The First Reading

The Reader says the words in *italics*. The **People** say the words in **bold**.


- 13 Worship the LORD, O Jerusalem; * praise your God, O Zion;

And because you are children, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" So you are no longer a slave but a child, and if a child then also an heir, through God.

The Holy Gospel John 1:1-18

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me."") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

Then the celebrant continues

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In Christ, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In Christ, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or to lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

"I can't wait!" Do you recall being six years old? There would be decorations in homes, stores stocking up on toys, and music in the air. The tinsel, trees, and lights had shined for some time. All the talk among neighbors and friends at school was what I want Santa Claus to bring to me. Yet, one had to wait because Christmas was still to come.

"I can't wait!" The six year old in each one of us has difficulty waiting for Christmas. Waiting is boring, waste of time, and unproductive according to the adult world. Waiting meansstanding in line, sitting in traffic, becoming impatient, surviving in frustration, and waving fists in the air. Is waiting the "baa-humbug" of this time of the year?

"I can't wait!" Perhaps one can and must wait. Maybe waiting is a good thing and a special moment. Maybe waiting is an important part of the season. Maybe waiting is a spiritual exercise and a gift from God.

In the wisdom of the Christian Church, there is a calendar that marks seasons. This time of the year is called Advent. Advent is the four Sundays before Christmas. Advent comes from a Latin word that signifies coming. The Christ Child is coming and we wait. We wait for Jesus to be born into hearts and souls. We wait as the world will know the birth of the Son of God.

In the Christmas story according to the Gospels (Luke and Matthew) there is waiting. Mary and Joseph wait. The Shepherds wait. The Angels wait. The Magi wait. Even Herod who represents evil rulers must wait.

Yes, you and I can wait. Let us wait for the joy and peace. Let us wait for gifts and love.

Let us wait and say, "Merry Christmas!"
