## DESIGNING LIFESAVING RESCUE SITUATIONS...

## Why?

- ✓ To evaluate skills, knowledge, fitness and JUDGEMENT!
- ✓ To provide "life-like" situations in a safe setting
- ✓ To allow students to focus on real locations beyond a pool!

#### Effective situations:

- 1. <u>Must be appropriate for the level</u> e.g. Bronze Medallion should be using only injuries related to airway, breathing or circulation
- 2. <u>Information delivery must maximize candidate retention</u> this will increase the chances of success
  - √ 7+/-2 = short term memory can only hold this much information (i.e. 9 pieces on a good day, 5 on a bad day)
    - ...this means you need to provide VISUAL aids (e.g. memory treats a picture as one item!)
  - ✓ One only has 60 seconds to retain information in short-term memory
    - ...this means if you prolong your set-up, information will be forgotten before the rescue starts
  - ✓ After 60 seconds, FIRST IN = FIRST OUT
    - ...this means the first information given will be the first to be forgotten before the rescue starts

# USE SCENE PICTURES, SITUATION CARDS, REAL PROPS and PROPER ACTING by victims & bystanders BEFORE sit starts!
