Good morning girls and boys! It's really great to see you again after my vacation... We had a wonderful time, but it's really good to be back here and see all of you. It seems like we should celebrate... I know let's put out some Christmas decorations... "Is this the time of year we put out Santa Claus? Frosty the Snowman?" No! It's May, and everyone knows we put out those decorations in December! "When do we eat chocolate eggs? Is now the time?" No! We ate those at Easter, which we celebrated a few weeks ago. I have to admit that I'm a little confused... Is Easter about chocolate eggs? Is there more to the meaning of Easter than finding and eating chocolate eggs? Yes, of course there is! What is Easter all about? Easter is the story of Jesus dying and then rising from the dead, which we sing about in Easter hymns like, "Christ the Lord is Risen Today."

And what about Christmas? That's confusing, too. Is Christmas celebrating winter with Frosty the Snowman? Is Christmas about this jolly fellow we call Santa Claus? No, it is about the birth of a baby, the baby Jesus. What was so special about this baby? What did this baby teach us? Jesus taught us to love one another and treat others as we would like to be treated. And that's something to celebrate because that is what following Jesus is all about.

In our Bible story for today Saint Paul shows the people of the ancient city of Athens that their worship of other man-made gods was false and that the living God of heaven and earth is the one true God who gives us all life. The people were worshipping things like Santa Clause and the Easter Bunny, but didn't know about Jesus or our Father in heaven. I'm sure happy that we all know the difference between those false gods and our real Father in Heaven and His Son, Jesus Christ, our savior.

I wanted to give all of you an Easter Egg, but they were all gone. I have one of my favorite candies for you though. Here's a Werther's caramel. Have a great week.

Let's pray... Dear God, thank you for Saint Paul and his wisdom in sharing his insights and wisdom. Thank you for all the saints who have shared the faith all the way from Saint Paul to our own families. Thank you for our Church family who remind us every day about your love for us and helping us to know you. Amen.

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• SCRIPTURE READING: Acts 17:16-31

P: Our scripture reading for this day is from the book of Acts, the 17th chapter. **C: Glory to you O Lord.**

¹⁶While Paul was waiting for them in Athens, he was deeply distressed to see that the city was full of idols. ¹⁷So he argued in the synagogue with the Jews and the devout persons, and also in the marketplace every day with those who happened to be there. ¹⁸Also some Epicurean and Stoic philosophers debated with him. Some said, "What does this babbler want to say?" Others said, "He seems to be a proclaimer of foreign divinities." (This was because he was telling the good news about Jesus and the resurrection.) ¹⁹So they took him and brought him to the Areopagus and asked him, "May we know what this new teaching is that you are presenting? ²⁰It sounds rather strange to us, so we would like to know what it means." ²¹Now all the Athenians and the foreigners living there would spend their time in nothing but telling or hearing something new.

²²Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. ²³For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. ²⁴The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, ²⁵nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. ²⁶From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, ²⁷so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. ²⁸For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring.' ²⁹Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. ³⁰While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, ³¹because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

• SERMON

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from the Son of God, our risen Savior, Jesus the Christ, amen.

It's good to be back home after taking a long overdue vacation. We went on a cruise and stopped at Jamaica, the Grand Cayman Island, and in Cozumel Mexico. We did some sight seeing and had a great time relaxing onboard the biggest ship I've ever been on. We took a lot of pictures and made a lot of memories we will never forget.

In our scripture reading for this morning Saint Paul has some free time while in the Greek city of Athens. He was in Athens waiting for his missionary colleagues, Timothy and Silas, to arrive . Athens was the home of Plato, Aristotle, and Socrates, as well as many other philosophers. It had formerly been the cradle of Western civilization and the birthplace of democracy. By the time Paul visited the city, Athens was 400 years past its prime. Paul did what anyone visiting such a historic city might do if they had a few days to spare before continuing his missionary journey, he became a tourist. Paul visited all the historical places and noticed all the altars that had been built to honor and worship their Greek and now increasingly Roman gods. As the apostle walked around the city he saw the gods of Athens, the idols that were being worshipped. One of the ancient writers tells us

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that at this time there were 30,000 gods in Athens! Many of these statues have survived. With a simple Google search you can see copies of them as samples of ancient art. Paul recognized these weren't merely objects of art, but were actually gods being worshipped by the people of Athens.

I can't even imagine having 30,000 gods. How in the world did they keep them all straight? That's like having almost 100 separate religious holiday celebrations every day! If you tried to appease each and every god, there would simply be no time to fit them all in. I know some people don't like it if we even go longer than one hour on a Sunday. Imagine the time it would take just to thank each and every god for their blessings. I'm pretty sure it would take over an hour every day... In one single temple, the Pantheon, the Greeks had statues to 12 of the most popular Greek gods.

I wonder how many gods we worship on a daily basis today. I know people who have developed a permanent curvature of their spine as a result of praying to their cell phone, tablet, or computer screens all day and half the night long. I've had times in my life when I put my career and my job, ahead of everything else. Lots of people fall into that trap of worshipping their jobs and careers. I've also been guilty of putting my family, my wife, my children, and grandchildren first in my life. I know I'm not alone in that particular idol worship either... I could go

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on and on, but I'm pretty sure you get my point. We might not build temples and erect statues to our gods, but we worship them just the same.

Polls have shown the fastest growing and now the largest demographic when asked about their religion or faith is Spiritual But Not Religious (SBNRs). SBNRs now comprise over 24 percent of the population. That's slightly larger than the Catholic Church in America! I've been thinking about our friends and neighbors who identify as SBNRs a lot lately. At first I felt a sense of outrage that so many were falling away from my beloved Church. Now, as I've listened to Saint Paul, I noticed his approach. He too started out with a sense of "deep distress" Luke tells us. What Paul did in response to that distress is what we can all learn from. I might have gone out in front of those folks and tried to convince them how wrong they were for worshipping false gods. That's not how Paul approached the issue. Instead of pointing out the error of their ways, he compliments them on their religious fervor. He tells them he's noticed all the wonderful tributes they have to all their gods and so he knows they must be very religious people. He then begins to talk about this one statue to an "Unknown God." He uses one of their own religious symbols to include them into the living almighty God's story. It seems totally appropriate to me that Paul would be able to use one of the most, if not the most, insignificant of all the 30,000 Greek and Roman gods in vogue at that time to

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make his point and to include so many people into God's Story.. God always chooses the least and the least likely to use in miraculous and mighty ways. So, this "Unknown God" becomes known through the preaching of this man Paul.

If I and all of us can learn something from Paul, it's this. Let's not be quite so quick to judge others, but to listen to them and then tell our story or rather God's Story through us. For example, in the case of all those Spiritual But Not Religious folks, perhaps instead of seeing them as fleeing our beloved Church, maybe we can reach them by complimenting them on their search for meaning and purpose in life. Then you can open a conversation about how the living God became a real life flesh and blood human being to guide us, to be an example for us, and most importantly, to give his life for us out of love and out of God's great and amazing grace. We can tell them how God has given us a purpose and meaning for life. That we might worship Him and serve Him by serving our neighbors and the least of these our brothers and sisters. You see if someone admits to being spiritual then we share something in common with them. We're all seeking life's meaning and a purpose that makes us want to get up out of bed yet another day... We can build on that foundation and possibly convince them that our God does in fact fill that emptiness they feel in their lives. Spiritual But Not Religious people are in really seekers. They know there's more to life than what

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meets the eye, but they haven't made the commitment to any one specific set of doctrines or beliefs. On face value alone I would say these folks are ripe for the picking. They're probably even in your own family. I'm not asking you to stand up on the Mars Hill in Athens, that site named in honor of the Greek god Ares, the god of war, to discuss religious doctrine, but we can all build up someone we already know and love who also admits or by their actions show us they're Spiritual, But Not Religious. It might even be your own children... If any of you have already had this kind of discussion with someone in your family or circle of friends, I'd like to hear how it went. If you aren't too embarrassed, please talk to me about your experience. Maybe I'll learn from what you're doing and maybe we can both do better at talking about our marvelous God in the future.

May the spirit of our God, who may be unknown to so many, stir us up to boldly talk about our faith and our love of the one creator God without shame and without worrying about what others will think of us. O God of Israel and God over all the universe, help us know you and love you enough to talk about where your story and my story come together. Help us to make Christ Known in every though word and deed. Amen.

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* NICENE CREED

The Nicene Creed is said on all festivals and on Sundays in the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. The Apostles' Creed is said at other times. The Creed is omitted here if the service of Holy Baptism or another rite with a creed is used.

P: We have indeed received grace upon grace from you, loving God. Accept these our prayers and use them to transform hearts and lives. In Jesus' name we pray.
