masonry. Each brings its own light to the candidate who is searching for even more light in their masonic experience.

Join us! You will enjoy the experience and finally be able to complete your Blue Lodge experience. Confused? Ask us how that can happen for you, as it has happened for countless York Rite Masons who have come before you.
