4th CATECHESIS: The Gloria in excelsis (Glory to God in the highest)

We continue the short catechesis which explains the course of our liturgical celebrations. Today, we present the *Glory to God.*

> What is **the Glory to God**?

It is both a hymn which proclaims the glory of God the Father and a supplication addressed to the Son. The Gloria celebrates the work of Salvation accomplished in Jesus by the Holy Spirit.

> ORIGIN:

The Glory to God, "*Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will*" (Lk 2, 14), is a resumption of the very words of the angels on Christmas night that the Church sings at Sunday Mass and the great liturgical feasts.

N.B. However, the Church does not sing the Glory to God during the time of Advent and Lent because these are two times of preparation to celebrate the glory of God manifested in a vivid manner by the birth at Christmas and by the resurrection of Jesus at Easter.

Much more than Taste

Salt provides something "extra" to our food and enhances its taste. It is a much-appreciated condiment that adds a great deal to our dishes. However, it was not concerning taste that it was significant when Jesus said to his disciples: You are the salt of the earth. Christ also said: You are the light of the world. He invited his disciples to be the landmarks in the night. Their mission was to improve the earth and its inhabitants' lives. The story continues.



Referring to Jesus' salt citation, its use was essential and far beyond just seasoning. The tangy taste that it added to food also had an important secondary effect. Salt was a product used to preserve food, particularly meat and fish. Salt prevented food from spoiling and rotting.

This was the function that Jesus wanted his disciples to understand. Their vocation was to bring more than a spiritual supplement to the world.

The disciples were destined to collaborate in preventing the world from self-destruction and from distancing itself from our Creator? Let's examine the earth from the aspect of our common home. It is currently in crisis and experiencing danger. Yet far too often, ecological discussions is only taken seriously by children, poets and politicians heading into elections.

To the climate-change deniers, we can add those who say this not a Christian's place. While it may be true there are other battles to fight, it is also evident that life, as we know it, is being affected. We can see that life in all its forms is often menaced by injustice, hunger, war and all aspects that affect the survival of our planet. We remember that Christ referred to his disciples as the *salt* of the earth as well as the *light* that would help people to see things clearly.

We remember the reference in Psalm 112: *Light rises in the darkness for the upright.* But as during the night, this disciple is *light,* he or she is also *salt* which prevents spoiling and decomposition. Referring to salt means much more than enhancing flavor and taste. The world and our earth hope and wait for the *upright* to take the lead.
