Your COVID-19 FAQs

Question: How would a person receive the Last Rites if he/she were in danger of death from the Covid-19 virus? Would the priest be allowed to come to the hospital or home? Would this be an improper imposition on the priest since he would be put in danger by being exposed to the Covid-19 virus?

Answer: The Sacrament of anointing of the sick can and should be done if requested in a palliative situation. If a person is in a hospital or nursing home, they would also have to follow the procedures of those institutions. For instance, being on a contact list given by the patient. Regarding the second part of the question it is never inappropriate to ask for the sacraments. To minister to the people of God is literally the *raison d'être* of the priesthood. Priests should of course wear all the protective clothing of the facility. It might be wise however, not to request a specific priest, especially the elderly or immunocompromised.

In times of transition, if you are experiencing fear or insecurity, allow yourself to be vulnerable. Share your feeling with your spouse, and trust that it will be kept safe. 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time (A)

How many times should we forgive?

St Peter's question still initiates conversations: *Lord, how often should I forgive my brother or sister if they sin against me? As many as seven times?* In Jesus' era, the number seven meant completeness and achievement, but are there any limits?

Both St. Peter's question and Jesus' answer shed light on the practice of forgiveness and fraternal correction. Christ continued the conversation and related a series of scenarios involving people representing all classes in society and whether or not they forgave.

The words of Sirach found in the First Reading are familiar: *Anger and wrath, these are abominations, yet a sinner holds on to them... (Sir 27:30) Forgive your neighbor the wrong that is done, and then your sins will be pardoned when you pray... (Sir 28:7).* Concerning the number of times that one should forgive, what we can remember is a reference from Genesis about retribution as much as *seventy times seven* (Gen 4: 23-24). This number is mentioned in an ancient warrior ballad and is perhaps an early example of Hebrew poetry. In reference to this number, today's text reverses the vengeance aspect and instead applies it to forgiveness.

Whether dealing with the subject of vengeance as represented in either a ballad or a parable, there remains the legitimate question of dealing with issues. There are passages that state: *eye for eye, tooth for tooth (Ex 21:24).* When determining a sentence for a crime that has been committed, the law must prevail and guarantee justice. This action also applies to forgiveness. We refer back to St. Peter's question.

Jesus then offers his opinion on offenses and forgiveness as he responds to St. Peter: *Not just seven times, but up to seventy times seven.*

By responding like this, Jesus is not keeping score. Instead he preaches an excess of forgiveness that is woven throughout the Gospel. This is God's Good News. At the end of his life, Christ's last words were: *Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing (Lk 23:34).*

To ensure that he was understood, Jesus added the story of the ruthless debtor to his answer. Today, when we say the Our Father, we repeat these familiar words: *Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.*
