



The first point is to affirm the fact that failure is not sweet at all. It hurts. As human beings with feelings, we are bound to know the difference between joyful and painful emotions. At any rate, we are responsible for our reactions after the painful feelings. Some would rightly get up again and move on courageously, while some would refuse to get up after an episode of failure. What I learnt was that “failure is not fatal. Success is not final. It is courage that counts” I vowed never to give up. I am so glad too, with the story of the widow which Jesus told in today’s gospel. The widow had the courage to keep “hitting hard”. Sure, the Judge represents God, while the widow could be any of us. The action of the widow tells us something about praying without giving up. However, let us be warned that God, unlike the Judge in the story, would never see our prayers as a “disturbance”. He is God and not man.

God alone is sufficient.

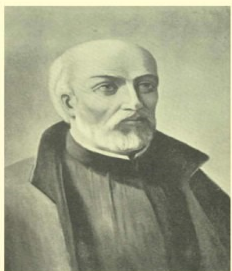
St. Teresa of Jesus

Mystic | Teacher of Prayer | Doctor of the Church

St. Teresa of Jesus was born on March 28, 1515, in Avila, Spain. Her mother died when she was 14, and she entered the Carmelite Monastery in Avila in 1535. Her life as a Carmelite, though far removed from the mainstream of modern culture, still speaks powerfully to us today.

The Book of Her Life, The Way of Perfection, The Interior Castle, and The Foundations are her main works, detailing her remarkable pathway to God. It is through these profoundly human yet mystical writings that we experience Teresa's spirit that inspires us to enter into an ever deeper relationship with God.

Teresa died in 1582 at the age of 67. In 1622 she was canonized, and in 1970 Pope Paul VI declared her a Doctor of the Church, the first woman ever to be so recognized.

Holy person John was martyred in 1649, tormented to death by the Iroquois. By 1650 the Huron country was eradicated, and the arduously assembled mission was surrendered. Yet, it demonstrated to be "one of the triumphant disappointments that are ordinary in the Church's history." These sufferings made a flood of employments and minister intensity in France, and it gave new heart to the preachers in New France.
