Mark your calendar now for June 5, 1976. The Association's Spring Event is a Craft and Antique Show to be held at the Elm Avenue Park from 10:00 A.M. to 6.5:00 P.M. No exhibits will be allowed without prior contract confirmation so apply now and spread the word. For browsers and buyers, entrance fee will be 50¢ per person except for children under 12 who, if escorted, will be admitted free of charge. And, food, fabulous food will be on hand. So plan now to attend.

The Museum itself plans to set up a booth for its members' treasures. If you have antiques or crafts which might be appropriate for the Museum booth, make a list of them. The committee in charge will select a few such items for display and sale. We'll have details later. For the moment, think about what you have and what other people might want to buy.

HISTORIC SITES ON THE TOWN

Charles Crangle is hard at work on his Historic Sites Committee whose purpose is to identify, analyze and catalogue historic properties in Bethlehem. Crangle has divided the town into seven sections. each with a committee to explore the region and choose sites worthy of history's attention. After the initial inventory the entire membership will have a chance to examine the chosen sites and make suggestions. Eventually, the Committee will have a complete survey (with photographs) of the major historic properties in all Bethlehem. When the project is concluded, the Association will present the State with copies of the survey.
