## **Opportunity**

Did you know that your fair City has two city halls? Not because part of the City has seceded but because of the foresight of a long-serving mayor, Emmett Pacetti, who saw that the City had outgrown the building it used for years as a police station and city hall. That two-story building is located on the south side of the County's pier park, next to the seawall/beach. Since my office was in the building, I can attest to great views of magnificent sunrises and great nervousness when storms pummeled it. Mayor Pacetti convinced his fellow Commissioners to buy land on State Road A1A where the new police station was built in 1998-99, followed by the city hall in 2000-01.

The question then was what to do with the former city hall. The answer was complicated because the building's age made it important to the City's history and sentimentally significant to some residents. Thus, Mayor Pacetti's proposal that it be torn down was strongly resisted.

It had been built as a hotel/bath

house in the late 1930's by President Franklin Roosevelt's Works Progress Administration, a program that provided work to Americans made jobless by the Great Depression. The building was part of the pier recreation area to attract visitors and benefit the local economy. In 1964, for the princely sum of \$40,000, the County sold that building to the City, plus an adjacent smaller one and a strip of land between the beach and A1A Beach Boulevard. There was also a sister hotel/ bath house built on the pier's north side. After it was significantly damaged by a storm in the mid-1980s, the County demolished it.

The south building survived that and many storms and for years provided rental income to the City from such uses as an arcade, dance studio, bowling alley and apartments on the second floor. Eventually, a section housed the Police Department. Between 1964 and 1985, the adjacent smaller building was the city hall and later Building Department offices. In 1985, after renovations to its ground floor, the larger building became the city hall. The second floor was no longer used.

In 2001, the City Commission approved

a 25-year lease with the St. Johns Cultural Council for the former city hall to be an arts center with artist studios on the second floor. The Council renovated the ground floor for The Dance Company, which later leased a section to The Art Studio Group. The second floor remained unused because of the significant cost to repair it.

What's happening now? The Cultural Council has an energetic executive director, Christina Parrish Stone, who with Ms. Leslee Keyes, a heritage and preservation consultant, obtained the federal government's historic designation for the building. Ms. Stone is seeking grants to repair the second floor. The City Commission has scheduled a workshop to discuss the building's future on Wednesday, March 23, 2022 at 5 p.m., to which the public is invited. 



#### "I'm afraid if I move it will hurt

I have recently seen several patients not polarizing. The longer one is in pain referred to physical therapy because of decreased strength, endurance, loss of balance or pain due to decreased activity during covid. Many have come in asking, 'Is it okay to move when it hurts?" I have to tell them the answer lies in the cause of the pain and whether it is what some call 'good pain' or 'bad pain'. The follow-up question to that is, Can pain be good? The emotional response is a resounding 'NO'. The sensory response is 'sometimes'. Herein lies the discussion of this column.

How can pain be good? It's certainly not pleasant. In fact the International Association for the Study of Pain defined pain as "an unpleasant sensory and emotional experience associated with actual or potential damage, or described in terms of such damage.

Simply put it means pain has two components, 1) sensory and 2) emotional, which are triggered by actual or potential damage. Actual damage is hammer + thumb. Potential damage causes one to put hands in the pockets when any hammer is in sight.

So, can pain be good? YES, but keep reading. Pain can protect instantaneously, especially if we touch something hot. It is pain that causes the withdrawal, hopefully minimizing the damage. Pain can protect us over the long haul. If I slip and fall on a wet surface, the pain will cause be to proceed with caution next time as to avoid another painful experience. If swelling is a result of the fall, I will move cautiously so the tissues have a chance to heal, but I should move.

Therefore, is all pain good? The answer is no. Pain can be bad when it is not understood and life changing. By polarizing, I mean it causes one not to move, producing changes in function. In all the examples provided above the cause of the pain is understood and therefore

or worse, not understood, it becomes 'neuropathic'. Neuropathic pain is a result of changes in the nervous system. Neuropathic pain does not require tissue damage and can be quite debilitating.

How can you tell the difference?

Acute pain, that which is a result of a mechanical, chemical or temperature stimulus should be immediate, protective and proportional. It should also be short in duration. Sub-acute pain may last hours to days, is protective and usually resolved with tissue recovery. Chronic or neuropathic pain is persistent and may be experienced in the absence of tissue damage. Because no mechanical explanation can be given, fear of movement becomes a proponent.

The explanation provided is not meant to be exhaustive but may help you better understand your pain. It is always advisable to consult your MD, PT or OT. They can help determine whether the pain experience is 'normal', 'neuropathic' or something else. Age is not necessary a cause of pain but we'll leave that for another column.

## **Computer Corner**

## **Quickly Search Everywhere**

Have you ever saved a document and been unable to find where it got saved to? Many times, we can be in a rush and forget to ensure that we save a file where we want it to be. This can make it difficult to find later.

In Windows all you need to do is hit the Windows Logo key (two keys to the left of the spacebar) and start typing the name of the file. If it is a text document (not a picture), you can even search using words that you know are inside of the document. Sorry, Windows can't find words in a picture, yet. What sorts of things will a Windows Search find?

Files located on your Local hard drive and also on Microsoft OneDrive (Microsoft's Cloud storage system) Typically these are files or documents that you have created or downloaded.

Applications (installed or available to be installed) can be quickly found using this search technique. Sometimes Windows updates will remove the icons on the desktop or taskbar, so Search is a great way to find them again.

Windows Settings items like volume control, backup settings, etc. can be found very quickly by using this search method. If you want to change the brightness of your screen, simply search Brightness, and voila! you'll see a link to take you straight to that setting.

Web Search results also show in the results. So, if you search for an application like Solitaire, you'll also see webpage results about Solitaire.

Having a plan for where you keep certain documents and files help as well. I like to create folders in Documents and Pictures so that I can keep my files grouped up and accessible by Subject.

In my Business folder, I have an Articles folder, which is where this article will be found. I also have an Advertising folder, where the ad (just below) will be found. So, when I hit Save on this article, I am going to make sure I save it into the correct folder inside of my business folder. A little planning may prevent the need for Windows Search, but it is nice to know it is there.
