Review of butterfly, moth and other natural history sightings 2021



January

After a cold and generally settled start to the year it gradually turned milder and more unsettled during the second week and it was often very wet in the third week, with storms on the night of the 20th. It then turned colder for a few days before there was a milder and wet end to the month.

Three species of micro moth were recorded although only one was an adult: *Epiphyas postvittana* (Light Brown Apple Moth) at Seabrook on the 27th, whilst the others were early stages: a *Cacoecimorpha pronubana* (Carnation Tortrix) larva at Seabrook and *Phyllonorycter leucographella* (Firethorn Leaf-miner) mines at Hythe on the 17th.

The nine species of macro that were recorded were typical of the early season with a Double-striped Pug found indoors at Saltwood on the 2nd and the others were trapped at Seabrook: Mottled Umber on the 6th, Winter Moth on the 11th, the Chestnut on the 13th, the Satellite on the 15th, Dark Chestnut on the 18th, Spring Usher on the 27th, Pale Brindled Beauty on the 29th and Early Moth on the 31st.

Mammal sightings included several Grey and Common Seals, and Harbour Porpoises seen offshore and several Brown Hares in the Donkey Street/Willop Basin area.

February

There was a mild start to the month but from the 6th it became steadily colder, with bitter easterly winds, freezing daytime temperatures and some significant snowfall. The latter half of the month was considerably milder, and it also became more settled as time went on.

Ten species of micro moth were added to the year list, with *Psyche casta* (Common Bag-worm) larva and *Acleris sparsana* (Ashy Button) at Saltwood, and *Agonopterix alstromeriana* (Brown-spot Flat-body) at Hythe on the 21st, *Tortricodes alternella* (Winter Shade) at Saltwood on the 22nd, and *Diurnea fagella* (March Tubic) at Seabrook on the 27th being the most noteworthy. There were also ten additions to the macro moth year list, with the most notable being Dotted Border at Seabrook on the 5th, March Moth at Saltwood on the 21st, Red Chestnut at Seabrook on the 24th, Tawny Pinion at Seabrook and Bloxworth Snout at Hythe on the 25th and Small Brindled Beauty at Seabrook on the 28th.

The first three butterfly species of the year were noted in February: Peacock at Seabrook and Small Tortoiseshell at Saltwood on the 20th and Brimstone at Samphire Hoe on the 26th.

A Common Seal was seen off Seabrook on the 1st and up to three Harbour Porpoises were noted from Folkestone Pier. Up to three Hares were present on the marsh and the first Common Pippistrelle of the year was seen at Seabrook on the 24th.

March

The first week of March was cool but mostly settled, followed by a more unsettled spell in the second week. It was mostly dry during the second half of the month and south-westerly winds dominated the last ten days, when temperatures gradually began to climb. There was a particularly mild end to the month, with temperatures approaching 22°C by day and 10°C overnight.

Just four species of micro moth were added to the year list: *Acleris literana* (Lichen Button) at Cheriton on the 15th, *Dahlica inconspicuella* (Lesser Lichen Bagworm) at Abbotscliffe on the 20th, Agonopterix scopariella (Broom Flatbody) at Saltwood on the 30th and *Plutella xylostella* (Diamond-back Moth) at Folks' Wood on the 31st.

The macro moth year list fared a little better with 23 additions, including the Herald at Folkestone on the 6th, Hummingbird Hawk-moth at Cheriton on the 14th, Water Carpet and Twin-spotted Quaker at West Hythe on the 17th, and Brindled Beauty at Seabrook, and Shoulder Stripe and the sixth area record of **Dotted Chestnut** at Aldergate Bridge on the 30th. The final night of the month produced Pale Pinion (and a further **Dotted Chestnut**) at Saltwood, Yellow Horned, Early Tooth-striped and the Streamer at Folks' Wood, Pine Beauty at Seabrook.

A further four butterfly species were noted in March: Comma at Seabrook on the 19th, Small Copper at Cheriton on the 25th, Small White at several sites on the 30th and Green-veined White at Seabrook on the 30th.

Several Harbour Porpoises were noted offshore and up to five Hares were present on the marsh.

April

April was particularly cold, dry and sunny and unusually the mean temperature was lower than March. Daytime temperatures did recover from the middle of the month but it remained cold overnight.

Only seven species of micro moth were added to the year list but these included the second area record of *Epichnopterix plumella* (Round-winged Bagworm). Sightings of four at Castle Hill on the 20th, two there on the 23rd and one at Folkestone Warren on the 27th though suggest that it is an under-recorded resident. Other additions of note were *Caloptilia falconipennella* (Scarce Alder Slender) at Seabrook on the 1st and *Digitivalva pulicariae* (Fleabane Smudge) there on the 19th.

There were just 13 additions to the macro moth year list, with Grey Shoulder-Knot and Powdered Quaker at Seabrook on the 3rd, Swallow Prominent and Least Black Arches there on the 14th, Common Heath at Cherry Garden Hill on the 18th, the Mullein at Seabrook on the 19th, Iron Prominent and Pale Prominent there on the 20th, Small Purple-barred at Folkestone Warren on the 27th, Lesser Swallow Prominent at Seabrook on the 28th and Pebble Prominent there on the 29th being the most noteworthy.

Eight species of butterfly were added to the year list, most from mid-month when daytime temperatures improved: Orange-tip at Botolph's Bridge on the 9th, Green Hairstreak at Cheriton Hill on the 15th, Speckled Wood at Round Hill on the 16th, Dingy Skipper at Folkestone Downs on the 17th, Large White at Seabrook on the 18th, Clouded Yellow at Samphire Hoe and Wall at Round Hill on the 24th, and Small Heath at Round Hill on the 27th. Further Clouded Yellows were noted at Folkestone Warren and Samphire Hoe (2) on the 27th.

An Italian Wall Lizard was noted at the colony at Little Switzerland in Folkestone Warren, up to four Harbour Porpoises continued to be seen offshore and several Hares were present on the marsh.

May

The first week of May was unsettled and unseasonably cold, after which it became a little milder but due to a series of deep low pressure systems the frequent, often heavy, rain continued and there were a number of particularly windy days. Conditions settled in the final few days of the month, when it also became warmer. Overall it was the coldest May for 25 years and the fifth wettest in 150 years.

Consequently it was a poor month for moths but there were still some interesting sightings, with the highlights being the first area record of *Dichrorampha sedatana* (Dingy Drill) at Abbotscliffe on the 29th, the second area record of *Ypsolopha mucronella* (Spindle Smudge) at Saltwood on the 13th (following one at Cheriton in April 2019) and the ninth area record of **Beautiful Marbled** at West Hythe on the 26th. This latter species has now been recorded in four consecutive years, following the first in 2018. Also of significant note was a Gypsy Moth larva reported at Cheriton on the 9th, the first local breeding record since the nineteenth century, although perhaps not unexpected after the record arrival last year.

Regular migrant species were scarce, with just one *Udea ferrugalis* (Rusty-dot Pearl) at Seabrook on the 9th, single Dark Sword-grasses at Saltwood on the 13th and 14th and a handful of Silver Ys and *Plutella xylostella* (Diamond-back Moths).

Just 36 further species of micro moth were added to the year list, 19 of those noted in the last week of the month, and included *Callisto denticulella* (Garden Apple Slender) at Seabrook on the 2nd, *Phtheochroa rugosana* (Roughwinged Conch) at Seabrook, *Ethmia bipunctella* (Bordered Ermel) at Hythe, and *Agonopterix ocellana* (Red-letter Flat-body) and *Acleris logiana* (Grey Birch Button) at Saltwood on the 10th, and *Agonopterix purpurea* (Small Purple Flat-body) at Hythe, and *Aethes smeathmanniana* (Yarrow Conch) at Nickolls Quarry and Seabrook on the 31st. Early stages included *Coleophora pennella* (Bugloss Case-bearer) at Abbotscliffe on the 11th and *Eriocrania sangii* (Large Birch Purple) at the American Garden on the 16th.

There were 79 further additions to the macro moth year list, with half of these occurring in the final week of May. Of note were Dew Moth at Abbotscliffe on the 1st, Toadflax Brocade at Seabrook on the 10th, Mother Shipton at Cherry Garden Hill on the 11th, Chocolate-tip at Saltwood on the 14th, Yellow Belle at Samphire Hoe on the 15th, Light Feathered Rustic at Hythe on the 16th, Puss Moth at Horn Street on the 22nd, Sallow Kitten at Seabrook on the 28th, the Four-spotted at Hythe Roughs on the 29th, Chamomile Shark at Seabrook and Grey Birch at Brockhill Country Park on the 30th and the Seraphim and Obscure Wainscot at Nickolls Quarry on the 31st.

There was a marked arrival of Painted Ladies from the 9th, when the first was noted at Botolph's Bridge, and "literally hundreds" were reported at Abbotscliffe on the 11th.

A further seven butterfly species were added to the year list: Common Blue at Cherry Garden Hill on the 6th, Red Admiral at Hythe on the 7th, Holly Blue at Hythe on the 9th, Brown Argus at Cherry Garden Hill on the 11th, Adonis Blue at Round Hill on the 13th and Small Blue at Samphire Hoe and Meadow Brown at Seabrook on the 18th.

June

The first half of the month was predominantly warm and dry, especially at the start, but it became less settled during the second half, with fluctuating temperatures and numerous episodes of rain or heavy showers, some of these thundery. Overall the rainfall total was more than double the mean for June.

June produced five further additions to the area moth list, with three *Eulia ministrana* (Brassy Tortrix) at Heane Wood on the 1st and another at Saltwood the following night, a **Flame Wainscot** at Samphire Hoe on the 3rd, a *Crassa tinctella* (Tinted Tubic) and a *Monochroa tenebrella* (Common Plain Neb) at Heane Wood on the 9th and a *Pammene suspectana* (Ash-bark Piercer) at West Hythe on the 15th.

Also of particular note were the first modern area records of **Scarce Merveille du Jour** trapped at Folkestone on the 15th and **Currant Clearwing** found on the food-plant by day in a garden in Cheriton on the 26th, whilst a *Glyphipterix thrasonella* (Speckled Fanner) at Seabrook on the 28th was only the third area record.

A **Beautiful Marbled** at Folkestone Warren on the 10th was the tenth area record (following one in May and four last year) and single **Portland Ribbon Waves** at Folkestone Warren on the same night and at Seabrook on the 15th were the 10th and 11th area records (following four last year), raising hopes that these species might be close to becoming established locally. A species that seems very likely to be breeding locally now is **Pale-shouldered Cloud**, with one at Seabrook on the 28th following nine sightings across the area last year (although there are still only 31 British records).

Following the Lace Border record from the grazing area at Folkestone Warren last year, one was seen there by day on the 3rd June, with at least two trapped on the 10th June. Cryptic Ferns were noted at West Hythe on the 9th, Folkestone Warren on the 10th and Hythe on the 16th, but only one Fern was trapped (at the Warren on the 10th).

Regular immigrant species included a single *Palpita vitrealis* (Olive-tree Pearl) at Seabrook on the 2nd, 2 Hummingbird Hawk-moths at Abbotscliffe on the 26th, four Dark Sword-grass, six Delicates, 11 *Udea ferrugalis* (Rusty-dot Pearls), 87 Silver Ys and 273 *Plutella xylostella* (Diamond-back Moths).

A further 154 micro species of micro moth were added to the year list, with the more noteworthy comprising *Cryptoblabes bistriga* (Double-striped Knot-horn) at Heane Wood and *Ancylis laetana* (Aspen Roller), *Cydia strobilella* (Spruce-seed Moth) and *Platyptilia gonodactyla* (Triangle Plume) at Nickolls Quarry on the 1st, *Bedellia somnulentella* (Bindweed Bent-wing) at Seabrook on the 4th, *Agrotera nemoralis* (Beautiful Pearl) at Kiln Wood on the 6th, *Triaxomera fulvimitrella* (Four-spotted Clothes Moth) at Heane Wood on the 9th, *Agonopterix pallorella* (Pale Flatbody) and *Epinotia subocellana* (White Sallow Bell) at Folkestone Warren on the 10th, *Evergestis extimalis* (Marbled Yellow Pearl) at Seabrook on the 11th, *Anania perlucidalis* (Fenland Pearl) at Nickolls Quarry on the 12th, *Achroia grisella* (Lesser Wax Moth) at Seabrook and *Olindia schumacherana* (White-barred Twist) and *Pammene albuginana* (Blotched Piercer) at Brockhill Country Park on the 14th and *Elegia similella* (White-barred Knot-horn) at Seabrook and *Dichrorampha sequana* (Square-spot Drill) at Botolph's Bridge on the 15th.

The second half of the month produced *Elachista gangabella* (Yellow-barred Dwarf) at Seabrook on the 16th, *Parectopa ononidis* (Clover Slender) at Samphire Hoe on the 19th, *Morophaga choragella* (Large Clothes Moth) at Seabrook on the 23rd, *Piniphila bifasciana* (Pine Marble) at Hythe on the 24th, *Agapeta zoegana* (Knapweed Conch) at Hythe on the 26th, *Elachista freyerella* (Broken-barred Dwarf) at Seabrook on the 27th, *Cydalima perspectalis* (Boxtree Moth) at Hythe on the 28th and *Capperia britanniodactylus* (Wood Sage Plume) at Seabrook on the 29th.

A further 134 species were added to the macro moth year list including Dingy Shell, Dusky Hook-tip, Tawny-barred Angle and Birch Mocha at Saltwood on the 1st, Ghost Moth and Lunar Thorn at Seabrook, Alder Moth at Saltwood and Cream-spot Tiger and White Spot at Samphire Hoe on the 2nd, Channel Islands Pug at Seabrook on the 3rd, Clouded Buff at Castle Hill on the 7th, Netted Pug at Cheriton on the 8th, Large Nutmeg at West Hythe and Barred Red and Red-necked Footman at Heane Wood on the 9th, Galium Carpet, Broken-barred Carpet and Buttoned Snout at Folkestone Warren, Clancy's Rustic at Hythe and Small Clouded Brindle at Seabrook on the 10th, Cream Wave at Samphire Hoe and Lesser Cream Wave at Seabrook on the 12th, Beautiful Golden Y at Seabrook and Small Yellow Wave, Brindled White-spot, Lobster Moth and Marbled Brown at Brockhill Country Park on the 14th, Orange-tailed Clearwing at Seabrook on the 15th, Fiery Clearwing at Folkestone Warren on the 16th and Bordered White at Seabrook on the 26th.

Just four butterfly species were added to the year list: Large Skipper at Hythe Roughs on the 13th, the Ringlet at Brockhill Country Park on the 17th, Marbled White at Folkestone Downs on the 23rd and Small Skipper at Folkestone Downs on the 24th Jun.

Other records of note involved what appears to be only the second vice-county record of Bog Bush-cricket at Samphire Hoe on the 20th and a sighting of the recent colonist *Agapanthia cardui* (a long-horn beetle first noted in Britain at Folkestone in 2017) at Thorn Wood on the 19th.

The unsettled weather continued into July with unseasonably cool temperatures and frequent spells of rain, many of which were heavy and thundery. However it became much warmer by mid-month, with drier and sunnier conditions, before it became unsettled again during the final week.

Highlights in July included two **Blastobasis rebeli** (Marsh Dowd) at Folkestone Warren on the 2nd (the third and fourth area, and vice-county records, but with a further six trapped there on the 18th suggesting that it is now established), a **Rosy Marbled** at Samphire Hoe on the 3rd (the third area record, following the first two last year), a **Monopis imella** (Felt Clothes Moth) at Hythe Ranges on the 19th (the third area record, following singles at Folkestone Warren in 1976 and Saltwood in 2014), a **Double Kidney** at Hythe on the 28th (the third area record, following the second at Seabrook in July last year), a **Splendid Brocade** at Seabrook on the 18th (the fifth area record and the first since 2017) and a **Tebenna micalis** (Vagrant Twitcher) at Hythe Ranges on the 19th (the fifth area, and seventh modern county, following singles at Hythe and Saltwood in 2014, one at Hythe in 2015 and one at Folkestone Warren last year).

The first modern area records of **Red-tipped Clearwing** at Sellindge on the 18th and **Broom-tip** at Seabrook on the 21st were also of considerable note, as were the second **Pale-shouldered Cloud** of the year (at Hythe Ranges on the 19th) and an **Acrobasis tumidana** (Scarce Oak Knot-horn) at Hythe on the 26th.

Regular migrants included a Palpita vitrealis (Olive-tree Pearl) at Saltwood on the 12th, a Hummingbird Hawk-moth at Stanford North on the 23rd, the first Gems of the year at Hythe on the 8th and Seabrook on the 9th and 27th, and single Delicates at Hythe Ranges, Hythe, Seabrook and Folkestone Warren. Totals of 11 Dark Sword-grass, 25 *Udea ferrugalis* (Rusty-dot Pearl), 215 *Plutella xylostella* (Diamond-back Moth) and 435 Silver Y were also logged.

A further 141 species were added to the micro moth year list including *Agonopterix liturosa* (Large Purple Flat-body), *Agonopterix angelicella* (Angelica Flat-body), *Thiotricha subocellea* (Eyelet Sober), *Cochylimorpha alternana* (Kentish Conch) and *Cynaeda dentalis* (Starry Pearl) at Folkestone Warren on the 2nd, *Coleophora galbulipennella* (Kent Casebearer) at Hythe and *Carpatolechia fugitivella* (Elm Groundling) at Saltwood on the 8th, *Grapholita funebrana* (Plum Fruit Moth) and *Dolicharthria punctalis* (Long-legged China-mark) at Hythe and *Bisigna procerella* (Kent Tubic) at Seabrook on the 9th, *Catoptria verellus* (Marbled Grass-veneer) at Aldergate Bridge on the 10th, *Anarsia spartiella* (Small Crest) at Seabrook on the 11th, *Acrolepiopsis assectella* (Leek Moth) at Saltwood and *Dichrorampha senectana* (Dark Drill) *Stenoptilia zophodactylus* and (Dowdy Plume) at Samphire Hoe on the 13th, *Batia lambdella* (New Tawny Tubic) at Seabrook and *Dichomeris marginella* (Juniper Webber) at Saltwood on the 14th and *Acrocercops brongniardella* (Brown Oak Slender) at Hythe on the 15th.

The second half of the month produced *Stathmopoda pedella* (Alder Signal) at Hythe and *Cnaemidophorus rhododactyla* (Rose Plume), *Moitrelia obductella* (Kent Knot-horn), *Pempeliella ornatella* (Ornate Knot-horn) and *Delplanqueia inscriptella* (Brown Powdered Knot-horn) at Folkestone Warren on the 18th, *Parachronistis albiceps* (Wood Groundling) and *Anarsia innoxiella* (Acer Sober) at Seabrook and *Gynnidomorpha alismana* (Water-plantain Conch), *Neofriseria peliella* (White-spot Groundling), *Caryocolum vicinella* (Coast Groundling), *Acleris umbrana* (Darkstreaked Button), *Aethes dilucidana* (Short-barred Yellow Conch) and *Anerastia lotella* (Sandhill Knot-horn) at Hythe Ranges on the 19th, *Scoparia basistrigalis* (Base-lined Grey) at Seabrook and *Argyresthia retinella* (Netted Argent) at Hythe on the 21st, *Epinotia cinereana* (Grey Aspen Bell) at Cheriton on the 22nd and Rhyacionia buoliana at Saltwood on the 28th. *Cydalima perspectalis* (Box Tree Moth) now appears to have become established with a total of 70 recorded.

A further 81 species were added to the macro moth year list including Plumed Fan-foot at Hythe on the 1st, Chalk Carpet and Orange Moth at Folkestone Warren on the 2nd, Small Ranunculus at Hythe on the 3rd, Sussex Emerald and Pigmy Footman at Hythe on the 8th, Four-spotted Footman at the Aldergate Bridge on the 10th, Slender Brindle at Seabrook on the 11th, the Blackneck at Hythe and Larch Pug at Saltwood on the 12th, Northern Rustic at Samphire Hoe on the 13th, Purple Clay at Seabrook, Yarrow Pug and the Suspected at Saltwood, and Tree-lichen Beauty at Hythe on the 14th.

The second half of the month produced Sub-angled Wave, Wood Carpet and Lilac Beauty at Folkestone Warren and Red-belted Clearwing at Sellindge on the 18th, Dark Umber at Cheriton and Grass Emerald at Hythe Ranges on the 19th, Large Emerald at Seabrook on the 25th, Bordered Beauty and Webb's Wainscot at Brockhill on the 26th, Large Twin-spot Carpet at Seabrook on the 27th and Straw Belle and the Annulet at Cheriton Hill on the 31st.

A Clouded Yellow flew east at Seabrook on the 16th and there were sightings at Folkestone Downs on several dates, with a peak of six on the 17th.

Six butterfly species were added to the year list: Silver-washed Fritillary and White Admiral at Folks' Wood on the 5th, Gatekeeper at Folkestone Warren on the 16th, White-letter Hairstreak and Essex Skipper at Folkestone Downs on the 20th and Chalk Hill Blue at Folkestone Warren on the 24th. Further sightings away from the traditional sites of White Admiral at Castle Hill on the 13th and Silver-washed Fritillary at Brockhill Country Park on the 19th were of particular note.

August

The first half of August was largely unsettled with wet and often windy conditions but the second half was drier and more settled. An anticyclone settled over the continent during the last week the month, introducing a north to north-easterly airflow and often cloudy conditions. Sunshine was rather limited and it was one of the dullest Augusts on record.

There were two new species for the area recorded in August: a *Caloptilia hemidactylella* (Sycamore Slender) at Seabrook on the 13^{th} (which was also the first county record) and a *Dasycera oliviella* (Scarce Forest Tubic) at Cheriton the 8^{th} .

Following the first area record at Seabrook last year, **Raspberry Clearwing** now appears to be established there with sightings on nine dates during the month, including an exceptional total of eight on the 25th.

Other highlights included the third area (and county) record of *Zelleria oleastrella* (Olive Ermel) at Seabrook on the 15th, the fifth area records of *Caloptilia honoratella* (Pale Maple Slender) at Hythe on the 15th and **Porter's Rustic** at Saltwood on the 22nd, and the sixth area record (following one in July) of *Tebenna micalis* (Vagrant Twitcher) at Seabrook on the 28th.

A **Beautiful Marbled** at Seabrook on the 24th was the 11th area record (following singles in May and June), a **Portland Ribbon Wave** at Folkestone Warren on the 28th was the 12th area record (following two in June). Following the sightings in June and July a further four **Pale-shouldered Clouds** were noted in August: at Cheriton on the 18th and at Hythe on three dates. Single **Acrobasis tumidana** (Scarce Oak Knot-horn) were taken at Hythe on the 22nd and 25th, and Seabrook on the 31st.

A Bordered Straw was trapped at Hythe on the 11th and a Latticed Heath was taken at Seabrook on the 24th, whilst there were totals of up to 51 Gypsy Moths and 59 *Cydia amplana* (Vagrant Piercer) recorded. Regular migrants included one Delicate, two Hummingbird Hawk-moths, three *Palpita vitrealis* (Olive-tree Pearl), four *Nomophila noctuella* (Rush Veneer), six Gems, seven Dark Sword-grass, 37 *Plutella xylostella* (Diamond-back Moth), 103 *Udea ferrugalis* (Rusty-dot Pearls) and over 150 Silver Ys.

Following a series of late summer records last year, a total of eight *Lobesia reliquana* (Oak Marble) were noted in August (three at Hythe and five at Seabrook). This species is considered as being univoltine in Britain (flying in May to June), so perhaps these originated from a second brood further south in Europe.

A further 40 species were added to the micro moth year list including *Agonopterix rotundella* (Rolling Carrot Flatbody) and *Merrifieldia baliodactylus* (Dingy White Plume) at Samphire Hoe on the 11th, *Plodia interpunctella* (Indian Meal Moth) at Folkestone on the 17th, *Caryocolum marmorea* (Beautiful Groundling) at Hythe on the 18th, *Calybites phasianipennella* (Little Slender) at Brockhill Country Park and *Ptocheuusa paupella* (Light Fleabane Neb), *Mirificarma mulinella* (Gorse Groundling) and *Clavigesta purdeyi* (Pine Leaf-mining Moth) at Seabrook on the 25th, *Bucculatirx albedinella* (Elm Bent-wing) and *Elachista canapennella* (Little Dwarf) at Seabrook on the 28th, *Bactra robustana* (Saltern Marble) at Seabrook on the 29th and *Celypha rufana* (Lakes Marble) at Seabrook on the 30th.

A further 29 species were added to the macro moth year list including Hoary Footman at Seabrook on the 1st, Yellowlegged Clearwing at Seabrook on the 3rd, Reed Dagger at Seabrook on the 10th, White-banded Carpet at Seabrook on the 15th, August Thorn at Seabrook on the 17th, Scalloped Hook-tip at Brockhill on the 25th, Flame Carpet and Lesserspotted Pinion at Seabrook and Small Scallop and Gold Spot at Aldergate Bridge on the 26th, and Red Underwing at Hythe on the 29th.

The only addition to the butterfly year list was a Silver-spotted Skipper seen at Cheriton Hill on the 12th but single Silver-washed Fritillaries at Folks' Wood and Seabrook on the 5th and at Folkestone Warren on the 23rd, Chalk Hill Blues at Cheriton Hill, Round Hill and Folkestone Warren on various dates and a peak count of seven Brimstones at Cherry Garden Hill on the 11th were also of note. Small numbers of Painted Ladies were noted at several localities.

September

Much of September was fine and settled, with dry, relatively warm conditions although it became markedly cooler and wetter from the 27th.

Two species of moth were added to the area list in September: a *Cnephasia pumicana* (Cereal Tortrix) at Seabrook on the 1st and a *Depressaria pulcherrimella* (Pignut Flatbody) there on the 8th.

Other notable sightings included the fourth and fifth modern records of **Clifden Nonpareil** at Saltwood on the 11th and the Aldergate Bridge on the 13th. This is the fourth consecutive year of occurrence (with others at Beachborough in 2018, Heane Wood in 2019 and Saltwood in 2020), raising hopes that it could be starting to become established locally as part of a pattern of apparent colonisation nationally.

The fifth area record of **Oak Lutestring** as trapped at Hythe on the 11th and was the third to be noted in successive years, whilst the sixth area record of **Caloptilia honoratella** (Pale Maple Slender) was at Seabrook on the 4th and the seventh area record (following singles in July and August) of **Tebenna micalis** (Vagrant Twitcher) was at the Aldergate Bridge on the 13th.

The sixth to ninth area records of **Porter's Rustic** were trapped at Seabrook on the 11th, Samphire Hoe on the 14th (two), Seabrook on the 17th and Folkestone Warren on the 18th (three), whilst the seventh and eight area records of **Dewick's Plusia** were taken at Seabrook on the 11th and Folkestone Warren on the 26th (two).

The ninth area record of **Radford's Flame Shoulder** was trapped at Seabrook on the 28th and followed one in 2019 and seven in 2020, suggesting that it could be becoming established locally. Other potential colonists included the 12th to 16th area records of **Beautiful Marbled** at Samphire Hoe on the 6th, 9th (three), 12th and 13th, and Hythe on the 21st (following singles in May, June and August) and the 13th to 20th area records of **Portland Ribbon Wave** at Hythe on the 4th, Hythe, Seabrook and Folkestone Warren (three) on the 6th, Samphire Hoe on the 9th, 14th and 17th, and Folkestone Warren on the 18th (following two in June and one in August).

There were single records of Pearly Underwing at Hythe on the 4th, the Vestal at Samphire Hoe on the 8th, Convolvulus Hawk-moth at Hythe on the 17th and the Gem at Hythe on the 20th, whilst Scarce Bordered Straws were trapped at Saltwood on the 10th, Samphire Hoe on the 14th and Hythe on the 14th (2), 18th (2), 19th and 20th. Following a good showing in August a further 16 *Cydia amplana* (Vagrant Piercer) and 25 Gypsy Moths were noted.

Regular migrants included three Hummingbird Hawk-moths, eight *Nomophila noctuella* (Rush Veneer), 14 *Plutella xylostella* (Diamond-back Moth), 11 Dark Sword-grass, 13 *Palpita vitrealis* (Olive-tree Pearl), 24 Delicates, 41 *Udea ferrugalis* (Rusty-dot Pearl) (including ten at Folkestone Warren on the 26th) and over 300 Silver Ys (including 34 at Seabrook and 46 at Hythe on the 7th).

A further 18 species were added to the micro moth year list including *Ancylis badiana* (Common Roller) at Cheriton on the 5th, *Phyllonorycter lantanella* (Viburnum Midget) at Seabrook and *Argyresthia bonnetella* (Hawthorn Argent), *Eulamprotes atrella* (Two-spotted Neb) and *Acleris emargana* (Notch Wing Tortrix) at Folkestone Warren on the 6th, *Argyresthia semifusca* (Brown Rowan Argent) at Seabrook on the 8th, *Catoptria falsella* (Chequered Grass-veneer) at Brockhill Country Park on the 9th, *Argyresthia semitestacella* (Large Beech Argent) at Saltwood on the 11th, *Ypsolopha parenthesella* (White-shouldered Smudge) at Seabrook on the 12th, *Acleris rhombana* (Rhomboid Tortrix) at Samphire Hoe on the 17th and *Ypsolopha sequella* (Pied Smudge) at Folkestone Warren on the 18th.

A further 16 species were added to the macro moth year list including Large Thorn at Folkestone on the 1st, Feathered Gothic at Hythe on the 3rd, Barred Hook-tip at Folkestone Warren and Brown-veined Wainscot at Aldergate Bridge on the 6th, Frosted Orange at Seabrook on the 8th, Brown-spot Pinion at Saltwood on the 9th, Feathered Brindle at Hythe on the 10th, Autumnal Rustic at Saltwood on the 11th, the Sallow at Saltwood on the 14th and Orange Sallow at Folkestone Warren on the 18th.

Clouded Yellows were noted at Hythe Ranges on the 5th and 12th, Seabrook on the 9th, Nickolls Quarry on the 11th and Beachborough Park on the 18th.

Also of note were a Western Conifer Seed Bug at Folkestone Warren on the 6th, a Dusky Longhorn Beetle at Seabrook on the 7th and a Southern Green Shieldbug at Seabrook on the 15th.

October

After an unsettled start to the month it became drier and milder between the 6th and 17th, before turning unsettled again and the last week saw some heavy and prolonged spells of rain.

Highlights in October included the first modern records of **September Thorn**, singles at Saltwood and Seabrook on the 1st October, and Saltwood on the 18th (having last been noted locally in 1946). The seventh to ninth area records of *Caloptilia honoratella* (Pale Maple Slender) were taken at Seabrook on the 13th and 24th, and Saltwood on the 30th. These followed singles in August and September and suggest that this species is now locally established.

There were 13 sightings of **Radford's Flame Shoulder**, following the ninth area record last month, with one at Saltwood, two at Hythe and ten at Seabrook, and five of Oak Rustic (one at Hythe, two at Saltwood and two at Seabrook), but no repeat of last year's record influx of Golden Twin-spot, with just a single record, at Hythe on the 7th October.

Regular migrants included a Convolvulus Hawk-moth at Seabrook on the 9th October, a Hummingbird Hawk-moth at Folkestone on the 8th October, a Pearly Underwing on the 18th October, four Scarce Bordered Straws, six *Nomophila noctuella* (Rush Veneer), seven Dark Sword-grass, nine Gems, 11 *Plutella xylostella* (Diamond-back Moth), 23 *Palpita vitrealis* (Olive-tree Pearl), 33 Silver Ys, an exceptional 67 Delicates (including a peak of six at Seabrook on the 18th) and 100 *Udea ferrugalis* (Rusty-dot Pearl) (including peaks of ten at Hythe on the 6th and Samphire Hoe on the 7th).

There were just two additions to the micro moth year list: an *Agonopterix propinquella* (Black-spot Flat-body) at Hythe on the 7th and mines of *Parornix fagivora* (Beech Slender) found at Brockhill Country Park on the 23rd.

There were 13 further additions to the macro moth year list: Barred Sallow at Saltwood on the 1st, Beaded Chestnut at Seabrook on the 1st, Dusky-lemon Sallow and Large Ranunculus at Saltwood on the 2nd, Blair's Shoulder-knot at Hythe, Merveille du Jour and the Mallow at Cheriton, Yellow-line Quaker at Seabrook on the 7th, Green-brindled Crescent at Hythe on the 8th, Red-green Carpet at Seabrook on the 10th, the Brick at Saltwood on the 13th and Red-line Quaker at Seabrook on the 18th and November Moth (agg.) at Brockhill Country Park on the 23rd.

There were four Clouded Yellows at Cherry Garden Hill on the 9th.

November

Most of November was mild and settled, with winds predominately from the westerly quarter, but the last week was colder and more unsettled.

Highlights in November included another **September Thorn** at Seabrook on the 1st (the second modern record) and **The Streak** there on the 6th (the fourth modern record).

There was a further record of **Radford's Flame Shoulder**, at Seabrook on the 16th, and four more Oak Rustics (at Seabrook on the 7th, Saltwood on the 13th, Hythe on the 18th and Seabrook on the 29th).

A late Scarce Bordered Straw was trapped at Seabrook on the 18th, whilst other migrants comprised one Nomophila noctuella (Rush Veneer), two Gems, three Delicates, nine Silver Ys, 15 *Plutella xylostella* (Diamond-back Moth), 20 *Palpita vitrealis* (Olive-tree Pearl) and 40 *Udea ferrugalis* (Rusty-dot Pearl)

The only other additions to the macro moth year list were a December Moth at Seabrook on the 2nd and the Sprawler at Cheriton on the 8th, whilst leaf-mines of *Ectoedemia erythrogenella* (Coast Bramble Pigmy) at Abbotscliffe on the 8th and an *Acleris ferrugana* (Rusty Oak Button) at Seabrook on the 14th were new for the micro year list.

A late Clouded Yellow was seen at Underhill, Horn Street on the 21st and a Noctule was noted at West Hythe on the 10th.

December

During the early part of the December it was unsettled and chilly, though towards the middle of the month it became more settled and milder. Unsettled conditions retuned around Christmas but the last few days of the year were again milder.

The only addition to the moth year lists in December was an *Acleris notana* (Rusty Birch Button) at Saltwood on the 19th December. A late *Udea ferrugalis* (Rusty-dot Pearl) was trapped at Hythe on the 15th December.
