TUESDAY 6 October, 1992 - 1200 Noon - Womens Auxillary

Hawaiian Pineapple Salad - One half Pineapple, filled with Oriental Chicken and Fruit Salad, served with Banana Nut Bread Finger Sandwiches, Desert, Coffee and Tea. The Ladies have a separate dining room from the men for their lunch on this day to allow them time and space, uninterupted, to enjoy their lunch and transact their club business. The Auxillary President had requested a lunch that would be served rather than a buffet. Cost \$12.00 per person.

TUESDAY 6 October, 1992 - 1200 Noon - Mens lunch

We have selected a Buffet to allow for a broader selection to be sure there was something to please everyone - Choice of three salads - (1) Ambrosia (2) Cottage Cheese (3) Cucumber and Onion, plus Tossed Greens with choice of two Dressings, Includes Fruit and Relish Trays, Two Entrees - (1) Beef Burgandy (2) Chicken Breast Parmasian, Herb Rice, Pasta Fetachini, and Ranch String Beans. Includes freshly baked Bread, Butter and choice of Dessert and Beverage. Cost - \$15.00.

WEDNESDAY 7 October, 1992 - 1900 - Dinner

The dinner will be preceded by a No Host cocktail hour from 1800 to 1900. Here again we have selected a Buffet, mainly because it will give us a broader selection, the lines will be quicker, a person can select all (or as little) as they want to eat and get it back to your table while it is still warm. A "served" meal was very limited on our choices and by the time the last person is served, the food is usually cold and the first persons served are finished eating and ready to go. The Buffet choices are:

Five Salads - (1) Pasta Italiano (2) Waldorf (3) Three Bean (4) Ham and Macaroni (5) Carrot Raisin, Three Entrees - (1) Roast Beef (2) Chicken Cordon Bleu (3) Shrimp Scampi, Oven Brown Potatoes, Rice Pilof, Green Beans. Includes Fruit Tray, Cheese Tray with Crackers, Choice of Dessert and Beverage. Cost - \$22.00 per person.

You are not limited to any one salad or entree. You may take some of each or load your dish and come back for seconds.

We have received several calls and letters inquiring about having a mini-reunion in Reno by ships or units that have several members or larger groups of members attending the CG Combat Veterans Reunion. This is one of the best ideas, and opportunities to do this. As you are probably aware, it is very difficult, if not impossible, to obtain reasonable accommodations and facilities for small groups to hold a reunion. Besides its a lot of work by a lot of people. We have purposely set up a fairly open schedule at this Convention to allow time for other things, such as reunions, or get togethers, of smaller groups. What we would like to have everyone do is use this as an opportunity to make a vacation out of the trip and enjoy every bit of your time. The only thing we would request, and appreciate, is that you do not schedule any of your other activities to conflict with the working schedule of the Association. The times that we have things scheduled is Tuesday 6 October at 1200 when we will have lunch for both the womens auxillary and the male members. This is the time we will use to transact the club business, elections, by-law changes and anything else that needs to be done. Please allow a good part of the afternoon for this. The next thing is the dinner starting at 1800 on Wednesday 7 October. In addition to a great meal we will have some very interesting guest speakers that I know everyone will enjoy. does leave a lot of free time to persue other interests. He can provide information on refreshments, food, make suggestions on space and if we don't have the answer to any of your questions, we will get them for you.

Some of the things that are available. The Coronation room on the mezzinine floor of the Sands Hotel will be used as our registration room. There will be a hosted bar from noon to 1800 on Sunday and Monday 4-5 October. This is a large double room and will also be set up with a group of empty tables that will be used to display memorabilia and souvenirs by the members. We encourage all attendees to bring what ever items they can to put in this display room. The room will have some one in attendance at all times and will be locked at night to ensure security of these items.

The National Automobile Museum. This was the Harrah Auto Museum that used to be located out in Sparks. It is now located right in Reno at 10 Lake Street South, about six blocks from the Sands. This museum is world famous and has over 200 perfectly restored antique automobiles on display. This is 105,000 square feet of floor area on one floor. They also have a state of the art theater showing full size auto dioramas depicting the impact the auto has had on our life and times. In fact, there is local tour of Reno available at the Hotel that ends up at the Auto Museum and the entry price is included in the tour. Would be worth looking into.

At the time of registration we will have brochures on what shows and entertainers will be playing in Reno during your visit. It is to soon to have this information now but we have recieved information from Bally's Reno about their ongoing comedy entertainment. Their show is called "Catch a Rising Star" and shows nightly, except Monday at 2030. (Thats 8:30 PM for you that have forgotten) Bally's is located a couple of miles from down town but they provide free shuttle bus service plus plenty of free parking. Their shows star some of todays best stand up comedians.

Information received in the Reno/Tahoe Visitors Guide state that they have over 300 days sunshine per year with average daily temperature during early October being in the 70's with cool nights. Last year it was in the high 80's in October. Beautiful. Some of the things they have listed for visitors are Ballooning, Bicycling, Boating, Fishing in numerous rivers, streams and lakes for trout and catfish. Non resident fishing permits are available. Of course there are at least 10 golf courses within a short distrance of the Hotel and the Hotel will even get you a Tee time. They also list Hiking, Mountain Biking, Horseback Riding, Hot Springs, Rafting, Soaring, Tennis and Windsurfing. There are numerous Showrooms and Lounges with fantastic entertainment plus a great many Art Galleries and other Arts and Cultural events, such as Ballet and the Opera. Two items of interest that will be on 5-11 October are the Reno Western Open Cutting Event at the Reno Livestock Events Center and the 11th Annual Great Italian Festival in Downtown Another interesting item is the Fleischmann Planetarium on the University Campus. They also have the Reno Tahoe Gaming Academy to allow you to learn the rules and strategies of the games of craps, roulette, "21" and Keno plus a look "behind the scenes" of casino operations. Don't overlook a ride on the sternwheeler M. S. Dixie on Lake Tahoe plus a look at the Ponderosa Ranch, scene of the filming of the Bonanza TV series and beautiful Incline Village. You can't miss the wooden sidewalks and restored buildings of Virginia City. The city was established in 1859 and became the richest mining town in the world. Return to Reno via the Capital of Nevada, Carson City. A truly beautiful town with lots of interesting sites including the Governors Mansion, Nevada State Railroad Museum, the Brewery Arts Center and the Stewart Indean Museum. There are about a dozen recommended one day self guided tours or quite a few commercial tours available. Information on all of these is available right at the Hotel. comes to eating, you could leave Reno weighing twice what you arrived at with very little effort. The Sands has six eating establishments serving everything from sandwiches to full deluxe meals. In Reno there is just about anything to eat you would dream of, including Basque, Chinese, Continental, European, French, Italian, Japanese, Mexican, Seafood and Steak Houses. Most Hotels run "loss leader" meals that can run from \$1.00 breakfasts to \$3.00 or \$4.00 steak dinners. You usually have to wait a short time for seating but that gives you time to wonder through the bar or the casino and drop a few bucks.

If there is anything specific that you would like information on, contact Vince and he will get you what you want to know. The whole point is, we want everyone to have a most memorable time and take home good memories of a great runion and look forward to the next one, wherever it might be.

THE OLD TIMERS OF THE CGCVA



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
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
