
And later in the summer, we will have our picnic at Frying Pan Park in Herndon, VA. We've reserved our usual Pavillion for August 31st.

When December 12th rolled around, we were ready for Orlando. What I wasn't ready for was the magnitude of the show site. With more than 5,000 dogs entered from 49 states and 21 countries, more than

40 rings lined with red carpet, and what seemed like miles of grooming setups, it was overwhelming and exhibitanting at the same time!


On our big day, my mom told me to remember what we had practiced. I walked into the ring, feeling very nervous. Then Berry looked up at me and my nerves disappeared. Around the ring we gaited, free stacked, stood for inspection, and down and back. "You are Best In Sweepstakes," the judge said pointing to me. I happily patted Berry on the back and exited the ring.

My mom gave me a big hug: "Are you ready to be the line leader for the Terrier Puppy Group?"

"Yes!" I said, and Berry wagged her tail.

The Group was a really thrilling experience. Every terrier was represented with nearly all being shown by professional handlers. I was the only Junior Handler. The legendary professional handler and judge, Peter Green, was our Group Judge. The judging was being live streamed, and as the first in ring all eyes were on us. "Oh goodness, I hope we don't trip," I thought.

"Terrier Group in the ring!" the Steward barked. Berry looked up at me and wagged her tail. "Here we go girl," and off we went, leading the Group into the ring. We didn't win, but Berry showed like a champ, and we had a ton of fun. It was a truly great experience and one that was most memorable, especially for an 11 year old!





The Road to Westminster By Nancy Nykamp

Whenever I read the word "road" in a title, my mind races back in time to the 1970's and John Denver's top hit "Take Me Home, Country Road." For me, Westminster Dog Show 2019 was very much a trip home.

My parents were regular exhibitors at Westminster in the 1950s and 1960s when a large number of the entries were exhibited by owners/breeders. As the years went by, exhibiting at Westminster changed; owner/breeders exhibitors were diminishing, site logistics more challenging, and NYC parking and traffic increasingly laborious. The snowstorm of 1969 was the deciding event for my parents to attend all future Westminster Shows as spectators. As spectators, my parents were more inclined to take me with them, and every February, I would skillfully negotiate a day off from school to attend Westminster. Westminster always felt like home. It inspired me and reinvigorated my love of the sport.

Westminster 2019 brought back the same feelings.

My journey to Westminster started back in 2017, when I owner-handled Bailey to her Champion and Grand Champion titles. I relished showing and did not want to stop. So we continued to campaign in 2018, initially working towards Bronze Grand Champion and then Silver. Along the way, we learned a great deal and met many phenomenal people. We were fortunate to have some nice wins, which landed us in the top 5 Airedales. This made us eligible for an invitation to Westminster. When



the purple and gold Westminster invitation arrived, I simply could not resist the draw and potential thrill of exhibiting there. And so the decision was made: after months of grooming, training, conditioning, and showing, Bailey and I were going to Westminster.

The day before the show, my daughter, Olivia, who had negotiated a day off from school (the apple doesn't fall far from the tree) and I found ourselves driving through snow up I-95. My mind flashed back to the

snowstorm of 1969. Fortunately, the flurries stopped, and we arrived safely in NYC after rush hour traffic, so set up was a breeze. We were benched (a benched show requires your dog to remain in a designated space all day) at Pier 92, near our ring. The next day, we woke to more snow flurries. Snow, excitement, and energy swirled all around us as we walked briskly down to the Pier. Spectators stopped to compliment Bailey and ask questions. She was poised and relaxed. As I started to get Bailey ready to show, Olivia ventured off to explore the site. Next thing I knew it was ring time.

Olivia wrote her college application essay on her experience at the

World Dog Show in Amsterdam. My favorite sentence in her essay was "Hours and hours of training, conditioning and grooming, and it all comes down to 3 minutes: around the ring; stand for inspection; down and back; free stack; and around the ring again." And so that was the case on this snowy Westminster day.

Our judge had years of experience judging around the world. He ran an efficient ring, quickly identifying those intended for placing. As he directed us to the side of the ring for further consideration and placement, I remained focused on Bailey. There was no room for letting up on showing; she had to keep her ears and tail up, and maintain an intense Airedale expression. I held my breath as the judge made final placements. We were in the Select (second place) Bitch position. One final lap around the ring, with applause, and



"That's the line-up." I finally exhaled. The next few minutes were a blur: hugs from exhibitors, congratulations from friends and spectators, and heartfelt compliments from other judges who were ringside and had watched Bailey and I grow as a team. Still euphoric, I exited the ring, giving Olivia a huge hug. Olivia had been on this journey with me, and I was so grateful she was with me on this big day. As Olivia and I drove home that evening, I realized my Road to Westminster had indeed taken me home "to the place I belong."

New Performance Titles, Legs, Placements, and Rankings

Rescue Update By Pam McKusick

I am currently fostering Annie, who is about two years old and very sweet-natured. She came from the Talbot County Humane Society on February 2 and was surrendered with her mother. (Her mother was adopted quickly by an "Airedale-experienced couple.") According to the owner, she had been kept in an outside kennel with her mother all her life. She had never been inside.

She seems like a blank slate — she never had an opportunity to learn "things" when she was a puppy. We're working on her house-training by taking her out every four hours or so. She has a wonderfully joyful tuck-butt-run, and on a recent afternoon entertained herself for some time

with a tennis ball that she carried, tossed into the air, and retrieved. That evening, she was concentrating on the area under the ramp to the deck. (Sometimes she mis-judges the edges of the ramp and partially slips off one side, but quickly recovers.) I didn't see anything under there, but she soon retrieved the ball she had played with earlier — and off she went, triumphantly tossing it in the air.

She recently learned how to climb the stairs to our second floor. Fortunately they are carpeted as it's quite an ordeal for her to figure out how to turn around and come down. The first time there were some misplaced feet and missed steps — going up was easier than turning around and going down, but she has increasingly mastered that activity. I've been feeding her Orijen large puppy food, but she still is tall and bony (around 52 lbs). I wonder if her lankiness might be due to her muscles not being given a chance to develop since she was confined for so long. Her feet are huge, so I think she will be large when she more fully develops. Although basic obedience commands are still a work in progress, when she's in our yard, she comes when I call her.

Annie gets along with our older females, though she finds our younger male a bit pushy. She is very sweet, likes to give kisses, and loves being touched.
