TO THE VOTERS OF WAUPACA COUNTY AND PARTS OF OUTAGAMIE (Wards 10, 11 & 12, City of New London) and Shawano (Ward 4, City of Marion) Counties

Notice is hereby given of a general election to be held in the several wards in Waupaca County, on November 8, 2022, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are listed under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, together with any referendum questions submitted to a vote, in the sample ballot on page 3.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification*
- sign the poll book**

***If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.**

****If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word “exempt.”**

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter. If a voter is unable to state their name and address, an assistant may also do so for the voter.

Where Paper Ballots are Used

The voter shall make an “X” or other mark in the square next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall make an “X” in the square next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall make an “X” in the square next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device* (“Automark,” “Express Vote,” “Clear Access” or “ImageCast Evolution-ICE”) to mark an **optical scan** ballot, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall touch the screen next to “write-in” and type in the name of the person of their choice. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes" if in favor of the question or the voter shall touch the screen next to "no" if opposed to the question.

Spoiling Ballots

If a voter spoils a **paper or optical scan** ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

The voter may spoil a **touch screen** ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After Voting the Ballot


After an official **paper** ballot is marked, it shall be folded so that the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The voter shall then deposit their folded ballot in the proper ballot box or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit and leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **optical scan** ballot is marked, it may be inserted in a security sleeve so the marks do not show. The voter shall then insert the ballot in the voting device or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official **touch screen** ballot is cast, the voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

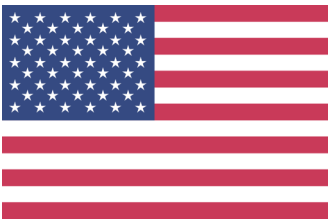

NOTICE OF REFERENDUM
TOWN OF ST LAWRENCE
NOVEMBER 8, 2022

Referendum Election Details
At an election to be held in the Town of St Lawrence, Waupaca County, on November 8, 2022 the following proposed Ordinance will be submitted to a vote of the people:

ORDINANCE No. 35

The Town Board of the Town of St Lawrence, Waupaca County, Wisconsin, does hereby ordain as follows:
That, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 60.30(1e)(a), the office of the Town Clerk shall be filled by appointment of a majority of the members-elect of the town board. The term of office for the appointed position shall be set by the town board, but may not exceed 3 years per § 60.30(1e)(c). The town board may re-appoint the officer for additional terms.
However, removal by the town board during a given term of office may only be for “cause” as

defined under § 17.001 and required by § 60.30 (1e)(f).
This ordinance is subject to approval by the town electors in a referendum, which is hereby called by the Town Board to be held on November 8, 2022.

The referendum question shall be: “Shall the person holding the office of Town Clerk in the Town of St Lawrence be appointed by the town board?” The salary of the appointed position shall be set by the town board and may not be reduced during the term of office. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its town board passage, notice after passage per § 60.80 and also its referendum approval by the town electors as required by § 60.30(1e)(b). Adopted this 1st day of August, 2022
Ballot text: The question will appear on the ballot as follows:
“Shall the person holding the office of Town Clerk in the Town of St Lawrence be appointed by the town board?”

Explanation:

A “Yes” vote means: The Town Board will appoint the Town Clerk. The position of Town Clerk will no longer be an elected position and therefore not appear on any ballots for Town Board elections. The Town Board will hire the best qualified person to serve as Town Clerk.

A “No” vote means: The position of Town Clerk will remain an elected position and appear on the ballot for the electorate to decide who should serve as Town Clerk.

Ballot Text: The question will appear on the ballot as follows:

“Shall the person holding the office of town clerk and town treasurer in the Town of Lind be appointed by the town board?”

Explanation

“Yes” vote would mean the combined office of the Town Clerk/Treasurer will be appointed by the Town Board. Would no longer be an elected position.
“No” vote would mean the office of the Town Clerk/Treasurer will be an elected position.

Referendum Election Details

At an election to be held in the School District of Waupaca on November 8, 2022, the following proposed Initial Resolution of the School Board will be submitted to a vote of the people:

INITIAL RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING
GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS IN AN
AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$3,875,000

BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of the School District of Waupaca, Waupaca, Portage and Waushara Counties, Wisconsin that there shall be issued pursuant to Chapter 67 of the Wisconsin Statutes, general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$3,875,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of district-wide safety and security upgrades, including point of entry secure entrances and related equipment, building infrastructure improvements and capital maintenance.

Ballot Text: The question will appear on the ballot as follows:

"Shall the School District of Waupaca, Waupaca, Portage and Waushara Counties, Wisconsin be authorized to issue pursuant to Chapter 67 of the Wisconsin Statutes, general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$3,875,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of district-wide safety and security upgrades, including point of entry secure entrances and related equipment, building infrastructure improvements and capital maintenance?"

Explanation

The referendum election ballot will ask District electors to vote "yes" or "no" on the referendum election question as set forth above.

A "yes" vote on the question is a vote to approve the borrowing of \$3,875,000 by the School District of Waupaca through the issuance of general

obligation bonds for the purpose of paying the cost of district-wide safety and security upgrades, including point of entry secure entrances and related equipment, building infrastructure improvements and capital maintenance.

A "no" vote on the question is a vote to deny the School District of Waupaca the authority to borrow \$3,875,000 through the issuance of general obligation bonds for the purpose of paying the cost of district-wide safety and security upgrades, including point of entry secure entrances and related equipment, building infrastructure improvements and capital maintenance.

In the event a majority of the electors voting on the question vote "yes", the District will be authorized to undertake the school improvement program described in the question and borrow not in excess of \$3,875,000 therefor; if a majority vote "no" on the question set forth above, the District will not be so authorized.

RESOLUTION NO. : 20—2022-23
TO THE HONORABLE, THE OUTAGAMIE COUNTY
BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
LADIES AND GENTLEMAN: MAJORITY

There are numerous indicators that the citizens of Outagamie County are concerned about clean drinking water and clean lakes due to the health of its people and the economic impact on its people and industries. The Outagamie County Land Conservation Department is directly involved in local and regional discussions focusing on surface water and ground water issues.

Wis. Stat. § 59.52(25) allows for a county board to conduct a county-wide referendum for advisory purposes. A county-wide advisory referendum on the issue of clean water would provide guidance as to the will of the Outagamie County electorate on this issue. This resolution seeks authorization to conduct a county-wide advisory referendum.

NOW THEREFORE, the undersigned members of the Agriculture, Extension Education, Zoning & Land Conservation Committee recommend adoption of the following resolution.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Outagamie County Board of Supervisors does approve that the following question be placed on the November 8, 2022 General Election ballot as an advisory referendum: *Question: Should the State of Wisconsin establish a right to clean water to protect human health, the environment , and the diverse cultural and natural heritage of Wisconsin?* and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Outagamie County Corporation Counsel shall prepare a Notice of Referendum to be published by the Outagamie County Clerk in accordance with statutory requirements, and

BE IT STILL FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution and the referendum question shall be filed with the Outagamie County Clerk no later that 70 days prior to the November 8, 2022 election at which the question will appear on the ballot, and

BE IT STILL FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Outagamie County Clerk is directed to send results of the referendum to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, the Wisconsin Counties Association, and the Outagamie County Lobbyist for distribution to local members of the State Legislature, and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Outagamie County Clerk be directed to forward a copy of this resolution to the Outagamie County Corporation Counsel, the Outagamie County Lobbyist.
