Sermon for Advent Sunday: Mark 13:24 - 37- Rev Peter Hughes

Jesus says "Be on guard! Be alert!" (verse 33)

In recent months we have all been encouraged to "be alert" in several ways. We need to be alert to the dangers of Corona Virus, ensuring we protect ourselves where possible. In October we were told that the threat of a terrorist attack in the UK became more likely and that we needed to be alert. Today in our Gospel Reading Jesus tells us to be alert to the signs of his coming.

The word alert has a range of meanings – watchful, aware, observant, awake.

The call to be alert is one of the themes of advent – especially Advent Sunday. We need to be aware, observant, awake to what God is doing, or about to do. We need to be watching and waiting as well as working and preparing.

What is God about to do? God is coming to us – another Advent theme. God has always come to human beings – He came to walk with Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, He came to make promises to Abraham Isaac and Jacob. God came and led his people across the Red Sea. At certain points God came particularly close to individual people – as the mysterious priest who brought gifts to Abraham, speaking with Moses on the mountain as he gave the law, passing near to Elijah speaking in a still small voice of calm.

The Old Testament Prophets proclaimed that God would soon be coming in a new way, the Messiah, a descendant of King David but so much more. The words of judgment which the prophets often spoke were a preparation for God to do a new thing. God sent John the Baptist to prepare the way when the time had come. During Advent we recall the many promises that led to the coming of Jesus as a baby. As promised, God came in person; in the birth of his Son who had existed before time began. Jesus promised that after he had died, risen and ascended he would one day come again in glory. The call to be alert is the call to be ready to welcome Jesus as judge and King.

Have the events of this last year caused us to be alert – not just to corona virus and terrorism but to the coming Lord Jesus? Maybe God wants to use the difficult events of the last few months to alert us to our deepest need, our greatest hope. Even on that wonderful day when we can leave our homes, our bubbles and our social distancing - there will be more to hope for. It's not just the end of Corona Virus for which we long – it's the coming of Jesus! May this Advent season awaken us once again to Jesus – God coming to us.

The reading from Mark's Gospel was part of a longer conversation between Jesus and the disciples. Looking at the magnificent Jerusalem Temple, Jesus warns his followers that these seemingly permanent fixtures won't last for ever. One day they will come tumbling down – and they did, less than 40 years after Jesus spoke these words. But Jesus goes on to talk about events even further into the future – events that will lead to His return in glory. We can see there is a change of perspective as Jesus says "in those days, **following** that distress". Jesus uses dramatic language:

"the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light; the stars will fall from the sky, and the heavenly bodies will be shaken." (verses 24 & 25)

This shows that the coming of Jesus is a cosmic event – far more important even than the destruction of sacred temple buildings. The return of Jesus will lead to the creation of a new heaven and a new earth.

The return of Jesus will be even better than the end of Covid 19.

As Christians we also have an ultimate hope beyond all the things that threaten life on earth. Jesus shows us what that hope is:

At that time people will see the Son of Man coming in clouds with great power and glory" (verse 26).

The hope is in a person – Jesus. Wonderfully, we have a part in that coming glory: "he will send his angels and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of the heavens" (verse 27).

Advent encourages us to think about how we can prepare for these events. Jesus gave his disciples the guidance which they and we need.

Many Christians have become preoccupied with the signs of the second coming. Plotting events in world history, the changes in fortune and geography of the Jewish nation, or in the movement of stars, asteroids or other heavenly bodies, they have pointed to a particular time or date. Jesus is clear when he tells the disciples: "about that day or hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father" (verse 32).

Being alert does not mean spending time combining different parts of the Bible and coming up with a date. If, for example, someone worked out that Jesus was returning on 25th January 2025 that would imply that for the next couple of years we wouldn't need to be quite so watchful and alert. I believe that throughout history and to this day there are signs that the end is near. We don't know the date. It could be tomorrow or it could be in another 1,000 years' time. Because we don't know when Jesus will return, we **always** have to be alert. It is part of the Christian way of life for all times. Jesus shows how we can be ready:

1. Being faithful to our calling:

"it's like a man going away: he leaves his house and puts his servants in charge, each with their assigned task" (verse 34).

Jesus has entrusted his mission to us – he's left us in charge for now. Each one of us in our different ways have a calling within the community, our family, the Church. Jesus challenges us to be faithful and responsible in these things. The best way of being ready is to be faithful to our calling.

That calling will be different for each of us. Jesus talks specifically the calling of the person placed on the door to keep watch. Ministers and leaders in the Church are particularly called to keep watch, looking out for dangers and challenges – awakening the Church when it is getting sleepy.

2. Being attentive to each other:

"What I say to you, I say to everyone" (verse 37)

Jesus's teaching about these things is not whispered in the ears of a chosen few. He wasn't setting up a cult so that those who knew the secrets could head for the hills, waiting for salvation while everyone gets left behind. Jesus says he is telling the disciples and everyone else as well. No one has a monopoly on the truth. Sharing in fellowship, listening to and encouraging each other is an important way of being ready. Although we have to do this in a different way at the moment, we must not give up the habit of meeting together for spiritual conversation and prayer. We need to remind each other of important things, asking each other how we are doing in our spiritual lives.

3. Being awake to God's word:

"Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away" (verse 31)

As we regularly read, hear, study and meditate on God's word that we are made ready to meet Jesus. Soaking ourselves in Scripture opens our spiritual ears to what God wants to say to us each day. We receive amazing encouragement from the Bible, even those parts that are heavy going. Every part of the Bible has things to teach us. I heard something recently which took me aback. A Christian teacher said that in heaven we won't need the Bible! That made me feel sad, because I love the Bible. As I thought about it more, I realised the person was correct. In heaven we will be able to hear God speaking directly to us – face to face, so we won't need to look in a book. However, the truth of this text remains – the words of Jesus will never pass away – it will just be the method of hearing them that will change. In heaven we will sit at Jesus's feet, just as the disciples did during his ministry.

In the frightening and challenging changes of life on earth, it is wonderful to know that the words of Jesus remain true, reliable and constant. The application of the Bible does change, but in every age we can rely on God's word which we find there.

When I was at teacher training college – in what is now Hope University – I was in a tutor group which focused on teaching practice. Our tutor used to ask us every week "are you poised, are you ready". He wanted to be sure that we had our lesson plans, resources, strategies in place for the next time we would stand in front of a class of children. I have to confess that despite my preparation, I sometimes felt far from ready! We have the Holy Spirit to help us to be ready for the return of Jesus. I ask you as I ask myself: "are you poised, are you ready". May the Spirit bless us as we strive to be watchful, aware, observant, awake this Advent. Jesus says "Be on guard! Be alert!" Amen
