29% of Ontarians self-identify as a visible minority.


Who makes up the heritage sector?

In 2017, the Canadian Heritage sector received assistance from over **114,400 volunteers, contributing over 6 million hours**. This is the equivalent to approximately 2,888 full-time equivalent positions. Volunteers outnumbered paid employees 3 to 1, making up 75% of the heritage workforce. (Government of Canada Survey of Heritage Institutions)




