
in two runs with a double and three singles.

A few special holidays in May & June – We hope all of you had a wonderful Memorial Day and/or weekend, and were able to once again enjoy festivities with family & friends. We all have our traditions when it comes to celebrating holidays. For Memorial Day, traditionally known as Decoration Day, it is a day that commemorates all men and women who have died, and paid the ultimate price, while serving in the military for the United States of America. One tradition of this holiday is the laying of a wreath at a grave or memorial and it is understood in almost every culture around the world.

Memorial Day was originally referred to as Decoration Day because of the tradition of decorating graves with wreaths, flowers & flags. The first widely observed Decoration Day happened May 30, 1868, as a way to commemorate the sacrifice of Civil War soldiers. During that first observance, Ohio Congressman, James Garfield, made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery. Afterward, 5,000 people helped to decorate the graves of more than 20,000 Union & Confederate soldiers. In the three years after the Civil War, that first celebration inspired other celebrations to take place in towns throughout America. In 1873, New York became the first state to designate Memorial Day as a legal holiday, and many states followed thereafter. The holiday became widely established after WWI.

Father's Day is June 20th and we certainly hope that all Dads out there will have a special Father's Day with family & friends!

AND, for some fun, did you know that June 23rd is National Pink Flamingo Day in the United States!?! Rather than celebrate the large wading birds, this day recognizes the pink lawn ornament that was sculpted in plastic by Don Featherstone in 1957 for Union Products of Leominster, Massachusetts! The day was established in 2007 for the 50th anniversary of that iconic lawn decoration, bringing summer fun for some folks and tackiness to others. Real flamingos finally got their own day in 2020 when the Flamingo Specialist Group presented the first International Flamingo Day on April 26th. This group is a "global network" of scientists & non-scientists concerned with the study, monitoring, management & conservation of the world's six flamingo species populations.
