Yellow-browed Warbler

Phylloscopus inornatus Category A

Rare passage migrant. 37 records,

37 birds

World/British distribution (Snow & Perrins 1998, Dufour et al. 2022):

Breeds in high and central latitudes of the east Palearctic, chiefly in Siberian Russia, wintering from central Nepal east to eastern China and south to the Malay Peninsula. Considering its range it is a surprisingly frequent, even regular visitor to Europe, with a marked increase in recent years leading to a number of winter and spring records, and speculation that it may have evolved a new migration route.

Kent status (KOS 2022):

It is a scarce but regular autumn migrant to Kent in variable numbers, rare in winter and spring.

Harrison (1953) was only able to cite one acceptable record in the county (at Dungeness on the 24th September 1915) but Taylor *et al.* (1981) were able to record sightings in six years between 1952 and 1966, which included the first local record, seen by David Musson at Folkestone on the 22nd September 1959. This was only the fourth Kent record at the time and appeared in the British Birds Rarity Committee report for the year (Pyman, 1960). It remained a national rarity until 1963 (BBRC no date).

Taylor *et al.* then noted records in nine consecutive years between 1967 and 1975, which included the second local record, noted on the same date 15 years after the first, in Folkestone Warren on the 22nd September 1974.




Figure 1: Yellow-browed Warbler records at Folkestone and Hythe since 1985

There was then a wait of almost another 15 years until the next, at Mill Point on the 3rd October 1988, and this was followed by one at Church Hougham on the 21st October 1996. It has however occurred with some regularity since 2003, with 33 records in the last 20 years, as shown in figure 1. The rarity of this species locally during the 1990s, when the area was well-watched, is remarkable as there were around 215 occurrences in the county during this decade, and despite its more regular appearances recently it remains comparatively scarce here. It seems very likely that occurrences are over-looked as it can turn up in suitable habitat almost anywhere and be relatively unobtrusive.

Considering its scarcity locally it is extraordinary that the Folkestone and Hythe area should host only the second county record of the species in spring – a singing male found by Ian Roberts at Abbotscliffe on the 9th May 2006. This quickly followed the first Kent spring record, also a singing male, and possibly the same individual, at Dungeness five days earlier.




Figure 2: Yellow-browed Warbler records at Folkestone and Hythe by week

All autumn sightings have been between the 18th September (week 38) and 6th November (week 45), with a peak in late September/early October. The records by week are given in figure 2.

Records have been well-distributed with records from 14 tetrads (45%), including a number of inland records. There is a definite coastal bias, with 11 records from Samphire Hoe and five from Mill Point, but there have been sightings at 16 other sites. Figure 3 shows the location of records by tetrad.

Yellow-browed Warbler at Folkestone Warren 22nd September 1959

Single bird seen at 15 feet range with Chiffchaff and Goldcrest.

Very small size, but longer than Goldcrest. Habits much as Chiffchaff but more inclined to fly-catching and rather more acrobatic. Very obvious supercillary stripes. Rump not yellow but rather paler than rest of back. Two obvious light bars across coverts. Back greenish, underparts pale yellow.


