“Look at the world today.
Is there anything more pitiful?
But when has the world known any other time?
What madness there is. What blindness.
What unintelligible leadership.
A furiously racing mass of bewildered
humanity, strengthening,
not in wisdom, but in vulgar passions,

motivated by greed and propelled into cruelty.
The time must come when evil will destroy itself.
I will not live to see that day.
But you might, my child and that is why you have
been brought to Shangri-La.

For when the day comes that the world begins
to look for new life,
It is our belief that they will find their reservoir
of hope here.
So here we shall stay,
With our books and our music and our
meditation.
Here we shall be to guide the footsteps of a
weary people.
Here we shall be with our way of life based on
one simple rule--be kind!
And it is our hope that Shangri-La's communal
love will then spread throughout the world.
And when the strong have devoured each other,
then, at last,
The meek shall inherit the earth!”

These words come from a musical version of the movie *Lost Horizon* made in 1973. It speaks of a community that made the decision to be something contrary to the prevailing culture. Shangri-La is a mythical place but in the late 4th century, when the world was in chaos, when barbarians seemed to be at every gate, when violence was more common than civility, when the church ineffective and corrupt, a simple monk began an order that changed the landscape of the western world, elevated human relationships and created an ethos that made life bearable. This monk's name was Benedict and he achieved notoriety, esteem and eventually sainthood because he sought none of those things but instead created a simple rule which was meant to be used by small groups of people as guiding principles.

Benedict understood human behavior and knew we are not likely to keep our best intentions for very long. In the communities he started, he told the members, each day we begin again. We will do well, we will fail, we start afresh. Together we will make each other better. The Rule of St. Benedict are guidelines for happiness and holiness, it is meant to help us create a balanced life of prayer and work where we become the version God created us to be. Within the Rule are practices for creating community where we accept people as they are, where we learn to see Christ in each person. There are also practices for hospitality and stability, stewardship of the things we bring into our lives, moderation and flexibility.

In 2019, members of the vestry, staff and congregation will be invited into a study of Benedictine Spirituality with an eye to becoming that small group effectively living the way of Christ, serving as a place, a model where others may find their reservoir of hope.



CONFIRMATION

con-fir-ma-tion - /känfər' māSH(ə)n/

noun - the rite at which a baptized person, especially one baptized as an infant, affirms Christian belief and is admitted as a full member of the church. This is the Merriam-Webster definition of confirmation. Our prayer book words it this way: "Confirmation is the rite in which we express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop." Three distinct things are expressed here. There is mature commitment, reception of power by the Holy Spirit, and the laying on of hands by a bishop. These three expressions for the Episcopal Church are what make confirmation special. At St. Mark's our main duty in this rite is preparation. We are designated to figure out a time when our people have been duly prepared to take ownership of their faith. In previous generations this time was dictated by a certain age. Today, this is a much harder thing to distinguish. Children deal with deep issues at a much earlier age than ever before, but pre-teens and

teenagers are actually maturing slower than in previous generations. This makes setting an age for confirmation difficult. The one thing however we can be assured of is where preparation for confirmation begins. It starts in the home and in the church. Beginning at age 4 we offer Christian Education. The purpose of this is not to babysit our youngest members. It is the preparation for the day of their confirmation. When our children are not here, they are not being prepared. In recent weeks our older children were given the chance to get hands on with baptism. When asked to create what baptism meant to them, these were some of the things this class created. Bishop Sam will be at St. Mark's on Feb. 17. From now until then see if you can remember your confirmation. What stands out in your mind? How have your ideas of confirmation changed over the years? What about baptism? What does baptism mean to you today? What do you like most when you participate in a baptismal service? What do you think the church is celebrating in baptism? All of these are important questions to consider as Bishop Sam makes his first visit to St. Mark's.


