SCHOOLHOUSE AT CEDAR HILL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AT THE MUSEUM

Under the leadership of Peter McGinty and members of the Town Highway Department, the Museum and its associated facilities have been improved and upgraded to ensure that the membership and our guests can fully appreciate the beauty of "the old red school house".

I would like to enumerate a number of capital improvements that have occurred over the last few years as a way to thank Peter, Ann and the Town for all the efforts that have been expended to keep our Museum in top running order. As a place to start, one quickly notices how comfortable the interior of the Museum is during our cold winter days and that is based on the installation of a new furnace and thermostat system designed to meet the needs of our membership. Other improvements include a new front door; a completely repainted interior of the entire facility, and the painting of the exteriors of the cellar doors, Toll Gate House and Carriage House and handicap ramp; a new sewer system for the facility; the installation of a speaker system for better communications within the Museum, a new dehumidifier in the basement to help protect our materials; a new gutter system to protect the handicap ramp; new shrubs at the left side of the Museum to balance the older shrubs on the right side; the siting of a park bench on the west side of the Museum; and the restringing of the rope to ring the old school bell.

While other improvements will be addressed in the future, we will always remember all the work that Jim Wiedemann, Henry Meyer, John Scharff and others performed in the past to convert the old school into the wonderful facility we enjoy today. I offer that Peter and his staff are committed to ensure that this treasure will continue to be carefully managed and will be preserved for history.

GENEAOLOGY CORNER By Art Young, Committee Chairman

Last Fall, President Ann appointed me as your Geneaology Chairman. We agreed that I would present a short report at each of our regular membership meetings. At our meeting last September, I presented my first report, "G-=1" and provided copies to the membership. This report was followed up by "G-2" in October and G-3 at our November meeting also with copies for our members attending the meetings. These reports provided some suggested methods of tracking your ancestors and also included some forms, websites information, and computer software programs that could be of aid in your research.

Whereas, I am not a certified geneaologist, I have had some success in tracing ancestors back to the 1620 Mayflower and beyond. This has been accomplished by establishing direct bloodline connections using vital records such as: birth, death, marriage, church, cemetery, military, naturalization and census records. Also, information was obtained from, published family histories, wills, guardianship and probate court and land records.

It is my intention to continue the "G: series reports that we started last September, in which I hope to guide you through at least part of the methods used to locate ancestor information in some, if not all, of the record resources listed above. "G-4" is being prepared for our January meeting and will cover or start to cover the use of census records. Because census records are such a large and important resource, this subject may continue into my February report.

However, this type of, "do it yourself", research can take up a great deal of time, even though it does create a great deal of

self-satisfaction when you find that next grandparent or great grandparent in your line of descent. Always keep in mind however, that if you do not have the time or do not wish to take the time to do the geneaologist's who will do the work for you, even though that does take some of the fun out of your project. Marie Hoffman, President of the Capital District Genealogy Society would, I am sure, be happy to provide such information, (283-4793), and our New York State Library right here in downtown Albany, on Madison Av e., also maintain a list of such professionals.

A few copies of my first three reports, "G-1 to G-3, are made available at our regular membership meeting, if you have such interest or copies may be obtained from our Secretary Wendy Brandow, as they have been made a part of the meeting minutes. Good luck with your research and hope to see you all at our next meeting.
