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Pilgrimage—a Tradition for All Faiths

cently I was invited by the Interfaith Community of Schenectady to give a talk about my Camino Santiago, and the practice of pilgrimage as an act of faith. The location chosen for the event was a local mosque community, the Islamic Center of the Capital District, a place familiar to me after numerous visits.

Based on the idea that all faiths have a tradition of pilgrimage, I spoke about my experiences along "*The Way of St. James*." One thing that all faiths have in common is that pilgrimage is a way of expressing faith literally, one step at time. It is a way of making a sacrifice, an offering, and a period of retreat from daily life, as we seek God via an intentional journey.

One of the reasons that I went on pilgrimage was because having time away, not unlike the Lenten period we just experienced, might help me to find new ways of seeing and new ways of being in Christ. Current events have long been reminding me that we seem to be putting

ourselves into smaller spheres, when the message of the Gospel is to go forth so that "all may be one." I wanted to find the courage to live more boldly in Christ, and the Camino Santiago was a unique chance to do so. Here I was, walking daily, living with, eating with, and in a large room of bunk beds, even sleeping with people from all over the world!

Many of the people I met on Camino were in some way or another Christian. I also met many people who were spiritual, but not religious. There were atheists and agnostics walking, as well as Buddhists. I met several Jewish pilgrims, and while I personally did not encounter any Muslim pilgrims, it is not unusual to meet Muslims on Camino from what I understand. People came from various ethnic, social, and cultural backgrounds, not to mention varying political points of view. The Camino Santiago provided us with a common goal and purpose. It was very clear from day one that people

Glenville Council 10013 Celebrates 10 years of Lenten Fish Dinners







Ten years ago, Grand Knight James Martin proposed holding a fried fish dinner each Friday during the 6 weeks of Lent. At the time, the Council was losing interest in the Golf Tournament fundraiser and was looking for something to replace it. The main problem was the kitchen. There was no way to deep fry fish or potatoes. Jim found a solution, and that first year a small crew of about a dozen Knights and their wives breaded fish and baked desserts on Thursday, set up a dining room, prepared coleslaw, cooked fish and French fries, set out condiments, served patrons, and cleaned up afterwards on the 6 Fridays of Lent. 465 dinners over 6 weeks were served. It was the beginning of what we have today, over 1750 dinners served by a crew of about 40 members of Council 10013, the Ladies Auxiliary and the Church Youth Group.

Planning begins in January and continues up to the first week of Lent. Supplies are purchased early in the week. The temporary outdoor kitchen is set up on Thursday, and early Friday morning preparation begins. The dining hall is set up with 144 seats. Desserts that have been baked during the week by members and their wives are plated and wrapped; potatoes are washed, wrapped and baked. Baked fish is prepared for the oven, coleslaw is made, coffee is brewed and punch is made. The burners in the outdoor kitchen are fired up and the fish and fries dropped into the hot oil.

The first guest is welcomed at 4:05 although the advertised serving time starts at 4:30. Approximately 275 – 300 guests will be served in the next two and one half hours. Even before the last dinner is served at 7:00 the cleanup crew has been hard at work washing pots and pans throughout the evening. They will be there for about 2 hours after the last guest has left.

Through the dedication and hard work of the Knights and Ladies Auxiliary the fish dinners have raised over \$60,000.00 which has been donated to local charities, food banks and parish service organizations. Besides the money raised, the fish dinners have become a place for the community to come together for an evening of fellowship.

RCIA by Kim Klementowski

This ministry helps guide seekers along their faith journey, teaches them about our Catholic faith and assists them in receiving the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, First Eucharist and Confirmation) to enable them to be full members of our Catholic faith and our wonderful parish.

This past Easter, three amazing men and one woman were brought into full communion with our Catholic Faith. Oliver Presson received the sacraments of Baptism and First Eucharist, while Bill Antrim and Jim Rose received the sacraments of Confirmation and First Eucharist. Erin LaRue received the sacrament of Confirmation. All 4 have been warmly welcomed into our parish, thanks to all of you.

Many of you may not know what RCIA is exactly and I'm sure many of you know someone (family member, friend, spouse, coworker, etc) who may be interested and may benefit by the process. RCIA stands for the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. It's not a program; it's a process. A program has a definite start and a definite end. RCIA is an on-going faith journey...it's intended to assist adults who are seeking full communion with the Catholic Church through the sacraments of initiation which are Baptism, First Eucharist and Confirmation. There isn't any age limit. So if you've never been baptized or if you were baptized in another Christian Faith, this process is for you. If you were baptized Catholic but have never received the sacraments of First Eucharist and Confirmation, this process is for you as well. If you are only in need of Confirmation, we along with Christine Goss from Youth Ministries are currently working on the development of an adult confirmation only process. If you've received all of your sacraments but have been away from the Catholic Church for a number of years, we can help you too.

were in this together, helping one another, encouraging one another, and doing what we could to make a joyful path together. It seemed as if we could all cooperate, no matter what our differences.

Another thing I talked about was that I had to learn to travel light and to let go of things. Sometimes that meant letting go of things, such as acknowledging that my boots would never work and that I had to buy new shoes. At other times it meant letting go of feelings or expectations, as well as perceptions and points of view. It became clear that these "ideas" did not serve me, and certainly did not serve God.

To be able to talk about all the literal and figurative ups and downs of the trek, all the uphill challenges, and the discovery that downhill was often tougher than up was a gift beyond measure. To do so before a crowd of people of different faiths was an even greater gift. To do so in a mosque was perhaps that best gift of all. It was particularly poignant to be able to speak of trusting God in new ways, and being transformed through God's love, all accomplished by saying yes.

May we all present ourselves to God, open and willing, ready to be changed in ways we might have never wished for, but ways which make us grateful to go forth.


The May Crowning of our Blessed Mother will be on Sunday, May 7, following the 11:00 AM mass.
