VISA REQUIREMENTS FOR FOREIGN-TRAINED OTS CLARIFIED

The U.S. Citizen and Immigration Services (USCIS) within the Department of Homeland Security issued a memorandum to the standards for adjudicating H-1B petitions filed on behalf of beneficiaries seeking employment in health care specialty occupations, including occupational therapy and physical therapy. Prior to the memo, USCIS was denying H1-Bs for occupational therapists and physical therapists who did not have master's degrees after misinterpreting academic and education requirements cited in the Department of Labor's Occupational Outlook Handbook. The National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy raised concerns about this issue with USCIS and provided a deposition in legal action filed by three health care personnel recruiting firms against the Department of Homeland Security in U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia. Rather than continuing with the legal process, USCIS issued the memorandum, which essentially states that master's degrees are not required for OTs and PTs seeking H1-B visas. A Resource on Cultural Issues

Multiculturalism, Diversity and Inclusion Exchange Diversity Tool Kit

was presented at the 89th AOTA Conference and Expo in Houston, TX, for the first time. The toolkit was developed by the multicultural, diversity and inclusion (MDI) groups recognized by AOTA. Besides the Association of Asian Pacific Occupational Therapists in America, the other groups are the Black Occupational Therapy Caucus, the Terapia Ocupacional para Diversidad, Oportunidad y Solidaridad (TODOS) Network of Hispanic Providers, the Network for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual & Transgender Concerns in Occupational Therapy, the Network of Native American Practitioners, the Network of Occupational Therapy Practitioners with Disabilities and their Supporters, and the Orthodox Jewish Occupational Therapy Caucus. The toolkit is aimed as a resource to OT students and clinicians acting as a compilation of sources that may be accessed on issues relating to multiculturalism, diversity, inclusion, and cultural competency. "ELDP" or Emerging Leaders Development Program was a charge from AOTA's Representative Assembly. It is a mentorship program for OT students about to finish their education or new grads out less than 3 years who are interested in professional leadership endeavors. Applicants are selected based on their leadership goals and experiences so that they can be mentored for one year in order to then serve in some service/leadership capacity at AOTA. The selected person will be required to attend a twoday workshop sponsored by AOTA to get started. The program has just been approved by AOTA and is slated to begin in early November.

AAPOTA stands for Association of Asian-Pacific Occupational Therapists in America and is one of the Multicultural, Diversity, and Inclusion Network groups recognized by AOTA.

The mission of AAPOTA is to advance a greater understanding of Asian-Pacific cultural issues affecting occupational therapy practice and to support career opportunities and advancements in occupational therapy by people of Asian-Pacific heritage. AAPOTA was founded in 1994 and organized by Asian-Pacific American occupational therapy practitioners, who felt a need to support one another, promote more Asian-Pacifi c Americans to enter the profession; facilitate the assimilation of Asian-Pacifi c practitioners who are recent immigrants; collaborate with occupational therapy practitioners in the Asian-Pacifi c regions of the world; and educate the profession and AOTA about the culture and needs of Asian-Pacifi c students, practitioners, and consumers.

Membership is open to all individuals who support the AAPOTA mission and purpose. Our diverse society demands that practitioners develop and practice multicultural awareness. The U.S. Census Bureau reports that about 5.3% of residents identify themselves as Asian-Pacific, and by 2050 this number is expected to increase by more than 153%. AAPOTA offers free information on cultural beliefs and other related issues pertinent to the health care and occupational needs of Asian-Pacifi c consumers. Considering the significant need for promoting awareness in government, public and private sector and to the masses, the All India Occupational Therapists' Association (AIOTA) bid to host the 30th Council Meeting of World Federation of Occupational Therapists (WFOT) in India.

Upon the request of India's delegate & president of AIOTA, Dr. Anil K. Srivastava, the WFOT Executive Management Committee included India just at the nick of time to participate in the bid that included Denmark and Italy. The Indian presentation during the 28th WFOT Council Meeting at City Hotel, Ljubljana, Slovenia, was appreciated by all and after confidential voting, India succeeded with a good margin and won the bid to host the 30th WFOT Council Meeting in 2012, tentatively in New Delhi. It would certainly help a multidimensional growth of the profession in India.

The 29th WFOT Council Meeting and 15th WFOT Congress is scheduled in Chile. Japan won the bid over Netherland and South Africa and will host the 16th WFOT Congress in 2014.
