Guild Cookout -- Saturday, September 21st The vote is in! We're having a cookout!

At the July meeting, the members voted in favor of a cookout in September instead of our regular Monday night meeting. We will be scheduling a workshop and a short meeting that morning from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. with a cookout starting around 2:00 p.m.

The guild will be providing the hamburger meat and hot dogs as well as all of the paper products for the meal. A food sign-up sheet for the additional food items needed for the cookout will be located on the sign-in table at the August meeting. Your plans to attend will be indicated by signing up to bring one of these items. *Please* be sure to sign up so we will know how much meat to purchase and can be mindful of the guild's funds by not spending more than is necessary!

Additionally, your spouses are welcome to attend and we would love for them to come! Please indicate if they will be there, too! If so, they can arrive around 2:00 p.m.

Lick Skillet Lesson - Bobbin Tension -- We often talk about tension setting adjustments on machines and 90% of the time we adjust the top tension to achieve the perfect stitch and only about 10% of the time, the **bobbin tension**. Many have been told to never touch the bobbin tension but it isn't as difficult as we've been led to believe and hopefully here you'll realize it is perfectly safe and easy to adjust the bobbin case. Over time, tensions can change with regular use by working themselves either tighter or looser, even though you haven't physically changed the settings. Thread, lint, and temperature can also affect them. There are three times when adjusting the bobbin tension might be necessary. Two are obvious, but the third is the "I never thought of that before" alternative. When using a very smooth, fine bobbin thread the preset setting may not apply the necessary brakes to stop it when you stop 1. sewing. In this case, the bobbin thread continues to unwind, potentially causing backlash, and upon start up again, the thread will break. Tightening the tension will fix this. When using a very heavy bobbin thread the preset tension might be too tight for a heavy thread, preventing the bobbin thread 2. from unwinding freely. **Loosening** the bobbin tension will solve this. (Be sure to turn the tension screw in small increments whether you are tightening or loosening the screw.) Q: "There are times when the bobbin adjustment is correct but no matter what I do to the top tension, I still can't get a 3. perfect stitch or the thread breaks. When I loosen the top tension adequately low for a sensitive or heavy thread, I get loops on the back. When I tighten up the top tension to get rid of the looping, the thread breaks." A: Looping on the back means the top tension is too **BOBBIN TENSION DIAGRAM** loose compared to the bobbin tension so the bobbin thread is pulling too much top thread underneath. By tightening the top tension, the loops will stop, but the added tension may cause breakage, especially with sensitive threads. In this case, it might be necessary to loosen both the bobbin tension AND the upper tension. By loosening both the top and bobbin tensions, both sides of the tug-of war give in, allowing a good stitch without breaking or looping. Lick Skillet Recipe Corner

Honey Bun Cake

1 (2-layer) yellow cake mix 1 c. buttermilk ³/₄ c. vegetable oil ¹/₂ c. sugar 4 eggs ³/₄ c. packed brown sugar 4 tsp cinnamon ¹/₂ c. chopped nuts ¹/₄ c. raisins or chopped dates 2 c. confectioners' sugar 2 Tbsp milk 1 tsp vanilla extract

Combine cake mix, buttermilk, oil, sugar and eggs in mixer bowl. Beat for 2 minutes. Spoon batter into greased 9x13 inch cake pan. Combine brown sugar and cinnamon in a bowl and mix well. Stir in nuts and raisins. Sprinkle over prepared layer and swirl with a knife. Bake at 350 degrees until cake tests done. Combine confectioners' sugar, milk and vanilla in bowl and mix well. Spread over hot cake. Yield: 15 servings.

<u>Quilt Trivia:</u> <u>English Paper Piecing</u>

dates back as far as the 1770's, with the oldest quilt of its kind made in the U.S. dating back to about 1807 - 1813. In this piecing method, individual pieces of paper are cut in matching sizes and shapes of the quilt pieces and the fabric is hand basted over paper templates.

During Pioneer days, "paper" quilting became very popular because paper was scarce in early America and women often saved letters, newspaper clippings and catalog pages to create patterns. In many cases, paper templates were not removed from the quilt, the paper serving a dual purpose of both pattern and insulator. But these paper templates are also important pieces of history. Papers found in old quilts have preserved first-hand glimpses into pioneer life!

Community Service Project Update -- As mentioned in the July newsletter, 25 chemo caps and 20 wraps have been completed and taken to the Cancer Care Center. At the July meeting we discussed completing at least 50 caps and wraps as our guild community service project. We also mentioned that if each member could make at least one cap and one wrap we could easily reach a number of 75 each. Although we have not set a specific goal, we would like to make as many as possible. If anyone has a cap or wrap that they have been working on at home, please bring it to this month's meeting.

Last month, Anita gave out copies of the chemo cap pattern from the Hancock Fabric site that Mary Simmons mentioned was an easier cap to make. Also, copies were provided of the fleece wrap. If anyone has made a cap or wrap from these patterns since the July meeting, please bring it to this month's meeting. If you were not at the meeting and need a pattern, see Anita for a copy. Also, the chemo cap pattern is on the Lick Skillet Facebook page.


