Namibia in 2011

The International Association of Special Education in collaboration with the Faculty of Education at the University of Namibia and the School of Education at Pacific Lutheran University will conduct the 12th Biennial Conference at the University of Namibia in Windhoek, Namibia on July 10-14, 2011.



The University of Namibia

The University of Namibia is a leading public higher education institution with a student population close to 10,000 students each year. Academic programs include agriculture and natural resources, economics and management sciences, education, humanities and social sciences, law, medical sciences and health sciences. A young, but dynamic and committed faculty and competent administrative support staff has earned UNAM a rating of being one of the top rated African Universities.

To date UNAM has graduated over 12,000 students who are serving the country in various sectors of the economy with most occupying prominent positions in the government and private sector.



Windhoek's Children

Windhoek is located about 30 minutes from Hosea Kutako International Airport and 5 minutes from Eros Domestic Airport (for travelers within Africa). While most visitors fly from Europe or South

Africa, there are connecting flights from United States (Delta, British Airways, Air Namibia, Lufthansa, South African Airways and Air Berlin have regularly scheduled flights). You can also reach Windhoek by land with luxury buses traveling from Johannesburg and Cape Town in South Africa. Buses are also available from Botswana and Zambia. Most tourists do not need to get a visa to visit Namibia as long as they don't stay longer than 90 days.

There are a number of excellent hotels in Windhoek that are about 5 miles from the university. Many bed and breakfast places are within walking distance of the university. There are also a variety of low cost lodgings within a short, inexpensive taxi ride of the university.

Namibia lies in Southern Africa between Angola and South Africa. It is the youngest country in Africa. With independence from South Africa in 1990, the government introduced far-reaching reforms allocating over 25% of its budget to the education sector to build classrooms and enlarge its teaching force. English is the official language.

Namibia is a desert country of stark beauty with one of the world's wildest coastlines. The terrain is mostly high plateau with the Namib Desert along coast and the Kalahari Desert in east. Namibia contains the tallest and oldest sand dunes in the world (Sossusvlei), the second largest canyon in the world (Fish River Canyon), and one of the largest game reserves in Africa (Etosha National Park).

The sand dunes of Sossusvlei in the Namib Desert are often referred to as the highest dunes in the world. Sossusvlei is one of the most spectacular sights in Namibia. It is located in Naukluft Park, the largest conservation area in Africa, and fourth largest in the world.

The Fish River Canyon is one of the most impressive natural beauties in the southern part of Namibia. It developed predominantly during the pluvial times - a rainy climatic epoch - many millions of years ago. With a depth of up to 550 meters, the Fish River Canyon is the second largest canyon in the world, after the Grand Canyon in America. The Fish River Canyon probably formed about 500 million years ago. The gorge was created by water erosion and through the collapse of the valley bottom due to movements in the earth's crust.

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Volunteering in Visakhapatnam

This past summer I had the privilege to volunteer at Lebenshilfe School run by Saraswathi Devi in Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh, India. Lebenshilfe is a school and hostel for over 400 students and adults with varying degrees of cognitive delay. About 100 of the students live on site during the school session.

I was there to work with staff on programming and brainstorming for children with the more severe disabilities and multiple handicaps. We had weekly workshops on Saturdays and discussed communication styles, goal planning in diverse groups, low-cost/no-cost materials, and using games and activities in the classroom.

The staff was warm, welcoming and receptive to new ideas. I learned as much from them as they did from me. The children were delightful and the staff was kind and helpful.

India has a rich, unique culture and a different reality than rural Montana and it became quite apparent that we take much for granted in the US that cannot be assumed elsewhere in the world.

It was an experience I would not trade for anything, and I intend to continue to volunteer anywhere I might be helpful as often as I can.


The venue was Andhra University in Visakhapatnam, India. Over 899 registrants participated in this exciting, well-coordinated three-day conference.

Etosha National Park is one of Southern Africa's finest and most important Game Reserves. It covers an area of 22,270 square km, and is home to 114 mammal species, 340 bird species, 110 reptile/amphibian species and, surprisingly, one species of fish. The game viewing in Etosha National Park is excellent. Visitors can expect to see many buck species, elephant, giraffe, rhino and lions.

IASE member, Anu Chadha, invited students from the State University of New York to visit the Sankalp Centers in rural Hisar, north of Delhi. The Sankalp Centers provide education for the children of rag pickers who have not had the opportunity to attend school. The Oswego delegation visited the Centers in January 2010 as part of their studies. EDU 382/GLS 399 was

designed to foster an understanding of the relationship between schools and society both in the United States and in India. Visits to the schools in India provided the students with a better understanding of how the Indian education system mirrors, parallels, and contrasts with the American school experiences for disadvantaged students and students with special needs.

During their stay in India the students visited the Faith Foundation School located in the slums at Vasant Vihar, New Delhi. They were surprised to see how well the students were doing and how happy they were.
