

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Grassroots

Members from throughout the country all converge on Washington D.C. and take to Capitol Hill to lobby on behalf of all laboratory professionals.

Now I have been to the Symposium before. I was freshly graduated from college and not seasoned in the least. I was extremely excited to be in D.C. and representing the lab, but I didn't know much about the politics involved nor was I passionate about the topics. But this year! This year was different.

ASCLS asked us to lobby for a new education grant under the Public Health Service Act, Title VII. This grant
would give government money to just lab programs. Not allied health or healthcare in general, just to the
laboratory. Money for online programs or scholarships or clinical sites or whatever we need! Doesn't that sound amazing?!?! And
ASCLS had already drafted the legislature so all that is needed is a sponsor.

An education grant? I knew that was definitely something I could get passionate about! And it was definitely evident when I went to our congressional meetings. Not only did all three of our representative's offices want to see the legislation, Representative Cramer's office wanted to be kept in the loop in the case someone else sponsored the legislation!

I feel like with a little help (maybe from our lobbyist Patrick Cooney or our ND ASCLS members) Rep. Cramer could be the sponsor of this amazing legislation. Now talk about the power grassroots members!

Yes, grassroots members like little ol' me from Jamestown, ND or a little ol' grassroots member like you. I had a ten minute conversation with a legislative aide in Washington and I made a difference. It's really that simple. And what's amazing is ASCLS empowered me, as a grassroots member, to be that difference. And ASCLS will do the same for you.

Do you want to make a difference on the national scene? Like I just said, it's simple and you will have an impact. Contact our congressional members – You can call or email; we have links on our website. If you're passionate about this grant or want to learn more about the other hot topics from the Legislative Symposium, the Leave Behinds are all on our website under the Government Affairs tab. Email our officials these links and tell them WHY these topics are important to you and how they affect everyone in North Dakota.

ASCLS is a grassroots organization. As a grassroots member You Are The Difference.

WHY THE GRANT

Why does this grant affect North Dakotans? Well, we've already lost lab programs in the state; do we really want to lose more? I don't know about other places in the state, but we have a very hard time hiring someone that didn't graduate from a North Dakota program. Less programs = Less grads to hire.

What happens when there's no one to hire? Well, maybe you cut shifts and there's no longer any one working the night shift. That's fine, right? Until it's your dad that goes into the ER at 2 am and has to wait an extra half an hour to get his Troponin result because the lab is on call. Half an hour to a cardiac patient is a long time. Well, maybe you cut the tests offered at your lab. That's fine, too, right? Until your sister is waiting for one test result that will tell her if she has cancer or not. That extra day or two turn around on that test really makes a difference.

But with this grant we could have more programs in the state! More students graduating into our state! More workers coming straight back into our rural economy! Doesn't that sound amazing?
