Grants Have Made Great Things Happen

Recently, as you come up the driveway into the Haldeman Mansion grounds, the first thing you are likely to notice is the Mansion's slate roof with lightning rods which replaced the temporary roof that was not attractive and near the end of its useful life. The second thing you notice is the cedar shake roof on the Summer Kitchen and, if you look carefully, you will notice restoration of crumbling mortar along portions of the Mansion's walls at ground level. If you drive up to the Mansion you will see plywood covering the windows which may bring back memories of how it looked like many years ago. Do not be concerned. Come back this summer and you will see restored sashes in these windows. The total cost of the two projects that have been completed is close to \$110,000. A major source of funds for these two projects was the 2016 and 2017 Lancaster County Community Foundation John J. Snyder Jr. grants of \$25,000 for roof work on the Mansion and \$32,787 for replacement of the roof on the Summer Kitchen and Mansion masonry

restoration. We have received a 2018 Lancaster County Community Fund John J. Snyder Jr. grant for \$31,860 for the window restoration work that is currently under way. Without the funds from the Lancaster County Community Foundation, the Mansion would not look as great as it does today, and we would not be ready to move forward with major interior work.

Less visible, but no less significant, are the matching grants we received for the Lancaster County Conservancy Riverlands Mini-Grant Program which enables us to prepare documentation for the creation of a Locust Grove Archaeological District, to surveying the Mansion Property and carry out Conservation Landscape Archeological and Signage work, all of which totaled \$9,250. We also received matching grants from the National Trust for Historic Preservation of \$4,750 for an Economic Feasibility Study and \$3.000 for a Landscaping Master Plan and \$5,000 from the Lancaster County Community Foundation to match the National Trust for Historic Preservation grant for the Economic Feasibility Study.

Currently we are working on getting grant funds which would enable us to begin the long-awaited work on the first floor of the Mansion which would provide us with space available for year- around use and a climate-controlled environment for artifacts we would like to have on display.

Again, we say thank you to the Lancaster County Community Foundation, Lancaster County Conservancy, National Trust for Historic Preservation and to all of you who have supported us with your memberships, donations, attendance at our events and built the sustainable base that future grants can build on and have built.

Did You Know George Washington Slept at Locust Grove?

Today, if you visit the beautiful, historic Haldeman Mansion at Locust Grove, just south of Bainbridge, PA, you can see the rope bed and straw tick mattress George Washington slept on, stored on the second floor of the mansion's Summer Kitchen. On the first floor you can see the original fireplace, where a breakfast of hoe cakes and honey was prepared for him on July 10, 1755.

The story begins at the Battle of the Monongahela on July 9, 1755 during the French & Indian War. In the savage battle, Washington had two horses shot out from underneath him, his coat was pierced by four musket balls and he lost his wooden teeth. In full retreat, he found himself riding double with Lieutenant Colonel Patrick Work, second in command of the Pennsylvania Regiment's Third Battalion, owner of the Haldeman Mansion. Washington, now toothless, learned from Patrick that his neighbor,

Conoy Chief Old Sack, was a master wood carver whose renown echoed throughout the Eastern Woodlands.

At full gallop, they reached Locust Grove just before midnight. Old Sack was pressed into action immediately and Washington retired for the evening dreaming of hoe cakes and cherry pie. After rising, standing on the Haldeman Mansion's columned porch, overlooking the mist shrouded, broad Susquehanna River (new wooden teeth inserted), he is said to have vowed, one day, when he became the first President of the United States, he would build such a beautiful mansion overlooking his beloved Potomac River.

Locust Grove Archeological District

Readers may recall this project was funded by a Susquehanna Riverlands Mini-Grant (\$2,500) provided by the Lancaster County Conservancy. Required matching funds were donated by our loyal supporters thru the Lancaster County Community Foundation's 2016 Extraordinary Give Campaign.

The funds were used to hire a professional archaeologist to research and prepare the District proposal for submission to the Pennsylvania Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) in Harrisburg. As proposed, the District incorporates five archaeological sites on and nearby the Mansion's Locust Grove property. The sites chronicle Native American settlement in the Lower Susquehanna River Basin from c1250-1743 encompassing Shenks Ferry, Luray, Susquehannock and Conoy peoples' occupation.

The proposal was reviewed and approved by the Pennsylvania Historic Preservation Board on October 4, 2018. The Board forwarded the proposal to the National Park Service (NPS) in Washington, DC on December 11th. The Board decided to forward the proposal as it was written. They recommended the District be accepted at the national level of significance. In late February, we were notified NPS was returning the proposal with some suggested revisions. We are now waiting for SHPO to react to NPS's request.

Interestingly, the lone archaeologist on the Board has suggested the proposed District could be worthy of National Historic Landmark (NHL) Status. His suggestion, mirrored by several other senior archaeologists, is based, in part, on the District's encompassing the Lower Susquehanna's Native American Heritage from one of the first agricultural settlements to the refugee period.



New Artifacts Display

Last year masonry work was carried out around the Mansion's foundation. Because of the Native American history of the property, we were required to have an archaeologist present. Present from Millersville University were archaeologists Curtis Hosey and Meg Edwards. They identified some interesting items, but nothing too significant.

We are grateful to Curtis and Meg for the items uncovered and now they are beautifully displayed. This new display and an accompanying catalog can be seen at the Haldeman Mansion. Make sure to stop in at a schedule open house this summer or during one of our many events throughout the year and check it out!
