Reflection on a Row

Leaving out the names (a distraction) I found the thoughts in this recent letter in The Tablet extremely well expressed. Why can't I find words like that?:

I found B's denunciation of M (in an earlier letter) very upsetting. Like B (and possibly St Francis of Assisi), I am an old lefty. In my liturgical tastes I am catholic because I am a Catholic.

Whether I'm at a Mass incorporating the Taizé chants and liturgical dance, or one involving incense and the Ave Verum, my soul can soar. At the moment of consecration, I kneel with my brothers and sisters in grateful adoration before God. At the dismissal I walk out into the week, a living tabernacle bringing Christ's presence to all those I encounter.

Well, that's the plan. In reality, the bar of virtue is set so high ("I would have you perfect as your heavenly father is perfect") that I almost always fall short of this ideal. I know that sometimes, because of my failure, I am a stumbling block instead of a beacon to my fellow pilgrims.

I know I wouldn't fare any better than M should B cast his eye in my direction. But the whole of the New Testament cries out for a revolution of tolerance, acceptance and love. Jesus releases us from the burden of judging others to free us up for the more urgent task of judging ourselves. I constantly have to remind myself, and in fraternal affection I remind B that the spirit of discord is not of the Holy Spirit
