Lord God, may we, your people, who look forward to the birthday of Christ experience the joy of salvation and celebrate that feast with love and thanksgiving. We ask this through Christ our Lord. ~AMEN.

Fourth Week

Father, all-powerful God, your eternal Word took flesh on our earth when the Virgin Mary placed her life at the service of your plan. Lift our minds in watchful hope to hear the voice which announces his glory and open our minds to receive the Spirit who prepares us for his coming. We ask this through Christ our Lord. ~AMEN. Advent, the four-week period of preparation for the season of Christ, begins the cycle of the Liturgical Year and focuses on the coming of the Lord. The first weeks offer a vision of the future, looking to the end of time when Christ will come again. The final weeks point more specifically to the birth of Jesus Christ. Christ the promised one, is awaited with joyful expectation.

To mark this new liturgical year and the change in seasons, you will see vestments and liturgical spaces turn from green to vio-

let, you will see the addition of the Advent wreath to the sanctuary, and the music takes on a more solemn tone.

Because Advent can be seen as a time of fasting in preparation for the great feast of Christmas, the Gloria is omitted during Advent. On Christmas Eve, we are reminded that the first words of the Gloria came from the Angels as they sang it to the Shepherds to announce the birth of Jesus Christ. We will sing the Gloria in a tremendous feast of Christmas joy at Christmas Eve.

The Incarnation

15 He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation: 16 for by Him all things were created, both in the heavens and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones, or dominions, or rulers, or authorities—all things have been created through Him and for Him. – Colossians 1:15-16

The Church has a wide range of people and approaches to understanding and relating to God. These many spirituality types have a long history in



the Church. Various spiritualities (Jesuit, Augustinian, Dominican, Carmelite, etc) have central themes that run through their approach to the Trinity. Franciscan Spirituality is Christocentric, meaning all of creation is fashioned after, for, and infused with Christ. The reading above from Colossians drives this point home.

The Incarnation, which literally means "to take on flesh", is often times viewed from the position of God becoming man in the person of Jesus to die on the cross in atonement for our sins. How this is action saves us can be very difficult to understand. Regardless of how we understand that aspect of the crucifixion, we acknowledge that this act of love is our redemption.

This viewpoint is a central part of our understanding of the Incarnation. Franciscan Spirituality, being Christocentric, doesn't negate this but goes a step further and says that sin doesn't dictate the actions of God. Rather, God would've become man in the person of Jesus out of love, regardless of the presence of sin in the world. In other words God loves us so much that He wants to be with us, physically, so He entered into the world to be with us. Sin was not the motivation for the Incarnation, love was. Jesus dying on the cross was just another opportunity for God to show us the depths of His love, God writing straight with the crooked lines of sin if you will. The Incarnation was always in the plan even at the moment of creation.

God continues to be present with us today throughout creation, as the Catechism reminds us, especially at Mass in the Eucharist, the Word as it's proclaimed, the presider, and the people congregating to pray the Liturgy. Scripture tells us that wherever two or more are gathered in His name, He is present also. It was not simply enough for God to create all we have and then watch from afar, He has to be with us physically and intimately and for all times. The more we make ourselves available to His presence with us, the more our eyes are opened to see this reality.

Recent polls have shown that people are feeling more and more isolated and disconnected, this was evident even prior to the pandemic. Now with virtual meetings, continued social distancing, livestreams taking the place of physical gatherings, and in many cases forgoing family gatherings or special events and holidays out of safety, depression and suicide are on the rise. Social Media is a cheap, no strings attached way to interact with people in a non-intimate, non-physical way but it comes with a price.

Genesis tells us that in the beginning God said "let US create man in OUR image", a Community creating community for community, in the flesh and from the flesh. Jesus is the Incarnation and we are incarnational. As we enter this special holiday season and celebrate Christ coming among is in the flesh, take some time to reflect on how we, despite our current challenges, can be more incarnational.
