Angel Dresses

Project "Angel Dresses" is still very active in our parish.

For boys or girls, the ladies make dresses or envelopes, small bonnets and hats, shawls, small pockets to contain souvenirs such as a bracelet or even a strand of hair. These items are given to families in mourning of a premature child or a stillborn baby of full or incomplete term.



We make the little clothes from used wedding dresses or other women's ceremonial clothes. We will then give them to bring comfort to the bereaved families of their baby, allowing them to clothe him for a last photo and the burial service.

We are here to help families who have this need. Welcome to *Manitoba Angel Dresses*, the home of where volunteers lovingly create beautiful angel items from donated bridal and bridesmaid gowns. Our vision and mission are to alleviate the stress for a bereaved family by providing the family with a beautiful item, lovingly created in which to clothe their precious Angel.

Angel Dress kits are available for bereaved families. We have a group of ladies from St. Claude, Haywood, Holland and Cypress who help with the sewing. Each kit contains a hat for girls or a hat for boys, an outfit for Angels and a blanket. Funeral homes and local hospitals have received kits to give to families.

Our volunteer seamstresses have already sewn over 200 garments since the beginning of our project in 2017. I continue to collect used dresses or clothes that will be used for this purpose.

If you want to help in any way, such as donations of dresses, lace, ribbon, appliqués, small beads, etc., to make these outfits, it would be greatly appreciated. We also accept cash donations to cover expenses for such items that we need to purchase. For monetary donations, a tax receipt is available. Happiness here and now!



Trials and tribulations! This Sunday we read about happiness and distress in the biblical texts. The passages begin well, with words of happiness scattered here and there in the first reading and the Gospel. But very quickly, the themes focus on dire scenarios and Christ's words strike a raw nerve. Yet they also comfort us as we face life's difficulties. Though these situations record desperate times, they offer more than just descriptions of such situations.

Jesus speaks of poverty and persecution. If we did not trust Jesus, we would have already tuned out. But as we believe in him, we dare to stay and follow where he wants to lead us despite these difficult words. Jesus does not want us to be consumed by a defeatist mentality, either from an economic or personal point of view. What puts us on a constructive path is his categorical affirmation: *Yours is the kingdom of God*. It is also a positive and future assurance in contrast to what we may be currently experiencing: *Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh*. Whatever situation we are facing, our future is always positive, just as Christ promised.

Jesus acknowledged that his disciples would experience hatred, repulsion, insults and rejection when they proclaimed him. The words of the Son of Man should have attracted respect, for he is the Judge on the final day. We notice that Jesus' words, along with those of his disciples', are rejected. What is interesting is that Jesus warned his disciples not to self promote, without reference to Him, since this was how their ancestors were led astray and ended up believing false prophets. *Woe to you when all speak well of you, for that is what their ancestors did to the false prophets*. According to Jesus, happiness is possible only when the disciples agree to be one in life and death with him. Like the prophets, today's disciples speak for God. By putting their trust in the Lord, their legacy can be compared to a rooted tree that will survive in the midst of drought because it can find water: *This tree shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit*. During a time of drought, the tree will still bear fruit. Our lives may appear to experience seasons of drought in reference to our faith. When the winds of doubt assail us, we find refuge in God's promise to be with us always.

Jesus declared that those who wish to be happy are open to hearing his words. The Gospel does not ask us to disrupt our lives. Poverty is never an end in itself and as Christ said, the means to eliminate it are within our power. Now! St. Luke has punctuated his text four times with this word and not because he lacked vocabulary. It is imperative that we open our eyes to God's gifts that are active in our lives **here and now**.
