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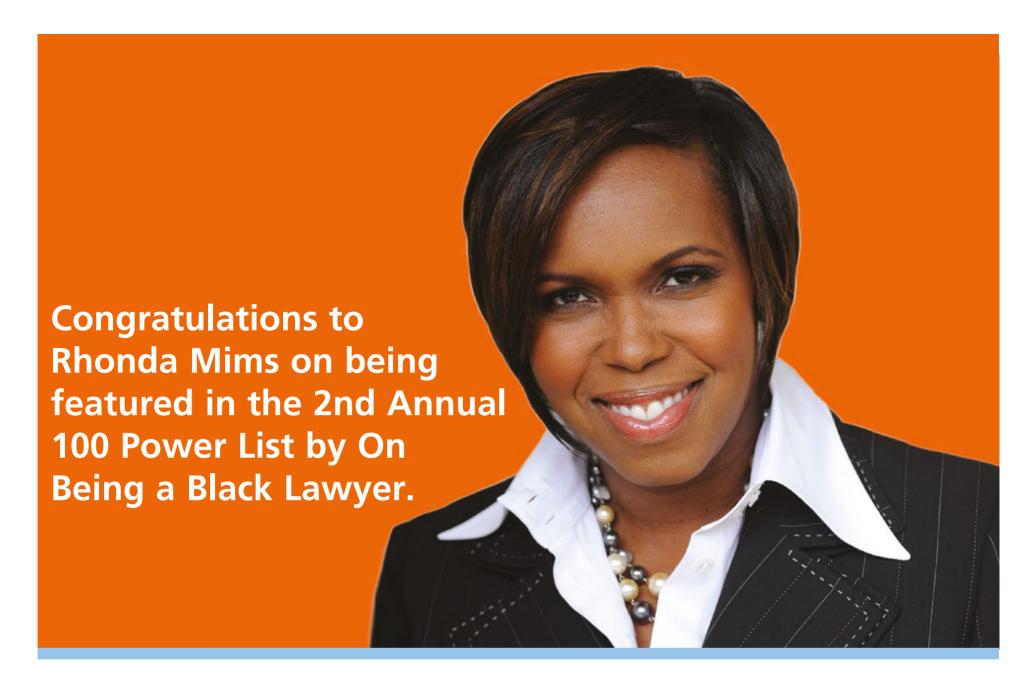

n Being a Black Lawyer (OBABL) celebrates Black History Month with the release of the Second Annual Power 100. Indeed, there is good reason for optimism. President Barack Obama and First Lady Michelle Obama just celebrated their second inauguration. The number of black managing partners at large law firms continues to grow as does the group of African American attorneys in the C-Suite.

There is also reason for caution. The percentage of black law students has been stagnant for several years, and African American law firm associates continue to have higher attrition rates than those of their non-black peers. More than ever we need to laud those who work to advance diversity in the legal profession.

Our editorial team spent months reviewing nomination submissions and researching the legal industry to compile the Power 100, a list of the most influential black attorneys in the nation. Many of these leaders are also working to create opportunities in the profession for minorities.

Recognizing that we can't do it alone, we asked our Power 100 Honorees for recommendations of non-black attorneys who have been strong advocates for diversity in the legal profession. After carefully considering those nominations, our selection committee chose 20 Power 100 Advocates.

Our company has grown a great deal this year. OBABL, established in 2008 to report news of import to black legal professionals, is now owned by Lawyers of Color LLC, which is also the parent company of On Being a Hispanic Lawyer and On Being a Lawyer of Color. With this expansion, we now promote the causes and contributions of all attorneys of color. We have a national reach and our publications and editors have been featured in The Washington Post, the Wall Street Journal Law Blog, and many bar association magazines. It is our hope that our readers — law school students and Big Law partners; advocates and academics; public defenders and prospective law students — all enjoy our latest publication.

THE POWER **COUPLE** ACT II

On Monday, January 21, 2013, the second inauguration of Barack Hussein Obama as the 44th President of the United States was held on the Mall of the United States Capitol with nearly a million people in attendance. This marked the beginning of the second term of Barack Obama as President and Michelle Obama as First Lady.

"Faith in America's Future" was the inauguration theme. The phrase reverberates with reminders of the 150th anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation and the completion of the Capitol dome in 1863.

In his inauguration speech, President Obama proclaimed that "while freedom is a gift from God, it must be secured by His people here on Earth". He called for laws to combat global warming & climate change, enactment of immigration reform and gun control. The president stated that more progress was needed on human rights and civil rights (including racial minority rights, women's rights, and LGBT rights) and vowed to promote democracy abroad, and stated that the United States must "be a source of hope to the poor, the sick, the marginalized, the victims of prejudice" around the world. Additionally, the president vowed to keep existing alliances strong,

emphasized the end of wars and the economic recovery, and stated that "no one has a greater stake in a peaceful world than its most powerful nation".

Indeed, President Obama and his wife, Michelle are the most powerful couple in the world. With the ascent of her husband as a prominent national politician, Mrs. Obama has become a part of popular culture. In May 2006, Essence listed her among "25 of the World's Most Inspiring Women." She has also been included on Vanity Fair's "10 of the World's Best Dressed People."

The First Lady's most prominent initiatives include "Let's Move!" which seeks to reverse the 21st century trend of childhood obesity and programs to aid military families. She hosted a White House reception for women's rights advocates in celebration of the enactment of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009 Pay equity law. She supported the economic stimulus bill in visits to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development and United States Department of Education. She has also visited public schools, homeless shelters and soup kitchens.

The Deans

African Americans are at the helm of 23 of the 202 ABA-approved law schools. While this figure represents a slight percentage decline from last year, it is still more than double the percentage of African American attorneys in the country. These deans are navigating difficult waters. While law firm hiring has stabilized, law school applications are down for the second straight year. The next decade will likely see a wave of law school reforms. We are certain these leaders are up to the challenge.

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Linda **AMMONS**

Dean Widener University School of Law

The Ohio State University Michael E. Moritz College of Law, J.D. The Ohio State University, M.A. Oakwood University, B.A.

Dean Ammons is the first woman and the first African American to lead Widener University School of Law, and is the senior African American female dean in the nation. Dean Ammons came to Widener in 2006 from Cleveland-Marshall College of Law in Cleveland, Ohio, where she was associate dean and professor of law. During her 15 years at Cleveland-Marshall, she chaired and served on a number of university committees and taught Administrative Law, Legislation, Mass Communications Law, and Women and the Law. In 2006, the Cleveland-Marshall Alumni Association chose her as their Stapleton Award recipient. In addition, Dean Ammons has been on the faculty of the National Judicial College in Reno, Nevada, since 1993. Dean Ammons also served a three-year term on the Government Relations Committee of the Association of American Law Schools.

In November, 2012, Dean Ammons received the "Excellence in Education Award" from the Delaware Barristers Association. In February 2012, Dean Ammons was named one of "The Power 100"

African American attorneys in the U.S. In October of 2011, she was honored with the Service to Children Award at the Christopher W. White Distinguished Access to Justice Awards program presented by the Delaware State Bar Association. In August 2010, Senator Tom Carper forwarded Dean Ammons' name to the Department of Justice for consideration by the White House for a seat on the U.S. District Court for the District of Delaware. In January 2010, Dean Ammons was appointed by Governor Jack Markell of Delaware to be the special investigator in the case of the alleged child molestations by pediatrician Earl Bradley. In August 2009, she was named among the 14 Most Influential People in Delaware by "Delaware Today" magazine. In May 2009, she was named a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation. In 2008, Dean Ammons was named to and currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce. She was honored by the American Council on Education, Office of Women in Higher Education, with the Delaware Leadership Award.



Penelope **ANDREWS**

President and Dean Albany Law School

Columbia University School of Law, New York, LL.M. University of Natal, Durban, South Africa, LL.B. University of Natal, Durban, South Africa, B.A.

Prof. Penelope (Penny) Andrews is Albany Law School's 17th President & Dean. Andrews is the first female President for the Albany Law School since it opened in 1851.

Previously Andrews was the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Professor of Law, City University of New York School of Law. Prior to joining CUNY, Andrews was a Professor of Law and Director of International Studies at Valparaiso Law School, where she taught courses in International Human Rights Law and International Criminal Law.

Dean Andrews, who was born and raised in South Africa, has extensive international experience, including teaching at law schools in Germany, Australia, Holland, Scotland, Canada and South Africa. She previously held the Kate Stoneman Chair at Albany Law School and was the Ariel Sallows Professor of Human Rights Law at the University of Saskatchewan, Canada. An annual award in her name—The Penelope E. Andrews Human Rights Award—was inaugurated in 2005 at the South African law school of University of KwaZulu-Natal. Along with numerous other awards, she holds a "Women of South Africa Achievement Award," as well as Albany Law's Kate Stoneman Award. In 2012 she was the recipient of the Haywood Burns/Shanara Gilbert Award.

In 2005 she was a finalist for a vacancy on the Constitutional Court of South Africa, the highest court in South Africa on constitutional matters. She has consulted for the United Nations Development Fund for Women, and for the Ford Foundation in Johannesburg, where she evaluated labor law programs. She earned her B.A. and LL.B from the University of Natal, Durban, South Africa, and her LL.M from Columbia University School of Law, New York. She is admitted as an Advocate of the Supreme Court of South Africa.

She has published over 50 articles and 3 edited volumes on topics centered on gender and racial equality, South African constitutional and policy issues, Australian indigenous law and policy, gender equality, and international justice. Her forthcoming book, FROM CAPE TOWN TO KABUL: RETHINKING STRATEGIES TO PURSUE WOMEN'S HUMAN RIGHTS, has just been published by Ashgate Press. Andrews is a previous Chair of the Section on Minorities, and previous Chair of the Section on Africa, of the Association of American Law Schools. She also regularly serves as a member of accreditation site teams for the American Bar Association Section on Legal Education and Admission to the Bar.



Craig M. BOISE

Dean and Professor of Law Cleveland-Marshall College of Law

New York University School of Law, LL.M. University of Chicago Law School, J.D. University of Missouri, B.A.

On July 1, 2011, Craig M. Boise became the fourteenth dean of Cleveland-Marshall College of Law, and the law school's first African-American dean. Prior to this, he was Professor of Law and Director of the Graduate Tax Law program at DePaul University College of Law. From 2003 to 2009, Boise was an Assistant and Associate Professor of Law at Case Western Reserve University School of Law and associate director of the Center for Business Law and Regulation.

He was a visiting professor at Washington & Lee College of Law in the Fall of 2006. Before beginning his teaching career, Boise practiced tax law for nearly nine years at Cleary Gottlieb and Akin Gump in New York, and at Thompson Hine in Cleveland. Boise has the distinction of being a former Kansas City police officer, who is said to have studied for the LSAT by flashlight in an unmarked police car. The constitutional law cases he studied while at the police academy inspired him to pursue a legal career.

He returned to college and completed his BAB.A. in Political Science at the University of Missouri. He then obtained his JDJ.D. at the University of Chicago Law School and his

LLML.L.M. in Taxation from New York University School of Law.

Boise grew up in a small farming community near Kansas City, Missouri, where lawyers were looked upon with suspicion. Perhaps this is why he is driven by academic rigor. Boise is a well-respected scholar, who has published extensively in the field of tax law, focusing on issues surrounding offshore financial centers. Dean Boise is excited about leading C|M| LAW at this time because, as he says, "I am part of an institution that has planted so many law grads back into the community, in places of prominence—mayors, legislators, police chiefs, judges at the state and federal level, business leaders everywhere you turn a C|M| LAW graduate is doing something amazing." Boise, who studied to be a concert pianist, has been active on the boards of civic and charitable organizations, including: The Cleveland Clinic's Children's Rehab Hospital, Karamu House and Cleveland Bridge Builders. Boise expresses his philosophy thus: "People wrongly assume that those who need opportunity are less talented than those who don't—life simply gives some people more difficult circumstances to deal with in the process of achieving their goals. Our graduates demonstrate that opportunity can result in lives of excellence."



David A. BRENNEN

Dean University of Kentucky College of Law

University of Florida College of Law, J.D. and LL.M. Florida Atlantic University, B.A.

David A. Brennen, dean of the University of Kentucky College of Law, joined UK in 2009 from the University of Georgia School of Law where he was a professor since 2006 and from the Association of American Law Schools (AALS) where he served a two-year term as deputy director. Along with nearly 20 years of experience in the classroom, Brennen is regarded as an innovator in the field of nonprofit law. He is a co-founder and co-editor of Nonprofit Law Prof Blog, founding editor of Nonprofit and Philanthropy Law Abstracts, co-founder of the AALS Section on Nonprofit and Philanthropy Law and a co-author of one of the first law school casebooks on taxation of nonprofit organizations.

Brennen received his bachelor's degree in finance from Florida Atlantic University in 1988 and his law degree from the University of Florida College of Law in 1991, where he also received his LL.M. in tax law in 1994. In 2002, Brennen was elected to the American Law Institute where he is an adviser on its project titled, "Principles of the Law of Nonprofit Organizations." Brennen has also served in leadership roles with AALS and the Society of American Law Teachers.

Brennen began his career in legal education as an adjunct professor at Florida A&M University in 1994. He also taught as a professor at Syracuse University College of Law, the University of Richmond School of Law and Mercer University School of Law prior to his last position at the University of Georgia. In addition, Brennen taught as a visiting professor at the University of Alabama and Temple University.

His law practice work began with Moody & Salzman, PA in Gainesville, Florida. He went to work with Bobo, Spicer & Ciotoli, PA in West Palm Beach, Messer, Vickers, Caparello, Madsen, Lewis, Goldman & Metz, PA in Tallahassee and the State of Florida Department of Revenue.

He has been a member of the Florida Bar - Tax Section, American Bar Association – Section of Taxation and the National Bar Association. In addition, he has served on several boards and held many special appointments.



Phyliss CŘAIG-TAYLOR

Dean North Carolina Central University School of Law

Columbia University, LL.M. University of Alabama, J.D. University of Alabama, B.S.

Phyliss Craig-Taylor is Dean of North Carolina Central University (NCCU) School of Law. Prior to becoming Dean, Craig-Taylor served as Associate Dean of Academic Affairs and a Professor of Law at the Charlotte School of Law. Craig-Taylor has taught courses in Property, Real Estate Finance, Advanced Issues in Property, Land Use, Women and the Law, Land Loss, and Professional Responsibility. Craig-Taylor has been a faculty member at the University of Florida and North Carolina Central University as well as visiting scholar at the University of Warsaw Center for American Law.

Craig-Taylor is a member of the Council for the American Bar Association Section of Litigation. Currently she serves as a member of the Heirs Property Retention Coalition, and formerly served as the ABA Advisor to the Drafting Committee on Partition of Tenancyin-Common Real Property Act for the Commissioners on Uniform State Laws (formerly National Conference of Commissioners of Uniform State Laws), and as a member of the Judicial Partition of Tenancy in Common Property Study Commission for the North Carolina State Legislature and she serves on the Ethics Advisory Committee Member of the North Carolina State Bar.

Craig-Taylor has published numerous articles on land loss in the African-American community and discrimination in the application of laws for minority groups, including women.

A graduate of the University of Alabama Tuscaloosa, where she completed both her undergraduate degree and law degree, she later served as a partner in the law firm of England & Bivens and as a judicial clerk for the Alabama Supreme Court. She later earned a Master of Laws degree at Columbia University.



Okianer CHRISTIAN DARK

Interim Dean Howard University School of Law

Rutgers, J.D. Upsala College, B.A.

Okianer Christian Dark, Interim Dean and Professor of Law, Howard University School of Law, served as the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs for seven years during the tenure of Dean Kurt L. Schmoke. Dean Dark currently specializes in Torts, Products Liability and Health Law. She is a regular lecturer on legal issues in health law at the Howard University Medical School.

She has significant litigation experience as an Assistant United States Attorney in Portland, Oregon, where she received special awards for her handling of affirmative civil rights cases and the development and management of the Community Relations Unit which addressed domestic violence, hate crimes and environmental justice in the district of Oregon; a trial lawyer in the Antitrust and Civil Divisions of the United States Department of Justice; and a Special Assistant U.S. Attorney in the DC Office of the United States Attorney.

Before joining the Howard law faculty she was a tenured full professor at T.C. Williams School of Law, University of Richmond in Richmond, Virginia, where she taught Antitrust, Torts, and advanced level Torts courses. At the University of Richmond, she became the first African American tenured at the law school and the first African American woman tenured at the University. Dean Dark is very active within the legal professional community having served twice as a member of the Board of Trustees for the Law School Admission Council; as a member or chair of working and standing committees for the Association of American Law Schools; and as a member of the Diversity Committee for the ABA Section of Legal Education and the Bar.

Dean Dark has received many awards for her work as a litigator, as an educator and for her many contributions to the communities where she works and lives. Presently, she is president of the Silver Spring (Maryland) Chapter of the Links, Inc.

She received her B.A. magna cum laude from Upsala College, East Orange, New Jersey, and her J.D. from Rutgers-Newark University School of Law, Newark, New Jersey, where she was the recipient of the Alumni Senior Prize (graduating senior exhibiting highest achievement in law school and potential for success in the legal profession). Dean Dark is a member of the New Jersey and Pennsylvania Bars.



Christopher EDLEY, JR.

Dean Co-Director, The Chief Justice Earl Warren Institute on Law and Social Policy; The Honorable William H. Orrick, Jr. Distinguished Chair UC Berkeley School of Law

Harvard University, J.D. Harvard University, M.P.P. Swarthmore College, B.A.

Christopher Edley, Jr. joined Boalt Hall as dean and professor of law in 2004, after twenty-three years as a professor at Harvard Law School. He earned a law degree and a master's degree in public policy from Harvard University, where he served as an editor and officer of the Harvard Law Review. Edley's academic work is primarily in the areas of civil rights and administrative law. Edley was co-founder of the Harvard Civil Rights Project, a renowned multidisciplinary research and policy think tank focused on issues of racial justice. His publications include Not All Black and White: Affirmative Action, Race and American Values and Administrative Law: Rethinking Judicial Control of Bureaucracy.mMost recently, he edited the book Changing Places: How Communities Will Improve the Health of Boys of Color with Jorge Ruiz de Velasco.

Following his graduation, Edley joined President Carter's administration as assistant director of the White House domestic policy staff, where his responsibilities included welfare reform, food stamps, child welfare, disability issues, and social security. He served as national issues director throughout the 1987-88 Dukakis presidential campaign, and then as a senior adviser on economic policy for President Bill Clinton's transition team in 1992. In the Clinton administration, he worked as associate director for economics and government at the White House Office of Management and Budget from 1993 to 1995. There, he oversaw a staff of seventy civil servants responsible for White House supervision of budget, legislative and management issues in five cabinet departments (Justice, Treasury, Transportation, Housing & Urban Development, Commerce) and a diverse group of more than forty autonomous agencies, including: FEMA, FCC, General Services Administration, SBA, SEC, CFTC, EEOC, the bank regulatory agencies, and the District of Columbia. In 1995 he was also special counsel to the President, directing the White House review of affirmative action. He later served the Clinton White House in 1997 as a consultant to the President's advisory board on the race initiative.

In February 2011, Edley was appointed as co-chair of the twentyeight- member Equity & Excellence Commission. This commission created by the US Department of Education is tasked with collecting information, analyzing issues, and obtaining broad public input regarding how the Federal government can increase educational opportunity by improving school funding equity. The Commission will also make recommendations for restructuring school finance systems to achieve equity in the distribution of educational resources.



Joanne **EPPS**

Dean Temple University Beasley School of Law

Yale Law School, J.D. Trinity College, B.A.

Joanne A. Epps assumed the deanship of the Beasley School of Law on July 1, 2008. Dean Epps has been on the faculty at Temple Law School since 1985, and served as the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs from 1989-2008. Mentioned as a possible Obama choice for the Supreme Court of the United States, Dean Epps is that increasingly rare legal scholar who is revered both for her academic contributions and her experience as a prosecutor in the state and federal courts.

Her involvement in the greater community includes service as an officer of the American Bar Association Section of Litigation and on the Board of Directors of the Defender Association of Philadelphia, the Committee of Seventy, and the Salvation Army of Philadelphia. Dean Epps is the Treasurer and President-Elect of the Pennsylvania Women's Forum and has been appointed by Philadelphia Mayor Michael Nutter as the official monitor of the City's compliance with the settlement of Bailey v. City of Philadelphia.

In addition to teaching at Temple Law's Philadelphia campus, Dean Epps has taught in China, in Japan, at the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda, and twice in a program for Sudanese Lawyers working with victims of the Darfur crisis. Dean Epps' awards include: the Doris May Harris Image Award from the National Bar Association's Women Lawyers Division, the Sandra Day O'Connor Award from the Philadelphia Bar Association, and the Wiley E. Branton Award from the National Bar Association. She was one of three winners of the 2002 Women Making History Award presented by the Greater Philadelphia Chapter of the National Association of Women Business Owners, and was honored as one of the 2008 Women of the Year by the Legal Intelligencer and the Pennsylvania Law Weekly.

Dean Epps earned her JDJ.D. from Yale University and her BA. from Trinity College.



Phoebe A. HADDON

Dean and Professor of Law University of Maryland School of Law

Yale Law School, LL.M. Duquesne University School of Law, J.D. Smith College, B.A.

Dean Haddon is a widely respected national leader in legal education and an expert in jury participation, the courts and diversity. A fourth-generation lawyer, she was appointed in 2009 Dean of the University of Maryland School of Law, the nation's third-oldest law school, founded in 1816.

Dean Haddon joined Maryland Law after more than twenty-five years as a distinguished faculty member at the Temple University Beasley School of Law in Philadelphia. An accomplished scholar on constitutional law and tort law, Dean Haddon is the co-author of two casebooks in those fields and has written numerous scholarly articles on equal protection, jury participation, academic freedom and diversity. She is currently on the board of The Constitution Project, a national nonpartisan effort to promote and safeguard the nation's founding charter. Under Dean Haddon's leadership, Maryland Law's reputation and resources have continued to grow. In 2011, the school's national rankings rose six spots—the greatest increase of any top-tier law school. That same year, the school also received a thirty- million-dollar gift from the W. P. Carey Foundation.

She received the 2011 Great Teacher Award from the Society of American Law Teachers (SALT) and was until recently on

the Council of the American Bar Association Section on Legal Education and Admission to the Bar, the official accrediting body of American law schools. She has also served as co-president of the board of governors and member of the executive committee of the Society of American Law Teachers, as a member of the executive committee of the Association of American Law Schools, and a trustee of the Law School Admissions Council.

Since joining Maryland Law, Dean Haddon has quickly become engaged in city and state-wide organizations. In 2010, she was honored by The Daily Record as one of the year's most influential Marylanders and by the Reginald F. Lewis Museum of Maryland African American History and Culture. She is on the board of the Baltimore Leadership School for Young Women and is a member of the Lawyers' Round Table and the 2011 class of Leadership Maryland.

Dean Haddon lives in Baltimore's Inner Harbor with her husband Frank M. McClellan, who is a Professor of Law Emeritus of the Beasley School of Law of Temple University, and currently serves as the Co-Director of the Center for Health Law, Policy and Practice. She has three children. The youngest, Cara McClellan, recently graduated from Yale University.

Dean and Professor of Law Texas Southern University Thurgood Marshall School of Law

University Of California-Berkeley, L.L.M. State University Of NY-Buffalo, J.D. State University Of NY-Buffalo, B.A.

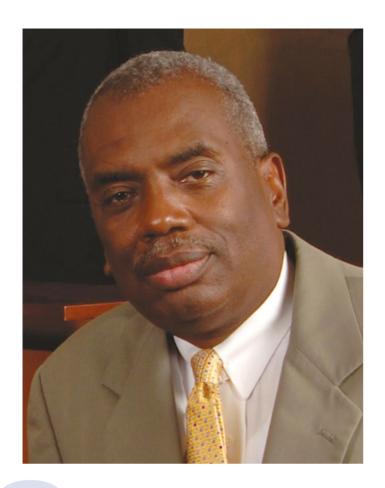
Dannye Holley was appointed Interim Dean of Texas Southern University Thurgood Marshall School of Law in 2009 and later accepted the position permanently. In an interview with The National Jurist, Dean Holley said, "As the generations go by, there are fewer assumptions that can be made about who should be in our law school."

Texas Southern University Thurgood Marshall School of Law is a mission-driven institution dedicated to nurturing a distinct group of law students into leadership roles in the legal profession, business and government.

The law school has nearly sixty years of experience in bringing students into the legal profession. The faculty is a diverse group of teachers and scholars who emphasize teaching excellence, especially in the first year of law school. "The population applying to our school has changed because of competition from other schools that want more diversity," Dean Holley noted. "Minority students now have more options. So we're competing for blacks and Hispanics. We've had to offer lots of scholarships."

George R. JOHNSON

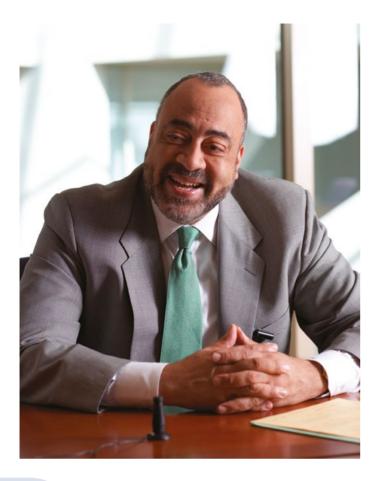
Dean and Professor of Law Elon University School of Law

Columbia University, J.D. Amherst College, B.A.

George R. Johnson Jr., was named Dean of Elon University School of Law on Feb. 3, 2009, after serving six months as interim dean. Johnson joined Elon Law in 2006 as part of the school's founding faculty. He also served as the school's Associate Dean of Academic Affairs and was instrumental in the process that achieved accreditation by the American Bar Association.

Johnson's combination of service in the public and private sectors is a model for students. After earning his law degree from Columbia University in 1976, Johnson began his public service career as assistant counsel for the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs. Johnson joined the Carter administration in 1979 in the Executive Office of the President, serving as assistant general counsel for the White House Council on Wage and Price Stability. Johnson's teaching career began in 1981 when he joined the George Mason University Law School. He joined the Howard University School of Law as visiting professor in 1988, was named a full professor there in 1989 and was named to Associate Dean for Academic Affairs in 1992.

From 1996 to 2002, Johnson served as President of LeMoyne-Owen College, an independent historically black liberal arts college in Memphis, Tennessee. He entered private practice in 2003 serving three years at Saint Louis & Johnson law firm in Washington. Johnson's writings have included a chronicle of the legal status of African Americans from 1790 to 1883 for the African-American Almanac. He also edited a book on the legacy of George Mason, and has written law review articles on coastal zone management, judicial review and enforcement policies of the Occupation Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and the Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA). Johnson has served on the boards of trustees/directors of Amherst College (where he received his bachelor's degree), the United Negro College Fund, the Council of Independent Colleges, the Economic Club of Memphis, and Universal Life Insurance Company.



Donald M. LEWIS

Dean Hamline University School of Law

Harvard Law School, J.D. Northwestern University, B.A.

Donald M. Lewis serves as the tenth Dean of Hamline University School of Law. Before joining Hamline as Dean and Professor of Law, Dean Lewis co-founded Halleland, Lewis, Nilan & Johnson. He was an adjunct faculty member at Hamline from 2004-2008. He previously taught at William Mitchell College of Law.

Dean Lewis was a trial lawyer for nearly thirty years. At Halleland Lewis, his practice has centered on employment litigation and white collar criminal defense. He is a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers, a member of the American Law Institute, and a member of the American Bar Association. He is a co-founder of the Minnesota Association of Black Lawyers and has served on the Board of Governors of the National Bar Association. Prior to his career in private practice, Dean Lewis served for six years as an assistant U.S. attorney in Minnesota and was a trial attorney in the U.S. Justice Department. He also was an attorney at Popham Haik before co-founding Halleland, Lewis, Nilan & Johnson.



Willajeanne MCLEAN

Interim Dean and Professor of Law University of Connecticut School of Law

Lic. en droit, Free University of Brussels (U.L.B.) Fordham University, J.D. Univeristy of Massachusetts, B.S. Wellesley College, B.A.

Willajeanne F. McLean is the interim dean at the University of Connecticut School of Law. As a member of the Connecticut Law faculty, McLean has taught courses in trademarks, European Union law, and torts. She holds undergraduate degrees from Wellesley College (French Lit and European History) and the University of Massachusetts-Amherst (Microbiology). McLean enrolled at Fordham University School of Law after working in a research lab at Sloan-Kettering Cancer Institute. A patent attorney, she practiced law at intellectual property boutique Darby and Darby, where her

work was primarily in the field of trademark law. In addition to her U.S. law studies, McLean attended the Institute of European Studies at the Free University of Brussels, where she obtained a degree in European law. She has also served as an intern in the Competition Division of the European Commission in Brussels. She has guest lectured at a number of universities, and was a Fulbright teaching scholar at the Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznan, Poland.



Blake MORANT

Dean and Professor of Law School of Law at Wake Forest University

University of Virginia, J.D. University of Virginia, B.A.

Prior to serving as Dean of the School of Law at Wake Forest University, Blake served as Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Roy L. Steinheimer, Jr. He was Professor of Law at the Washington and Lee University School of Law, where he had taught since 1997.

Blake Morant is one of the nation's best known and respected legal educators and scholars. He has served in numerous leadership positions in the American Association of Law Schools and the American Bar Association, and he regularly speaks across the country and abroad on legal education, diversity, as well as topics relating to his scholarly interests. He was the first American to deliver the Thomas More Commemorative lecture in Canterbury, England. He has taught at the law schools at American University, University of Toledo, University of Michigan, University of Alabama, and, most recently, Washington & Lee. He has also been a visiting fellow of University College, Oxford. Prior to becoming a legal academic, he served in the Army's Judge Advocate General Corps, as a senior associate with a Washington, D.C. law firm, and as an Assistant General Counsel for the Washington Metropolitan Transit Authority.

The representatives of the House of Delegates of the AALS recently elected Blake to serve a three-year term on its Executive Committee. He has also been selected for the prestigious Equal Justice Works' John R. Kramer Outstanding Law School Dean Award. This award honors a law school dean who has successfully demonstrated leadership in building an institution that nurtures and fortifies a spirit of public service during his tenure at an Equal Justice Works participating member law school.

Blake's wife, Paulette (P.J.), has taught Spanish at Lincoln University, Pennsylvania, and in high schools in North Carolina, Virginia, Michigan and Ohio. P.J. and Blake met as undergraduate students at the University of Virginia. They share many interests, including volunteer: work with civic and church organizations, a love of tennis, and music. Blake regularly serves as cantor at a local church.



Makau W. MUTUA

Dean SUNY Distinguished Professor Floyd H. and Hilda L. Hurst Faculty Scholar SUNY Buffalo Law School, The State University of New York

Harvard Law School, S.J.D. Harvard Law School, L.L.M. University of Dar-es-Salaam, L.LM. University of Dar-es-Salaam, L.LB.

Makau Mutua is Dean, SUNY Distinguished Professor, and the Floyd H. & Hilda L. Hurst Faculty Scholar at SUNY Buffalo Law School, The State University of New York. He is the Director of the Human Rights Center and teaches international human rights, international business transactions, and international law. Professor Mutua has been a Visiting Professor at Harvard Law School, the University of Iowa College of Law, the University of Puerto Rico School of Law, and the United Nations University for Peace in Costa Rica.

He was educated at the University of Nairobi, the University of Dares-Salaam, and at Harvard Law School, where he obtained a Doctorate of Juridical Science in 1987. Professor Mutua was Co-Chair of the 2000 Annual Meeting of the American Society of International Law.

In 2002-03, while on sabbatical in Kenya, Professor Mutua was appointed by the Government of Kenya as Chairman of the Task Force on the Establishment of a Truth, Justice, and Reconciliation Commission. The Task Force recommended a truth commission for Kenya. During the same time, Professor Mutua was a delegate to the National Constitutional Conference, the forum that produced a contested draft constitution for Kenya.

Professor Mutua is the author of Human Rights: A Political and Cultural Critique (2002). He has written numerous scholarly articles exploring topical subjects in international law, human rights, and religion. These include "The Ideology of Human Rights," "Hope and Despair for a New South Africa: the Limits of Rights Discourse," "The Banjul Charter and the African Cultural Fingerprint: an Evaluation of the Language of Duties," and "Why Redraw the Map of Africa: a Moral and Legal Inquiry" published in various law reviews. He has written human rights reports for the United Nations and leading NGOs. He has authored dozens of articles for popular publications such as The New York Times, The Boston Globe, The Christian Science Monitor, Daily Nation, East African Standard, and The Washington Post.

Previously, Professor Mutua was the Associate Director at the Harvard Law School Human Rights Program. He was also the Director of the Africa Project at the Lawyers Committee for Human Rights. He serves as the Chairman of the Kenya Human Rights Commission and sits on the boards of several international organizations, such as Global Rights, and academic journals, such as the Leiden Journal of International Law. He is a frequent commentator on politics, human rights, law, and current affairs in the print and electronic media.

Professor Mutua has conducted numerous human rights, diplomatic, and rule of law missions to countries in Africa, Latin America, and Europe. He has lectured and spoken at public for ain many parts of the world, including Japan, Brazil, France, and Ethiopia.



Camille A. NELSON

Dean and Professor of Law Suffolk University Law School

Columbia Law School, L.LM. University of Ottawa Faculty of Law, J.D. University of Toronto, B.A.

Before joining Suffolk Law, Dean Nelson served as Professor of Law at Hofstra Law School. From 2000 to 2009, she was a member of the faculty of Saint Louis University School of Law, where she was named Law School Faculty Member of the Year in 2004 and received the University Faculty Excellence Award in 2006. She also was a visiting professor at Washington University in St. Louis School of Law, where she became the Dean's Distinguished Scholar in Residence.

Following her undergraduate education at the University of Toronto, Dean Nelson received her law degree from the University of Ottawa Faculty of Law and went on to receive a Master of Laws from Columbia Law School in New York. She clerked for

Justice Frank Iacobucci (pronounced Yak-o-bucci) of the Supreme Court of Canada, the highest court in Canada, before working as a litigation associate at McCarthy Tétrault in Toronto, the largest law firm in Canada.

Dean Nelson is an elected member of the American Law Institute and is widely recognized for her writings and lectures, which have focused on the intersection of critical race theory and cultural studies with particular emphasis on criminal law and procedure, health law, and comparative law. She is widely published internationally and domestically and her scholarship is featured in law reviews, journals, anthologies, legal encyclopedias, governmental and nongovernmental working publications and legal textbooks/casebooks. She has appeared in the media, taught, delivered lectures, and presented in numerous countries, most recently in Jamaica, Lebanon, Sweden, and France.



Mark **NILES**

Dean and Professor of Law Seattle University School of Law

Stanford Law School, J.D. Wesleyan University, B.A.

Mark Niles joined Seattle University School of Law as Dean and Professor of Law on July 1, 2010. He was previously Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Professor at American University, Washington College of Law. He has taught and specializes in civil procedure, administrative law, constitutional law, governmental liability, and law and literature. As Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, he spearheaded significant developments in the first-year curriculum and in academic skills instruction.

After graduating from Stanford Law School, Dean Niles served as a clerk for the Honorable Francis Murnaghan, Jr., of the U.S. Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals, as an associate at the D.C. firm of Hogan and Hartson, and as a staff attorney in the civil appellate division of the U.S. Department of Justice, where he argued cases in several federal circuit courts. LeRoy PERNELL

Dean and Professor of Law Florida A&M College of Law

The Ohio State University College of Law, J.D. Franklin and Marshall College, B.A.

"LeRoy Pernell assumed the deanship of the Florida A&M University College of Law in January 2008. For 10 years, he served as law dean at Northern Illinois University (NIU). Under his leadership, the NIU law school was recognized nationally for its diversity efforts. He also oversaw the expansion of technology into the classroom, the establishment of the clinical educational program and the opening of the Zeke Giorgi Legal Clinic in Rockford, Illinois.

Pernell served as Vice Provost of the Office of Minority Affairs at The Ohio State University (OSU) from 1994 to 1997. He also served as professor at The OSU College of Law from 1975 until leaving for NIU. While at OSU, he was the director of the Council on Legal Education Opportunities (CLEO) Regional Summer Institute and in 1988, a visiting scholar at Columbia University.

Pernell earned his bachelor's degree in government from Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, Pennsylvania in 1971, and received his Juris Doctor from The Ohio State University College of Law in 1974. He was of counsel with the firm Otto Beatty & Associates in Columbus Ohio"



Freddie PITCHER, JR.

Chancellor and Professor of Law Southern University Law Center

Southern University Law Center, J.D. Southern University, B.A.

Judge Freddie Pitcher, Jr., a long time adjunct faculty member, was appointed Chancellor of the Southern University Law Center in November 2002, and was given rank of Full Professor of Law with that appointment.

Judge Pitcher has a career of many firsts. He became the first African American elected to a judgeship in Baton Rouge with his election to the City Court in a city-wide election in April, 1983. He was the first African American elected to the 19th Judicial District in a parishwide election in 1987. In 1992, he achieved another first with his election to the Louisiana First Circuit Court of Appeal, without opposition. Pitcher has also served as an associate justice ad hoc on the Louisiana Supreme Court.

Upon his retirement from the bench in May, 1997, Pitcher was named a partner in the Baton Rouge office of Phelps Dunbar LLP, an international law firm. His practice focused on the areas of commercial, casualty, and employment litigation. He was also a member of the firm's appellate practice group.

Prior to his election to the bench, Judge Pitcher was the principal partner in the firm Pitcher, Tyson, Avery, and Cunningham. He has also served as a special counsel in the Office of the Attorney General for the State of Louisiana, and as an assistant district attorney for East Baton Rouge Parish.

Judge Pitcher is a member of the American Bar Association, National Bar Association, Louisiana State Bar Association, and the Baton Rouge Bar Association. He is admitted to practice before the United States Eastern, Middle, and Western District Courts of Louisiana and the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

He earned the bachelor's degree in political science from Southern University in 1966 and a Juris Doctor degree from Southern in 1973.

Chancellor Pitcher authored over two hundred judicial opinions while serving on the Louisiana First Circuit Court of Appeal.



Vincent D. ROUGEAU

Dean Boston College Law School

Harvard Law School, I.D. Brown University, B.A.

Vincent D. Rougeau became Dean of Boston College Law School on July 1, 2011. He previously served as Professor of Law at Notre Dame, and served as their Associate Dean for Academic Affairs from 1999-2002. He received his BA magna cum laude from Brown University in 1985, and his JD from Harvard Law School in 1988, where he served as articles editor of the Harvard Human Rights Journal.

Shortly after his appointment, Dean Rougeau told *The Boston* Globe, "We're educating professionals who see their role as part of a broader commitment to their communities...not as the solo actor, adversarial lawyer, but as a lawyer who knows and appreciates the power of the profession to do good and to do ill."

An expert in Catholic social thought, Dean Rougeau's most recent book, Christians in the American Empire: Faith and Citizenship in the New World Order, was released in 2008 by Oxford University Press. Using Catholic social teaching and its secular philosophical antecedents as his point of departure, Dean Rougeau explores how key assumptions underlying Catholic thinking diverge from many of the ideas animating American law and public policy in areas like poverty relief, immigration, and redress for racial discrimination.

He also develops an understanding of Christianity as a natural partner for international human rights and a foundation for a legal cosmopolitanism that transcends nation-state boundaries. Prior to his arrival at Boston College, Dean Rougeau was a Senior Fellow at the Contextual Theology Center ("CTC") in London and co-founded an effort called "Just Communities: Christian Witness in a Pluralist Society." Just Communities was a partnership among Notre Dame, the CTC, and Magdalen College, Oxford University that explored the role of religious communities in community organizing and the formation of democratic citizens in the multicultural neighborhoods of East London. He also served as the director of the Notre Dame Law School's Center for Law and Government and supervised the Journal of Law, Ethics, and Public Policy, while a member of the faculty.

Regarding diversity, Dean Rougeau has said, "It's essential to create the kind of community on campus that reflects the world in which we live and the communities we are a part of, especially for lawyers."

Rougeau and his wife, Robin Kornegay Rougeau, have three sons.



Denise W. SPRIGGS

Interim Dean & Associate Professor Charlotte School of Law

Syracuse University School of Law, J.D. City University of New York, M.S. Howard University, B.A.

Denise W. Spriggs joined Charlotte School of Law as the Associate Dean of Students and an Associate Professor in the fall of 2006. Prior to joining CSL, Dean Spriggs served as the Assistant Dean and then the Associate Dean for Student Affairs and Records at Howard University from 1992, until joining Charlotte Law. During her time at Howard, Dean Spriggs was the 1997 recipient of the prestigious Warren S. Rosmarin Award for Excellence in Teaching and Service.

Dean Spriggs has had a long and distinguished career in public service. She began her public service career as a Staff Attorney in Syracuse, New York, with the Legal Services Corporation of Central New York. She also served as Executive Director of the Council on Legal Education Opportunity (CLEO), a program dedicated to providing programs and grants related to increasing minority student enrollment in U.S. law schools.

In the late 1980's Dean Spriggs served as Assistant Dean for Admissions and Minority Affairs at Hofstra University School of Law in Hempstead, New York. During that time she also taught Business Law as an adjunct professor at LaGuardia Community College and was an instructor/consultant at Seton Hall Law School. Earlier in her educational career, Dean Spriggs was Assistant Dean for Student Affairs at Texas Southern University and, prior to that, a former Special Assistant to the Chancellor of Winston-Salem State University.



Athornia STEELE

The Shepard Broad Law Center

Capital University Law School, J.D. Capital University, B.A.

Athornia Steele is Dean of the Shepard Broad Law Center at Nova Southeastern University (NSU). He serves as the chief academic and administrative officer of the Law Center. Prior to his appointment, Steele was on the faculty of Capital University Law School in Columbus, Ohio. He had three stints as an associate dean (1993-94, 1998-2003 and 2004-05) and served as interim dean from 2003-04. While a professor at Capital, Steele taught Business Associations, Corporate Finance and Securities Regulations and focused on governance issues of non-profit organizations. He was also a visiting associate professor of law at Washington and Lee University School of Law in Lexington, Virginia, from 1984-86.

Steele is active in the legal education community and currently serves on the American Bar Association Section of Legal Education and

Admissions to the Bar Committee on Law School Administration. He also served on both national and regional planning committees for the Law School Admission Council (LSAC) Academic Support Workshops from 1993-2001, chaired the Minority Affairs Committee of LSAC, and is a current member of the LSAC Board of Trustees. Columbia University School of Law, J.D. Columbia College, B.A.

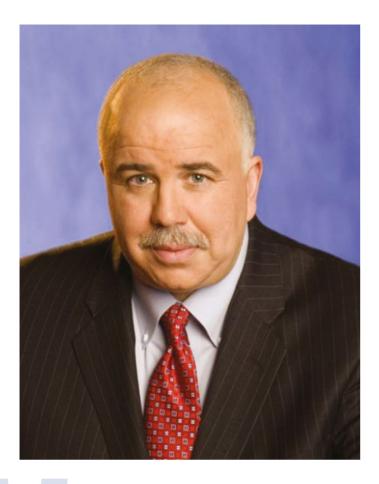
Frederic White is Dean and Professor of Law at Texas Wesleyan University School of Law, a position he has held since fall 2008. As Dean, he is the Chief Academic and Administrative Officer of the School of Law.

Dean White began his legal career in 1973, as an associate attorney in the Cleveland, Ohio, office of the law firm of Squire, Sanders & Dempsey, where he specialized in municipal finance. In 1978, he joined the law faculty of Cleveland-Marshall College of Law, Cleveland State University where he remained until 2004. Besides teaching courses in property, wills and trusts, land use control and local government law, Dean White also served as associate dean for five years. As associate dean he was responsible for supervising admissions, registrar, financial aid, career services, student services, and secretarial services. He also served as chair or a member of the following committees: Faculty Appointments, Academic Standards, Admissions, Library, and Legal Career Opportunities Program (LCOP). He served as Vice President of the University Faculty Senate and as President of the University Black Faculty and Staff Organization.

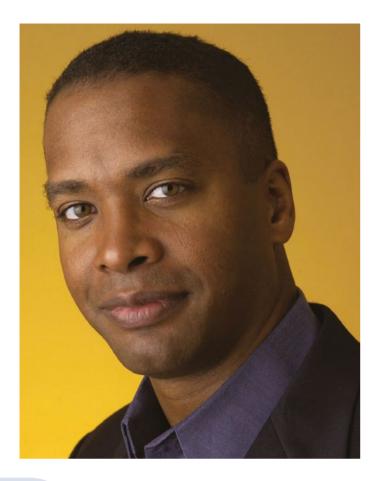

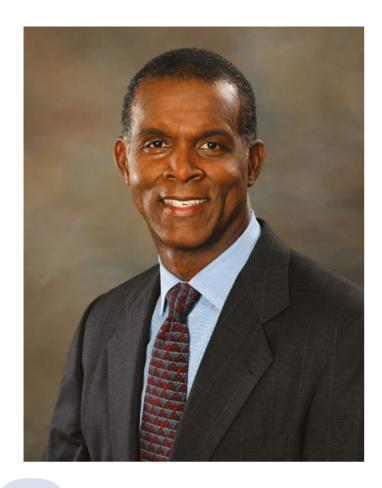

Since Cook became a partner, Arnold & Porter has been recognized repeatedly for its diversity efforts. Among other things, the firm has been awarded the Minority Corporate Counsel Association's Thomas L. Sager Award eight times. The Sager Award is given to law firms that have demonstrated a sustained commitment to improving the hiring, retention and promotion of minority attorneys. Cook currently serves as Chair of the firm's Diversity Committee.

Cook has specialized in telecommunications and cable television law since 1988. He advises clients on the regulatory implications of various telecommunications transactions. He has assisted such clients in obtaining the consent of the Federal Communications Commission, US Department of Justice and state and federal government agencies to mergers and acquisitions involving cable television and

telecommunications companies. 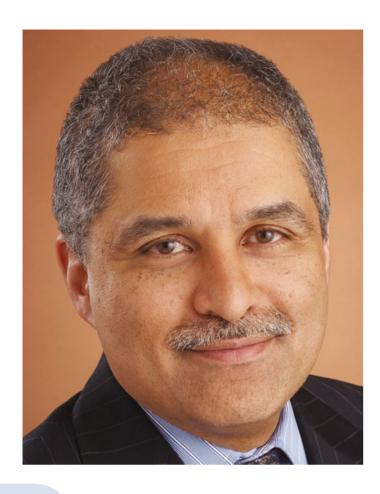

Among his other books on law and politics are God's Name in Vain: The Wrongs and Rights of Religion in Politics; Civility: Manners, Morals, and the Etiquette of Democracy; The Dissent of the Governed: A Meditation on Law, Religion, and Loyalty; The Confirmation Mess: Cleaning up the Federal Appointments Process; and The Culture of Disbelief: How American Law and Politics Trivialize Religious Devotion. Professor Carter writes a column for Bloomberg View and is a regular contributor to Newsweek and The Daily Beast. He blogs about professional football for The Washington Post. Professor Carter also writes fiction. His novel The Emperor of Ocean Park

spent eleven weeks on the New York Times best-seller list. His next novel, The Impeachment of Abraham Lincoln, will be published in 2012. His novella "The Hereditary Thurifer" recently appeared in the crime anthology, The Dark End of the Street.

Professor Carter was formerly a law clerk for Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, as well as for Judge Spottswood W. Robinson, III, of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. He is a graduate of Stanford University and Yale Law School, and has received eight honorary degrees.

Carter was raised in Harlem, in Washington, D.C., and in Ithaca, New York. He and his wife, Enola Aird, have two children, and currently reside in Connecticut.

Attorney Crump was distinguished amongst Florida Trend's Legal Elite and awarded the NAACP Legal Defense Fund Bootstrap Award in tribute to his enduring pursuit of justice, his outstanding advocacy on behalf of many who are without means of redress and for leaving footprints on the sands of time that others can follow. He received his Bachelor's degree in 1992 in Criminal Justice from Florida State University, where he served as two-term Black Student Union President, President of the Order of Omega and the inaugural President of the Burning Spear. He then earned his Juris Doctorate from the FSU College of Law in 1995 and will become the first African-American Chairman of the Law School Board of Directors for the 2009 administration.

Having overcome very humble beginnings in rural North Carolina, Mr. Crump has quickly become one of the most recognizable and successful lawyers in America. In 2002, just five years after beginning his practice, Mr. Crump was inducted into the Million Dollar Advocacy Forum. And after having over twenty (20) verdicts and/or settlements of one million dollars of more, he was inducted into the Multi-Million Dollar Advocacy Forum in 2009. Together with his law partner, he has endowed scholarships at Florida A&M University, Livingston College, and Florida State University for minority law students, as well as a scholarship at Bethune Cookman College. As noted above, as Board Chairman of the Legal Services of North Florida, Attorney Crump donated \$1,000,000.00 to the organization's Capital Campaign to insure that poor people could continue to have quality legal representation and access to the courts.

Billy HUNTER

Executive Director National Basketball Players Association (NBPA)

Boalt Hall Law School at the University of California-Berkeley, LL.M. Howard University Law School, J.D. Syracuse University, B.A.

Taking the helm in 1996, Billy Hunter is the Executive Director of the National Basketball Players Association (NBPA), the union for current professional basketball players in the National Basketball Association (NBA). Under his leadership, NBA players have utilized their collective bargaining power to challenge how the NBA is run and the method in which the money it generates is distributed. Serving as the chief negotiator during the high-profile negotiations that culminated in the 2011 Collective Bargaining Agreement between the NBA and its players, the agreement resulted in assuring that NBA players would maintain their status as the best compensated professional athletes in team sports worldwide.

In order to maintain the organization's status as the preeminent representative of professional basketball players, in 1998 Mr. Hunter formed the Women's National Basketball Players Association (WNBPA), the first major sports union in this country to represent female athletes, which he has headed since its inception. In May 2003, the WNBPA signed a new collective five-year collective bargaining agreement with the WNBA, which increased players' salaries and established free agency for the first time ever in women's professional sports.

Mr. Hunter graduated from Syracuse University, where he was captain of the football team. He received his Juris Doctor degree from Howard University Law School in 1969 and an LL.M. from Boalt Hall Law School at the University of California-Berkeley in 1970.

Mr. Hunter served several years as a prosecutor in the Alameda County District Attorney's office, and as the Chief-Assistant in the San Francisco District Attorney's office, where he supervised the prosecution of all felony and misdemeanor cases.

A member of the Syracuse University Board of Trustees, Mr. Hunter is also a consultant to the China Sports Industry, Inc., which operates the exclusive China Sports Network and manages the marketing and promotion of professional sports in the People's Republic of China. He has been active in local and national politics, serving several years as the Past-President of the Oakland Board of Port Commissioners, wherein he represented on trade missions throughout Southeast Asia and Europe over a period of eleven years. In 1990, he was a candidate for the U.S. Congress.

Maintaining residences in New York City and Oakland, he and his wife, Janice, have three children.



Kenneth MACK

Professor Harvard Law School

Harvard Law School, J.D. Princeton, M.A. Drexel University, B.S.

Kenneth Mack is Professor of Law at Harvard Law School, where he has taught since the 2000-2001 academic year. He is the author of Representing the Race: The Creation of the Civil Rights Lawyer, which tells the story of an enduring paradox of American race relations, through the prism of a collective biography of African American lawyers who worked in the era of segregation. Practicing the law and seeking justice for diverse clients, they confronted a tension between their racial identity as black men and women and their professional identity as lawyers. Both blacks and whites demanded that these attorneys stand apart from their racial community as members of the legal fraternity. Yet, at the same time, they were expected to be "authentic"—that is, in sympathy with the black masses.

Mack's scholarly work focuses on the relationship between identity and civil rights lawyering in the early twentieth century United States. His work has been published in the Cornell Law Review, Law and Social Inquiry, and has been reprinted in several anthologies of interdisciplinary legal scholarship. He earned a BS in Electrical Engineering from Drexel University, a JD from Harvard Law School, and an MA in History from Princeton. During his fellowship year at the Ethics Center, he worked on a book about the role of professional and middle class identity in creating the modern day civil rights lawyer.

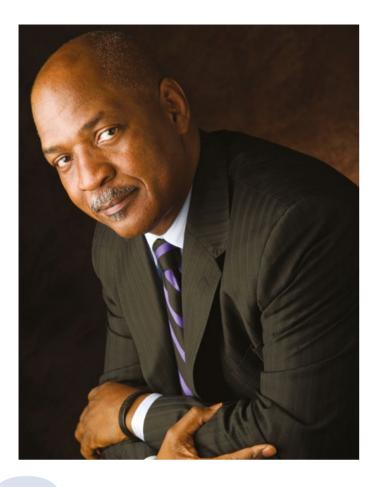

Chair Berrien came to the EEOC from the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund (LDF), where she served as Associate Director-Counsel for five and a half years. In that position, she reported directly to the organization's President and Director-Counsel and assisted with the direction and implementation of LDF's national legal advocacy and scholarship programs.

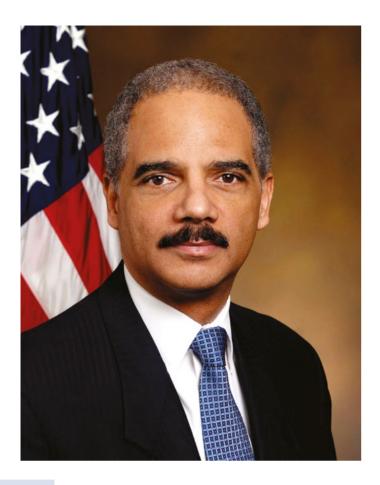

During her tenure with the Ford Foundation, Berrien also co-chaired the Funders' Committee for Civic Participation, a philanthropic affinity group affiliated with the Council on Foundations.

Before joining the Ford Foundation, Berrien practiced civil rights law for more than fifteen years. Between 1994 and 2001, she was

an Assistant Counsel with LDF, where she coordinated all of LDF's work in the area of voting rights and political participation and represented voters in proceedings before the U.S. Supreme Court and federal and state appellate and trial courts. She has published several articles on race and gender discrimination issues and was appointed to the adjunct faculty of New York Law School in 1995. Berrien also taught trial advocacy at Harvard and Fordham law schools.

Chair Berrien is a graduate of Harvard Law School, where she served as a General Editor of the Harvard Civil Rights-Civil Liberties Law Review. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree with High Honors in Government from Oberlin College and also completed a major in English. In her junior year at Oberlin, she received the Harry S. Truman Scholarship in recognition of her leadership potential and commitment to a career in public service. Eric H. Holder, Jr. was sworn in as the eighty-second Attorney General of the United States on February 3, 2009 by Vice President Joe Biden. President Barack Obama announced his intention to nominate Mr. Holder on December 1, 2008.

In 1997, Mr. Holder was named by President Clinton to be the Deputy Attorney General, the first African-American named to that post. Prior to that, he served as U.S. Attorney for the District of Columbia. In 1988, Mr. Holder was nominated by President Reagan to become an Associate Judge of the Superior Court of the District of Columbia.

Mr. Holder, a native of New York City, attended public schools there, graduating from Stuyvesant High School where he earned a Regents Scholarship. He attended Columbia College, majored in American History, and graduated in 1973. He graduated from Columbia Law School in 1976.

While in law school, he clerked at the N.A.A.C.P. Legal Defense Fund and the Department of Justice's Criminal Division. Upon graduating, he moved to Washington and joined the Department of Justice as part of the Attorney General's Honors Program. Jeh Charles Johnson recently resigned from the Department of Defense where he served as General Counsel during President Obama's first administration. In this capacity, he served as the chief legal officer of the Department of Defense and the legal adviser to the Secretary of Defense. He is now expected to return to private practice at Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison, LLP

Mr. Johnson's legal career has been a mixture of private practice and distinguished public service. Mr. Johnson began his career in public service as an Assistant United States Attorney in the Southern District of New York, where he prosecuted public corruption cases. From, 1989 to 1991, as a federal prosecutor, Mr. Johnson tried twelve cases and argued eleven appeals.

Mr. Johnson built upon his early career as an Assistant United States Attorney to become a successful trial lawyer in private practice at the New York City-based law firm of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison, LLP. While at Paul Weiss, he personally tried some of the highest stakes commercial cases of modern times, for corporate clients such as Armstrong World Industries, Citigroup and Salomon Smith Barney. In 2004, Mr. Johnson was elected a Fellow in the prestigious American College of Trial Lawyers.

In October 1998, President Clinton appointed Mr. Johnson to be General Counsel of the Department of the Air Force following nomination and confirmation by the Senate. He served in that position for twenty-seven months and returned to private law practice at Paul Weiss in January, 2001.

While in private practice, Mr. Johnson was active in numerous civil and professional activities. From 2001 to 2004, he chaired the Judiciary Committee of the New York City Bar Association, which rates and approves all the federal, state and local judges in New York City. Mr. Johnson is also a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and was a director or trustee of Adelphi University, the Federal Bar Council, the New York Community Trust, the Fund for Modern Courts, the Legal Aid Society, the Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights Under Law, the New York City Bar Fund, Inc., the Vera Institute, the New York Hall of Science and the Film Society of Lincoln Theater. He was also on the Board of Governors of the Franklin & Eleanor Roosevelt Institute.

Following the 2008 election, Mr. Johnson served on President-Elect Obama's transition team, and was then publicly designated by the President-Elect for nomination to the position of General Counsel of the Department of Defense on January 8, 2009, followed by formal nomination on January 20, 2009, and confirmation by the Senate on February 9, 2009.



Deval PATRICK

Governor
Commonwealth of Massachusetts

Deval Patrick was reelected to a second term as Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in November, 2010, renewing his commitment to expanding opportunity and prosperity in Massachusetts. Governor Patrick's life has charted a path from the South Side of Chicago to the U.S. Justice Department, Fortune 500 boardrooms, and now the Massachusetts State House. In each of these capacities, Governor Patrick has been guided by the advice of his grandmother: hope for the best and work for it.

First elected in 2006 on a platform of hope and change, Governor Patrick entered office propelled by an unprecedented grassroots campaign. Despite a challenging economic environment, the Patrick administration maintained or expanded the state's investment in critical growth sectors while delivering timely budgets and cutting state spending.

Governor Patrick funded public education at the highest levels in the history of the Commonwealth and its school reform initiatives earned Massachusetts the top spot in the national Race to the Top competition. Governor Patrick is a graduate of Harvard College. He is the first member of his family to attend college, and Harvard Law School. After clerking for a federal judge, he led a successful career in the private sector as an attorney and business executive, rising to senior executive positions at Texaco and Coca-Cola. In 1994, President Clinton appointed Patrick as Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights, the nation's top civil rights post.

Kasim Reed was inaugurated as the 59th Mayor of the City of Atlanta on January 4, 2010. Mayor Reed is Chairman of the Transportation and Communications Committee of the U.S. Conference of Mayors and Chairman of the Regional Transit Committee of the Atlanta Regional Commission.

In September 2012, he was named the 6th most influential African-American in the nation by The Root, a publication of the Washington Post Company. The Joint Center for Political and Economic Studies in Washington D.C. honored him in May 2012 with the Louis E. Martin Great American Award. He has been featured in publications including The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal, The Atlanta Journal-Constitution, The Washington Post and Black Enterprise

He is a member of the Aspen Institute-Rodel Fellowship Class of 2007, Leadership Georgia Class of 2000 and Leadership Atlanta

Class of 1998. He served as a Board Member of both the National Black Arts Festival and Metropolitan Atlanta Arts Fund. Prior to his election, Mayor Reed established a track record of leadership during his 11 years as a member of the Georgia General Assembly. He was elected to the Georgia House of Representatives in 1998 and served two terms. From 2002 to 2009, he served in the Georgia State Senate, where he was Vice Chairman of the Senate Democratic Caucus. He is a former partner of Holland and Knight LLP, an international law firm. Mayor Reed grew up in the Cascade community of Southwest Atlanta, where he attended Utoy Springs Elementary School and Westwood High School (now Westlake High School). He is a graduate of Howard University in Washington D.C., where he received his Bachelor of Arts and Juris Doctor degrees and an honorary Doctor of Laws. As an undergraduate member of Howard University's Board of Trustees, he created a fundraising program that has contributed more than \$10 million to the school's endowment since its inception. Mayor Reed was appointed as Howard University's youngest General Trustee in June 2002 and remains a dedicated member of the Board of Trustees.

LDF's legal program is focused in the areas Economic Justice, Criminal Justice, Education, Political Participation, policy and legislative advocacy. Its national litigation practice encompasses trial, appellate, and U.S. Supreme Court cases. In 2009, Debo successfully argued against a constitutional challenge to the core federal preclearance provision of the Voting Rights Act before the U.S. Supreme Court in Northwest Austin Municipal Utility District No. One v. Holder. In 2010, Debo supervised the LDF team that successfully litigated an employment case before the U.S. Supreme Court on behalf of African-American firefighter

applicants in Lewis v. City of Chicago. John Payton argued the case and achieved a rare unanimous ruling in this civil rights case. Drawing upon his litigation expertise, Debo has testified before Congress on multiple occasions. Prior to joining LDF in 2001, Debo was a litigation associate at the law firm of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison for seven years. At Paul, Weiss, Debo worked closely with Judge A. Leon Higginbotham, Jr. on several major cases, and represented the firm's clients in a broad range of civil rights and commercial matters. Debo received a J.D. from New York University School of Law in 1994; and a B.A. in Government from Connecticut College in 1991, where he was awarded the Anna Lord Strauss Medal given annually to the graduating senior who has rendered outstanding college and community service. Debo is a Trustee of Connecticut College and Manhattan Country School.

Sherrilyn Ifill is the seventh President and Director-Counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, Inc. Ms. Ifill is a long-time member of the LDF family. After graduating law school, Ifill served first as a fellow at the American Civil Liberties Union and then for five years as an assistant counsel in LDF's New York office, where she litigated voting rights cases. Among her successful litigation was the landmark Voting Rights Act caseHouston Lawyers' Association vs. Attorney General of Texas, in which the Supreme Court held that judicial elections are covered by the provisions of section 2 of the Voting Rights Act.

In 1993, Ms. Ifill joined the faculty of the University of Maryland School of Law, where, in addition to teaching Civil Procedure, Constitutional Law and variety of seminars, she continued to litigate and consult on a broad and diverse range of civil rights cases while grooming the next generation of civil rights lawyers. In addition to teaching in the classroom, Ms. Ifill launched several innovative legal offerings while at Maryland Law School, including an environmental justice course in which students represented rural communities in

Maryland, and one of the first legal clinics in the nation focused on removing legal barriers to formerly incarcerated persons seeking to responsibly re-enter society. From her base in Baltimore, Ifill emerged as a highly regarded national civil rights strategist and public intellectual whose writings, speeches and media appearances enrich public debate about a range of political and civil rights issues.

A critically acclaimed author, her book "On the Courthouse Lawn: Confronting the Legacy of Lynching in the 21st Century," reflects her lifelong engagement in and analysis of issues of race and American public life. Ifill's scholarly writing has focused on the importance of diversity on the bench, and she is currently writing a book about race and Supreme Court confirmation hearings. Ifill is the immediate past Chair of the Board of U.S. Programs at the Open Society Institute, one of the largest philanthropic supporters of civil rights and social justice organizations in the country.

Ms. Ifill is a graduate of Vassar College, and received her J.D. from New York University School of Law.

She received the Distinguished Black Woman Award from Black Women In Sisterhood for Action (BISA) for her public service. She received the Washington Metropolitan Top Forty Under Forty Award in 2000. In December 2002, the Young Lawyers Section of the Bar Association of the District of Columbia honored her with the first Annice M. Wagner Pioneer Award, named for the then Chief Judge of the District of Columbia Court of Appeals.

Ms. Keenan was a regularly featured attorney on the first season of Fox's "Power of Attorney" television show. She has been a commentator for Fox News and has appeared on Fox's legal program "Dayside". In July 2003, she served as a Guest Host on CNN's Sunday Morning Legal Show "Attorney-At-Law". Ms. Keenan's commitment to the community extends beyond the legal profession. She is a member of the Capitol City Chapter of the Links, Inc. She has served as the appointed Chair of the American Lung Association's (ALA) national Diversity Committee and is a member of its National Assembly.

Keenan is a native of Buffalo, New York. She is a graduate of Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service and the University of Virginia School of Law.

As an Entrepreneur, Morial started several successful small businesses -- an apparel wholesale company, a special events company, and a janitorial company, his first venture at age 15 with two childhood friends.

As a Lawyer, Morial won the Louisiana State Bar Association's Pro Bono Publico Award for his legal service to the poor and disadvantaged. He was also one of the youngest lawyers, at age 26, to argue and win a major case before the Louisiana Supreme Court.

As a Professor, Morial served on the adjunct faculty of Xavier University in Louisiana, where he taught Constitutional Law, and Business Law.

As a Louisiana State Senator, Morial was named Legislative Rookie of the Year, Education Senator of the Year, and Environmental Senator of the Year, while authoring laws on a wide range of important subjects.

As Mayor of New Orleans, Morial was a popular chief executive with a broad multi-racial coalition who led New Orleans' 1990's renaissance, and left office with a 70% approval rating.

With vigor and creativity he passionately attacked his city's vast urban problems. Violent crimes and murders dropped by 60%, the unemployment rate was cut in half, and New Orleans' poverty rate fell according to the 2000 Census.



Fva JEFFERSON PATERSON

President and Co-Founder **Equal Justice Society**

U.C. Berkeley's Boalt Hall School of Law, J.D. Northwestern University, B.A.

Eva Jefferson Paterson has campaigned for civil rights with passion, courage and tenacity for more than three decades. Paterson is the President and a founder of the Equal Justice Society, a national organization dedicated to changing the law through progressive legal theory, public policy and practice.

Prior to taking the helm of the Equal Justice Society in 2003, Paterson worked at the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights for twentysix years, thirteen of them as Executive Director. Paterson led the organization's work providing free legal services to low-income individuals, litigating class action civil rights cases, and advocating for social justice. At the Lawyers' Committee, she was part of a broad coalition that filed the groundbreaking anti-discrimination suit against race and gender discrimination by the San Francisco Fire Department. That lawsuit successfully desegregated the department, winning new opportunities for women and minority firefighters.

Paterson co-founded and chaired the California Coalition for Civil Rights for eighteen years, and was a leading spokesperson in the campaigns against Proposition 187 (anti-immigrant) and Proposition 209 (anti-affirmative action) and numerous other statewide campaigns against the death penalty, juvenile incarceration and discrimination against lesbians and gay men.

Following her graduation from U.C. Berkeley's Boalt Hall School of Law, she worked for the Legal Aid Society of Alameda County and cofounded A Safe Place, a shelter for battered women in Oakland, California. She served as Vice President of the ACLU National Board for eight years, and chaired the boards of Equal Rights Advocates and the San Francisco Bar Association. Paterson has received more than fifty awards, including: the Fay Stender Award from the California Women Lawyers, Woman of the Year from the Black Leadership Forum, the Earl Warren Civil Liberties Award from the ACLU of Northern California, and the Alumni Award of Merit from Northwestern University where she received her B.A. in political science.

Paterson and the Equal Justice Society played a pivotal role in the broad coalition that decisively defeated Ward Connerly's Proposition 54. The dangerous, divisive measure would have banned the collection of racial and ethnic data by any state agency, thus making it virtually impossible to track and document race discrimination or to bring civil rights suits to court. She was a leading spokesperson for the "No on 54" Campaign.

Paterson grew up in a military family in France, England, and southern Illinois. In high school, she traveled the state giving Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" speech. As a junior at Northwestern University, she became the first African American president of student government.

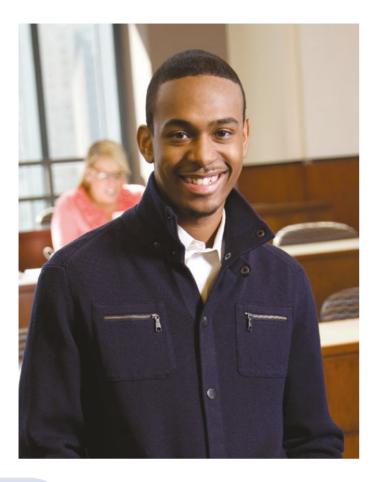

As a high school sophomore in Fredericksburg, Virginia, he left the traditional curriculum to challenge himself as a member of the inaugural class of the Commonwealth Governor's School—a competitive half-day magnet school. Next, as an undergraduate pre-medical student at the University of Virginia, he desired to obtain a well-rounded educational experience before a career in medicine. Through the University's Echols Scholars Program, he developed an interdisciplinary studies honors major to study health and healing across academic disciplines. These studies introduced him to his passion for the elimination of racial and ethnic health disparities in the United States—as well as the social determinants of health that create and perpetuate these inequalities. Just before matriculating into medical school at Wake Forest School of Medicine in 2006, he decided to invest in his development as a social engineer and advocate for equitable health policy through the pursuit of combined studies in medicine and law.

Through his graduate education, Cameron has worked to sharpen his skills as a servant, scholar, and innovator. While serving as the president of his medical school class, he led a group of colleagues in the development of the institution's first and only medical studentrun free clinic—the DEAC clinic. Later, he was elected to serve as the National President of the Student National Medical Association—the nation's oldest and largest medical student organization focused on the needs and concerns of underrepresented minority medical students. In this capacity, he led SNMA in its execution of its 2009 March for Health Equity in Montgomery and Selma, Alabama, as well as a Health Equity Advocacy Tour that spanned eight large metropolitan areas. As a law student at Loyola University Chicago School of Law, he volunteered to assist in the preparations for the school's medicallegal partnership—the Health Justice Project—where he later served as a student attorney. Through this initiative, he represented patients from Chicago's Humboldt Park neighborhood in challenges to secure their rights and defend them against social conditions that were deleterious to their health. Additionally, he served as Editor-at-Large of the Annals of Health Law—the school's health policy and law review. He received his law degree in May 2012.

Currently, Cameron is back at Wake Forest for his final year of medical school. He plans to complete residency in internal medicine, and looks forward to Match Day in March where he will learn of the institution at which his medical career will continue. To continue his health equity advocacy work, he co-founded EquityRx—a non-profit, grassroots health equity organization—in March 2012. Representing the Estate of Martin Luther King, Jr., Mr. Beck successfully sued CBS for infringing Dr. King's copyrighted "I Have A Dream" speech. He won a dismissal of an intellectual property case filed by Ms. Rosa Parks (represented by Johnny Cochran) against the rap group Outkast and he engineered (with Willie Gary who replaced Mr. Cochran after his death) a subsequent amicable settlement. When the owner of the copyright in GONE WITH THE WIND sued Houghton Mifflin in Atlanta over a parody by an African-American author, Mr. Beck prevailed on the grounds of fair use and the First Amendment.

He successfully defended LaFace Records and So So Def Productions (and the artist TLC) in a series of suits in San Francisco and Sacramento, and he brokered an advantageous settlement of a complex copyright infringement action in Boston involving the archive of the late Henry Hampton of "Eyes On The Prize" fame.

Mr. Beck was lead counsel in the recent landmark win in New York dismissing a lawsuit for copyright infringement by the Authors Guild and some 20 other U.S. and international plaintiffs against five prominent universities for scanning millions of in-copyright books, and he has assisted Google, Inc. in similar litigation pending in New York. Last year, he successfully represented Sony Pictures, Adam Sandler and Judd Apatow in a copyright, trademark and unfair competition suit in New York; and he successfully defended Sony Music and So So Def Productions in Houston, Texas for a song produced by Jermain Dupri.

He has been listed in The Best Lawyers In America every year since 1995, and in 2010, was named "Intellectual Property Lawyer of the Year" in a ceremony in London. He has lectured at Harvard and Stanford and, at the request of the U.S. State Department, in Russia and India.

Prior to moving to Atlanta, he served as a legal services attorney for indigents in Washington, D.C., produced a television program on the law for a Washington, D.C. television station, developed a mathematical model of the criminal justice system for the Urban Institute and served in the U.S. Army, receiving the meritorious service medal and two army commendation medals.

In that position, he was responsible for reviewing all U.S. Supreme Court and appellate documents drafted by staff attorneys, as well as memoranda proposing LDF involvement in new cases; providing staff lawyers with training, guidance, information, and assistance on matters such as formulation of legal theories and arguments, strategic considerations, and the practicalities of navigating court processes; overseeing the master litigation calendar to assure timely filings and completion of other tasks related to pending litigation; and developing annual case budgets in conjunction with staff attorneys and management.

Chachkin rejoined LDF in July, 1986. From 1987 until 1994 he again had supervisory responsibility for the Fund's cases in the area of education, working in cases both individually and together with other LDF staff. For example, one such LDF case resulted in 1994 in an order from the U.S. District Court for the Middle District of Alabama enjoining the formation of a new school system by a predominantly white municipality because of the negative impact withdrawal of its students, and its financial resources, would have on the predominantly black school district that would remain, where the original district had not completed the process of school

desegregation and been released from court supervision. In 1991 he also briefed and argued the successful appeal by all parties in the Little Rock, Arkansas inter-district school desegregation case from the district court's order refusing to approve the parties' settlement of the litigation.

In 1995, he assumed the role of Director of Litigation at LDF, ultimately spending a total of 29 years with the organization. He continued throughout his tenure at LDF to serve as principal attorney for plaintiffs in a number of school desegregation cases, and to argue cases in the Courts of Appeals, while also shouldering significant administrative responsibilities as a member of LDF's senior management staff. In 2002, the Garden State Bar Association presented him with its Advocacy and Achievement Award, in recognition of LDF's efforts (which he led) to defend New Jersey's program requiring minority business participation in the State's heavily regulated casino industry.

Since leaving LDF in 2007, Chachkin has continued, as a consultant, to share the knowledge and experience gained in his career with its staff as well as to continue serving as an attorney for plaintiffs in a small number of school desegregation cases.

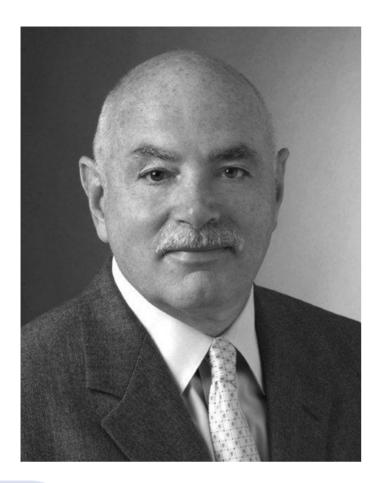

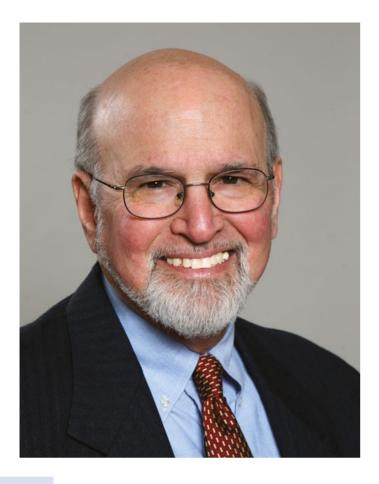

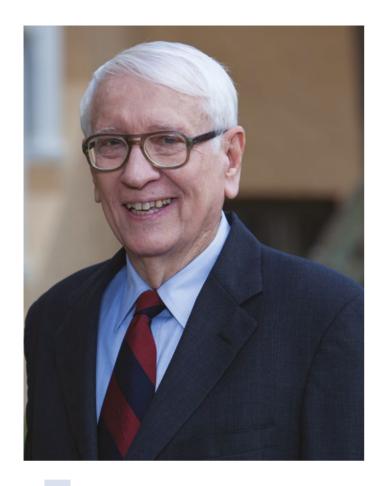
Henry FREEDMAN

Freedman has served as Executive Director of the National Center for Law and Economic Justice since 1971. NCLEJ was founded in the heyday of the civil rights movement, and from the very start its staff joined with southern civil rights lawyers in landmark cases, worked with community-based organizations around the country, won ground-breaking victories in the courts, and achieved major reforms in legislation and agency policies and practices. Through these early successes, NCLEJ demonstrated that the law can be a powerful instrument for improving the lives of the most disadvantaged members of our society. Under Freedman's leadership NCLEJ continues to lead the way in advancing economic justice across the country; securing systemic reform in the delivery of income support and related human services; and safeguarding important legal and constitutional rights.

Before becoming Executive Director, Freedman had been in private practice in New York City and taught at Catholic University Law School in Washington, DC. He has also taught at Columbia and New York University Law Schools, and Columbia and Fordham Schools of Social Work. He has chaired the Committee on Legal Assistance of the New York City Bar Association, was the only "welfare recipient advocate" on HEW Secretary Califano's 32-member group formed to study welfare reform alternatives in 1977, and successfully argued Califano v. Professor Jacob served as professor and director of Clinical Programs at The Ohio State University College of Law from 1971-78, as dean and professor of the Mercer University School of Law from 1978-81, and as vice president of Stetson University and dean of Stetson University College of Law from 1981-94. In 2006, the members of an American Inn of Court in Tampa honored him, naming their Inn the "Bruce R. Jacob Criminal Appellate Inn of Court". Stetson College of Law has established a program called the "Bruce R. Jacob Fellows Program" in which lawyers interested in law school teaching as a career spend two years at Stetson as visiting assistant professors, gaining experience and preparing for careers in legal education.



Lois KIMBOL

Vice President - Programs Philadelphia Diversity Law Group

Lois Kimbol is the Vice President - Programs of the Philadelphia Diversity Law Group ("PDLG"), a consortium of 35 Philadelphia law firms and law departments whose goal is to increase the diversity of the Philadelphia area legal community.

Lois was a primary designer of the lodestar PDLG Summer 1L Program and has chaired the Program since its inception in 2003. The goal of this Program is to interest talented diverse law students in practicing in Philadelphia and to introduce law firms and legal departments to students they might not otherwise meet. Based on a rigorous selection process, talented diverse students completing their first year of law school are afforded opportunities to work for PDLG member law firms and law departments during the summer before their 2L year. Throughout that summer, participants also attend PDLG seminars designed to advance their development. To date, over 250 students, from more than 25 law schools, have been hired through the Program. Many have gone on to work in Philadelphia after their 2L year and to practice here after graduation.

As PDLG Vice President - Programs, Lois has been instrumental in developing and implementing additional PDLG Programs. These include annual programs, such as the Law School Boot Camp (five nights of intense exposure to law school subjects and skills) open to all diverse first year law students and the Exam Prep Program (a one day seminar) for these students as they prepare for their first law school exams. The newest is a series of programs designed to further the careers of diverse new associates at PDLG member law firms by focusing on what an associate has to do - and not do - to excel in his or her associate class.

Shortly after becoming involved with the PDLG, Lois retired as a partner at Dechert LLP in Philadelphia, where she is still of counsel. She was the first Chairperson of the Diversity Committee at Dechert LLP and remained on the Committee for some years after her retirement. Her practice concentrated on environmental law especially its application in corporate transactions, financings, compliance counseling and disclosure under environmental and securities law. When in practice she was listed in The Best Lawyers in America, and frequently wrote and lectured on environmental law topics.

Judge James M. Rosenbaum attended the University of Minnesota, earning his B.A, in 1966, and his J.D. in 1969. His VISTA work took place in Chicago, Illinois, at the Leadership Council for Metropolitan Open Communities. There, he tried federal open housing civil rights cases for three years. In 1982 Judge Rosenbaum was appointed as Minnesota's United States Attorney, serving until 1985, when he was appointed to the United States District Court. He was on the Conference from 1997-2005. During that time, Chief Justice Rehnquist, appointed him to serve, between 1999 and 2001, on the Conference's Executive Committee.

As United States Attorney, he hired the District's first African-American and Native-American Assistant United States Attorneys. While serving as Judge, he hired the District's first African-American law clerk in twenty-five years. That hire was followed by hires of several other clerks of color. He continues to mentor many minority former clerks and judicial interns.

Judge Rosenbaum, for many years, presided over the Hollman case. This was a class-action alleging racial discrimination in the citing and resident-placement in Minneapolis's public housing facilities. Parties included the City of Minneapolis, its City Council, the NAACP, the Minneapolis Urban League, Minnesota's Metropolitan Council, and the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, to name only a few.

The Judge, with his colleagues on the Minnesota Federal court, made Minnesota the first District Court to formally consider a law firm's minority-lawyer participation selecting and appointing class action and MDL steering committee partipants.

The Judge retired from the bench in 2010, and joined JAMS-The Resolution Experts, as a mediator and arbitrator. He continues his involvement in community affairs, currently serving as a member of the Minneapolis Public Housing Board of Commissioners. This appointment continues his interest and participation in race and multicultural housing issues. He has been jointly appointed by Minnesota's Federal Court and the Minnesota Department of Human Services as Vice-Chair of the Minnesota Sexual Offender Program Task Force. This body was created to recommend improvements to Minnesota's program for treatment of sexual offenders to the Court and Department.

The Judge, and his wife Marilyn, herself a Minnesota State Judge, are the parents of three adult daughters.

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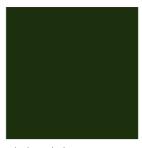
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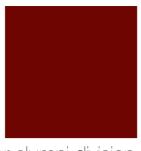
