

## **Bridge Painter – Washington DC/Northern VA/Maryland/Baltimore Areas**

### **Geographic Jurisdiction:**

Washington DC area defined as: City of Washington D.C

Northern Virginia area defined as: The cities of Alexandria and Arlington; and the following counties: Fairfax, Fauquier, Loudon, Prince William, and Stafford.

Maryland/Baltimore area defined as: City of Baltimore, and the following counties: Prince George's, Montgomery, Calvert, Charles, St. Mary's, Baltimore, Anne Arundel, Harford, Cecil, Kent, Queen Ann's, Caroline, Talbot, Dorchester, Wicomico, Worcester, Somerset, Washington, Howard, Fredrick, Carroll.

### **Bridge Painter Jurisdictional Work:**

Work will include, but not limited to:

- (1) All new and/or maintenance work described below occurring at or on steel and concrete bridges.
- (2) All coatings on structural steel and concrete bridges, all protective coatings currently available and any new materials or technology used for painting and/or protective coatings which may be developed in the future, included but not limited to: latex, oil, epoxies, urethanes, membranes, fire proofing/retardant, plural components and intumescent, etc.
- (3) All coatings on cement columns and cement piers on bridges and elevated highways and elevated train structures.
- (4) Manning of all power equipment; including the compressor for blasting, grinding, spraying, water blasting, vacuum blasting, the use of wheelabrators, generators, steel grit recovery units, separators, lead waste vacuum trucks, dust collectors, vacuums, heaters, decontaminate trailers, wash sinks, man lifts, forklifts, lulls, tuggers & winches, lights & light towers, water blast recovery units and all other equipment used in conjunction with the performance of this work. All specialized equipment to perform coating applications and removal. All greasing of bridge mechanisms.
- (5) The collection, sweeping, clearing, packaging, and storing of the sand and any other hazardous or nonhazardous waste residue generated by the performance of the work.
- (6) All material including, but not limited to, plywood, wood, plexiglass, pipe, framed scaffold, Q Decking, chain link and all other materials used to build platforms and scaffolding used for de-leading, prepping, cleaning, priming, painting/coating and general maintenance of structural steel, concrete, pipes, handrails, poles and all other surfaces required on bridges which have to be contained or accessed, shall be done by this Union.
- (7) Erection, maintenance, disassembly, transportation, and relocation of containment structures used for the purpose of removing lead bearing or other hazardous or coating materials, preparing the underlying surfaces for coating, including the setting and removal of tarps, and for the containment of the coating application.
- (8) The maintenance, operation, setup, disassembly and relocation of all the equipment necessary to adequately operate and maintain work within the containment enclosure including but not limited to classifiers, dust collections, vacuum systems, pressure vessels steel grit recovery units, separators, lead waste vacuum trucks, heaters, decontaminate trailers, wash sinks, man lifts, forklifts, tuggers & winches, lights & light towers, water blast recovery units and other equipment used in conjunction and associated support equipment such as but not limited to compressors, generators, coolers, heaters, separators, etc. and all jurisdictions listed in IUPAT General Constitution Section 6.
- (9) All platforms for containment or access or shielding or decking, including all rigging for such platforms.
- (10) The handling, assembling, disassembling, operation, maintenance, storage and transporting of all tools, equipment and material used or that may be used by members of this International Union in performing their trade or work; the loading and unloading of any and all materials, tools and equipment.
