Kairos Moments ...

(10/4/22) Reflections of Reverend Pamela Moyer

Happy Autumn! While this is usually my favorite time of year, the hurricanes, clouds, rains, and cold temperatures have 'dampened' peoples' spirits! Ok, too much time with the Potters and their wonderful puns. In any case, we do raise our prayers and love to those folks in Puerto Rico, Cuba, Florida, and North and South Carolina who lost lives and property from Hurricane Ian. Be cautious about how you choose to donate to assist with recovery efforts. Our denomination committed Disaster Teams IRL (in real life) and has created online donation portals that will directly serve needs – <u>CBF</u>, and <u>BGAV</u> and CWS/CROP walk. Dishonest Scam fundraisers are popping up already. Check with the office or a church leader if you're not sure.

We have been praying hard this fall for the condition of our world, its leaders, and its people. We remembered 9/11 which fell on Sunday this year at the same time Great Britain was grieving the loss of her queen. Then hurricane Fiona ravaged the Caribbean and Canada, before Ian hit a week later. And yes, the violence on our streets continues, while the stock market remains volatile. People who do not know God personally wring their hands in fear and frustration; we who know and live for Christ may wring our hands too, but we first get on our knees in humility for all the good In our world and lives. Or have you ever tried to patch over a hole, a stain, or a tear in those favorite jeans? I admit to owning a few "loved-to-death" garments, and made my mistakes using a brand new patch. After the first washing, it destroyed the garment I loved. The Kingdom Jesus shares is brand new cloth and cannot be attached to cover a flaw in old systems; rather, he brings to us a whole new existence! John the Baptist had his purpose to patch up the old system and to prepare folks to meet Jesus; but now the Messiah is here, and his purpose is not to mend the old systems or humans with new patches (or new wine), but he offers us spiritual healing through total metamorphosis! Let us live this new life in a new way with the new cloth that Christ has given us! October Health Focus

Did you know that 100 years ago, an influenza (flu) pandemic swept the globe, infecting an estimated 1/3 of the world's population and killing at least 50 million people? The pandemic's death toll was greater than the total number of military and civilian deaths from World War I, which was happening simultaneously. That pandemic is commonly believed to have occurred in three waves. Unusual flu-like activity was first identified in U.S. military personnel at Camp Funston in Fort Riley Kansas during the spring of 1918. Flu spread rapidly in military barracks where men shared close quarters. The second wave occurred during the fall of 1918 and was the most severe. A third wave of illness occurred during the winter and spring of 1919.

With no vaccine to protect against influenza infection and no antibiotics to treat secondary bacterial infections that can be associated with influenza infections, control efforts worldwide were limited to non-pharmaceutical interventions such as isolation, quarantine, good personal hygiene, use of disinfectants, and limitations of public gatherings, which were applied unevenly.

Why is this important? The science of influenza and medicine have come a long way in 100 years! However as we enter the flu season, please remember that non-pharmaceutical interventions such as washing your hands often, covering your cough and staying home when you are sick are still very key in preventing the spread of germs. Now is the time to get a flu shot, get plenty of rest, and practice good health habits. We want you to stay healthy this year and season, so please be active in your own health.

October is also **National Breast Cancer Awareness Month**, organized by major charities to increase awareness of the disease and to raise funds for research, prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and cure. Both men and women are vulnerable to the disease. You can't change some risk factors, such as getting older or your family history, but you can help lower your risk of breast cancer by taking care of your health in the following ways:

- Keep a healthy weight.
- Exercise regularly (at least four hours a week).
- Research shows that lack of nighttime sleep can be a risk factor.
- Don't drink alcohol, or limit alcoholic drinks to no more than one per day.
- Avoid exposure to chemicals that can cause cancer (carcinogens) and chemicals that interfere with the normal function of the body.
- Limit exposure to radiation from medical imaging tests like X-rays, CT scans, and PET scans if not medically necessary.

Dear Church, Mission Center, Former Members, and Friends,

We want to inform you that as you drive past our building, you will notice the large oak tree is no longer there. After consultation with a highly qualified arborist, exploring trimming vs. removal, the Council (CLCEB) agreed with his

assessment of the danger of harm to people, local traffic, and the building. The tree was in serious "oak decline" due to age. Hollow branches due to canker, fungus, and wood borers were dying and breaking off in every storm.





We are grateful for its nearly 100 years of beauty and service to local birds, squirrels, and our neighbors as well as the church. It is our plan and hope to plant a new tree

elsewhere on the property to watch it grow and flourish in the future. The job went very smoothly, no injuries, with outstanding equipment and workers. We have taken down the brick bench around the stump this week, so that Miss Utility can mark the area; Green Vista will grind the stump to 6"

below ground and leave wood chips to slowly deteriorate. The Office has "in progress" photos if you wish to see



them. Before it was removed, our church walked outside and prayed a benediction of gratitude, blessing, and safety.
