Ponderings From The Pastor

INVESTING IN GOD'S FUTURE: ADDING SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINE

During the years David Letterman did his "Late Show" on CBS, I always got a kick out of his "Top Ten" lists (and many of the guest celebrities he managed to get to poke fun at themselves while doing some of them!). Whether or not you were or are a Letterman fan, his Top Ten lists were rather popular and quite famous for a time. The other day I ran across this non-Letterman Top Ten list...and since on June 24 our congregation affirmed the soon-starting *New Beginnings* process for SPUCC, I want to share it...

****TOP TEN LIST OF WHAT IT MEANS TO BE A SPIRITUAL PERSON TODAY**

Number One—to view the world as an ultimate mystery rather than as a mechanized machine.

Number Two—to view life as meaningful rather than meaningless.

Number Three—to view life as a lesson in gratitude.

Number Four—giving as a matter of obligation for what you owe, not as something that is nice to do.

Number Five—to realize that mind, body, and soul are all gifts of God.

Number Six—acknowledge life's mysteries, even the questions that have no answers.

Number Seven—trust in the goodness of life and all the potential this implies.

Number Eight—always hope and never succumb to despair.

Number Nine—believe that honesty, integrity and dignity matter more than anything else.

Number Ten—entails the belief that every person carries with them the special signature of God.

Now, whole sermons or *series* of sermons could be written about any ONE of these! I don't have the space to unpack all of these here, even a little. But look over the list's items, and take some time to ponder them. Do they ring true for you? Do you do some of these things? Do you do ANY of these things? I could add a few more or change a few, but overall this is a great list. If I was to re-title it, I might be tempted to call it the top ten list of "**Being a Spiritually Mature Person.**" Certainly, we've ALL got some work to do there...myself included!

As St. Paul UCC enters into a time of intentional vision discernment—again, that's what *New Beginnings* is—we NEED spiritual maturity. We ALL have to grow in our faith (we should never stop growing in our faith, of course...but we do...yet that's another sermon series for another time!). I've said it before, and will likely be saying it again: discerning the future vision of this church (any church) is a **SPIRITUAL** process. A new VISION is a REVELATION. It must come from God, a gift, given from OUTSIDE and apart from human knowledge and wisdom. Yes, *New Beginnings* uses "earthly" data, and engages our human intellect and our human hearts. Yes, it uses demographics and physical assessments of the whole life of the church and our community. These are "tools" or "aids" to get us thinking and wondering.

But thinking is not enough. The “data” we gather and learn about, and talk about together, will be only part of the Big Picture...and by themselves are insufficient. What we learn will also be things to PRAY about, and sometimes to PRAY FOR. They will be fuel for the spirit...for meditation, contemplation, for “listening prayer,” and Bible study. Fuel for the mind, yes...but also for the heart and the soul.

Look again at the list above. Note the key words...words like *meaning, mystery, gratitude, hope, potential*...words like *honor, dignity, and respect*. Pray for these things. We need more honesty, respect, and to treat each other with greater dignity here at SPUCC. We need more hope, more comfort with mystery, and to learn better how to be OK with not having all the answers (we’ll for sure be learning some better *questions*—we have to pray about that and be ok with that, too!).

An intentionally-sought, Godly VISION comes to people who are ready for it...SPIRITUALLY ready. Otherwise, such a vision will either be too hot to handle—or it will just be ignored and scoffed at. I for one DO NOT plan to scoff at God! I hope you won’t either. I hope you will PREPARE yourself and help prepare the whole church for God’s “new thing” by taking up a new spiritual practice or discipline. I’ve shared numerous times about what some of the classic spiritual disciplines are and how they work (seek out Richard Foster’s Celebration of Discipline if you need a refresher, or Adele Calhoun’s Spiritual Disciplines Handbook—or ask me! I’ll JOIN you in a new discipline, if I can!).

Also, in more crass-but-practical terms, we’ll be spending somewhere in the neighborhood of \$5,000 for *New Beginnings*. We don’t want to invest this amount (and IT IS AN INVESTMENT) in the future without doing it the right way, or giving the process the best chance to “give us our money’s worth”. The more we can make *New Beginnings* a deeply-spiritual process, the more our investment will pay off. But, if we rely only on our own smarts and human wisdom, and trust only our OWN opinions, and shut our ears and hearts—and if we don’t pray or do true spiritual discernment—we’ll likely be *wasting* that money.

Let’s not do that! Let’s embrace the list above, however, whenever we can. Among the others (they’re all important) let’s understand especially what #5 says: “realize that mind, body, and soul are all gifts of God.” And #8: “always hope and never succumb to despair.” Let’s do #7 well, too: “trust in the goodness of life and all the potential this implies.”

Let’s get busy. Let’s DO A GOD THING! :-)

The list is from by **Rabbi Micah Greenstein, who has served Temple Israel of Memphis for 26 years, 16 as its Senior Rabbi. Named among the city’s most significant leaders, Rabbi Greenstein was recognized as the first “Memphian of the Year” by *Memphis Magazine* in 2013. Council Meeting
May 21, 2018

Present: Mike Bartholomew, Rev. Barry Bordenkircher, Linda Woods, Margaret Maybury, Marge Fassnacht, Jan Apro, Anne Zimmer, Lois Manifold, Rick Davis, Nancy Klusmeier

The meeting was called to order by Council President, Mike Bartholomew, at 7:05 P.M., and Pastor Barry offered an opening prayer. The minutes of the April 16, 2018, Council Meeting were reviewed by Council. A **MOTION** was made (Davis/Apro) to approve the minutes. **MOTION PASSED** and the minutes were approved as printed.

Sr. Minister's Report (Rev. Barry Bordenkircher)

- Pastor Barry submitted to Council his report of mileage and time for April-May, 2018. Highlights: Cluster 2 Pulpit Exchange and Choir Fest; Home Communion; "New Beginnings" prep work; New Member Sunday, contacts and prep; Nursery School Summit #2; Nursery School 2018-19 Budget process; After Church Intergenerational Lunch 4/29; SONKA Meeting; Pentecost/New Member Sunday.
- He still has a few home communion visits left as he's having trouble reach a few.
- "One Call Now" Phone Tree. This service allows 1 person to send a message to a whole list of people. It is \$450 a year. It is web based so it sends text messages or e-mails too. Pastor Barry would like Council to look at this again. Margaret suggested we wait to see what happens at the Congregational Meeting in June. This service would help with those groups meeting regarding New Beginnings.
- Jan asked Pastor Barry about MARCC and what our church gets out of it. Pastor Barry explained that it is the premier interfaith group in the city and that he was getting an education out of it if nothing else. He gave examples of what they do.
- Council reviewed the new "Work Order Request Form" sample. Jan said policy hasn't been written yet but it is an excellent idea. Executive Team has already approved it. A **MOTION** was made (Davis/Apro) to accept the new "Work Order Request Form" (policy to be determined). **MOTION PASSED**.
- Pastor Barry distributed and reviewed with Council 2 handouts about "The Hive" which is in Northside and offers classes, events, retreats, etc. It is part of "The Parish Collective" which is a grassroots organization which he has joined to network with other organizations, etc. There is a 2-day conference this summer (or fall) that could help with that.

Care Team (Marge Fassnacht)

- Marge reports that Mission pledges are down.
- She resigned from Mt. Healthy Alliance and Roxanne has taken over for her. They have a new Zone director (husband and wife team). Marge said she was upset and frustrated because she felt protocol was not being followed there. Right now she doesn't want any money going to The Zone but to Mt. Healthy Pantry instead. Pastor Barry suggested going to the local pastors' board who contribute to it.
- She is working on her Team Report for Anne.

Facilities Team (Rick Davis)

- Rick reported that his Team meets continually by phone. There were many calls regarding the flooding after the recent heavy rainfall. This problem will be ongoing because the main pipes on Hamilton Avenue are too small.
- He has a good quote for the chapel window repair but the guy still hasn't done it because it's not a big enough job, moneywise, to motivate him.
- Flooding insurance claim – We've had 2 floods in the last 6 months. MSD is supposed to reimburse after insurance but are giving him problems.

Facilities Team (Rick Davis)

- Roofing problems – some flashings have cracked.
- Long discussion regarding Kramer Roofing, who we've used in the past, and St. Clair Roofing, who is much cheaper (\$35,000 vs. \$50,000). We've had 3 bids total. A **MOTION** was made (Apro/Manifold) that we accept Perry St. Clair's bid. **MOTION PASSED**. The insurance check is in the bank.
- Jan asked about the sunken sewer in the alleyway. Rick said he will fill it and also the other one again.
- Security update – doors are now being locked 15 minutes after church begins. Key will be in the ushers' closet. Pastor Barry suggested training with the ushers. Mike will talk with Vicky about sending an e-mail to the head ushers. Also, Jan and Mike went to a seminar with Mt. Healthy Police. Discussion.

Finance Team (Margaret Maybury)

- The final money count on the Rummage Sale is \$1,018.61 and there will be more coming in.
- We are \$30,000 less pledged than last year.

Treasurer's Report (Anne Zimmer)

- Anne reviewed with Council the Profit & Loss and Balance Sheet.
- Rick said he doesn't understand negative numbers on the Profit & Loss Statement. Margaret said it's because of the Nursery School reimbursement.
- The checking account is at \$12,854. Payroll with taxes is around \$11,000 (estimated high). She is holding off on paying some things that she can hold off on.
- As always, copies of financial reports are available in the office for anyone who wishes to see them.

Endowment Report (Jan Apro)

- We have \$241,712 in the Endowment. The market is up and down. Our advisor said not to do anything.

Nurture Team (Linda Woods)

- For the summer, they will start a new program for Sunday School – "The Illustrated Earth".
- The Methodist Church that has given scholarships for camp is sponsoring 7 kids this year. Joan had said that we will give them \$100 toward the bus.
- Teacher Recognition/Graduate/Music Sunday is June 10. Also, Anne and Skip will join the church that day. 6 teachers are being recognized.
- Fathers' Day is the 17th. Something special is planned.
- Pastor Barry shared that on June 24th, St. John UCC youth (from Tiffin) are coming. They will be working around church on Tuesday and also help with the dinner.

Welcome Team (Lois Manifold)

- Skip and Anne are joining June 10th.
- Marlene continues to send cards.
- She continues to call and check on people.
- Chrissy Spiers' two children will be baptized soon.
- New Member Sunday went well. Some great people.
- Pastor Barry said that we will probably move to the Chapel starting June 17th (Fathers Day).

- Helped with Choir Fest. It was a success. They made \$1,200 for Mission Priority Board. She is the new Treasurer.
- Attended April Staff Meeting, Nurture Meeting, Tuesday night Community Dinners.
- Visited Nancy Lanza and Erma Amrein.
- Lock-in on the 11th of May – worked in the courtyard. Planted tree for Evelyn. They need men to help out.
- Attended Cluster meeting on May 17th.
- She worked with 2 different families with issues.
- Taught youth class.
- Wrote Epistle article for May.
- SPY is doing a Drive-through Prayer the last Saturday of the month this summer (June 30th, July 28th, and August 25th), from 9-11 A.M. at the church. Everyone is invited. Information is in the Epistle.
- SPY Rock-a-thon after church on June 10th.
- No VBS this year. May resume down the road.

- Nursery School Summit – Things are starting to happen with open communication.

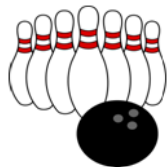
ST. PAUL YOUTH
