

I love Easter! There's a real hint of spring in the air. The days are getting longer and warmer, the sun is shining more, and new green shoots are appearing in the ground.

One of the greatest gifts of Easter is to celebrate the love God has shown to each one of us in the Person of Jesus Christ. 
The Easter event reveals to us just how much Father God loves us and the extent to which he was prepared to go to demonstrate his love.

An Unexpected Journey (back to Burnage!) By Rev Ian Thompson

Early in the year of 2006 we received a phone call from one of the church leaders at St Margaret's. News of our planned move away from St Andrew's Church, Higher Blackley after 9 years had reached our friends here who were facing the loss of their own minister, and they wanted to know whether I would consider a return to St Margaret's as the new Rector.

We had never considered the possibility of such a thing happening, if truth be told. We thought our Burnage days were well and truly behind us, having raised our family here, but it seemed God had other ideas! We promised to pray about it. In the meantime, we were both facing major surgery and everything seemed to be conspiring against a move at the time. Also I wasn't even sure whether the Bishop would sanction it.

Well, to cut a longer story short, we did return to Burnage in the summer of 2006 and I was inducted as the new Rector at the beginning of September that same year. God's plans are always the best ones and he is faithful. Over the past 10 years he has guided us, provided for us and sustained us in ministry amongst the lovely people of Burnage. We have thoroughly enjoyed our time back at St Margaret's, renewing old friendships, making new ones too, welcoming new people into the church family, seeing the church family move on and grow and serving the local community in lots of different ways.

Our own family has also grown. Our three daughters, each of whom grew up in Burnage, have all married and between them have produced nine gorgeous grandchildren. Our son, the youngest of our offspring, who had just finished at the Acacias when we first moved away, recently got engaged to a lovely Welsh girl and they plan to marry in Cardiff next February.

2016 is quite a significant year for us as a family. Not only do Jane and I both reach retirement age (65), but others in the family also reach significant birthdays. Debbie, our eldest will be 40 in the summer; Phil, the youngest, will be 30; and Evie, our eldest grandchild, will be 10. As a family we plan to celebrate together these significant landmarks.

This unexpected journey will shortly be drawing to a close as I prepare to retire in just a few weeks' time at the end of March. As mentioned elsewhere in In Touch, my last Sunday in the church as Rector will be Easter Sunday – a fitting occasion on which to finish my ministry. Early in April we will be vacating the Rectory and moving to our new home close to where our youngest daughter, Beth, and her family live in Bury.



We will greatly miss everyone at St Margaret's and in the Burnage community, but will keep in touch. We are not a million miles away! And we will continue to pray for you all as we move on. A verse from the Old Testament prophecy of Jeremiah has been meaningful to us over the years. 'This is what the Lord says, "I know what I'm doing. Messy Church Meeting Changes

Those of you who have been coming along will know that we occasionally had some Sunday meetings when we joined with others who worship at St Margaret's. As a team we now want to make it super easy and establish more rhythm to the year. We have currently decided to have no more Sunday meetings and



we are not having a Messy Good Friday this year.

Messy Church now meets during term time on every second Monday of the month at 3.30pm- 5.30pm.

We meet next on 14th March for our Easter Special. We will explore the Easter Story and celebrate all this means to us. April 11th is in the holidays, so we miss April, then we meet on May 9th, June 13th and July 11th. This 2nd Monday pattern continues through the year in term time.

Messy Church is part of St Margaret's Church. There are many ways to explore and encounter God. It could be termed a Fresh Expression of church.
