PASTOR'S CORNER

You, my brothers and sisters, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh; rather, serve one another humbly in love. For the entire law is fulfilled in keeping this one command: "Love your neighbor as yourself." If you bite and devour each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other. So I say, walk by the Spirit...But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Galatians 5:13-16a, 22-23

July is a month for freedom! It is the month, after all, that begins with Independence Day, the celebration of the freedom we achieved in severing the colonial power of Great Britain in 1776. It is also the month that lies at the heart of the summer, in our culture a time of freedom. School's out, and many families take advantage of that academic freedom to have some vacation freedom, as well.

We love freedom, not just as Americans, but even more as Christians. The root of the Gospel is freedom – freedom from the power of sin, freedom from the power of death, freedom from hopeless despair. We revel in the ways the Good News of Jesus throws off the chains of oppression and rejoice in the freedom of salvation that we receive from Christ's death and resurrection. Freedom is an amazing centerpiece of Christian faith.

It is not, however, freedom to do whatever we want. The Bible doesn't say that, and neither did Jesus. Instead, as Paul highlights here in Galatians 5, our freedom is an empowerment of us to be more faithful. "Do not use your freedom to include the flesh," he says; instead, use your freedom to serve one another and love one another. This is not a freedom from responsibility, but a freedom to responsibility.

What does that responsibility look like? It looks like a life that is marked by certain things, fruit of the nourishing Spirit of God inside us. Love. Joy. Peace. Forbearance (patience). Kindness. Goodness. Faithfulness. Gentleness. Self-control. These are the things that the love of Christ causes to take root in us. These are the things that the freedom of Christ calls us to nurture. And these are the things we are invited to offer as our part of the work of our Heavenly Father – a life that embodies these characteristics.

My prayer is that, for each of us and for our church, this will be a summer of freedom – and one filled to overflowing with the bountiful harvest of the fruit of the Spirit.


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FROM THE DEACONS

"I've always thought there's a light at the end of the tunnel but thankfully now it's not from a train. You all have changed my life completely and I'm so thankful and love every one of you for everything you've done for my family." JB

Three years ago, an abused woman came to us seeking help with broken dentures from a prior assault by her spouse. She can't return to her home in another state for fear of being physically abused and hospitalized again. She keeps in contact with us. It is a reminder of the important work of Good Neighbor. She states:

"You are the only friends I have in Appomattox." DH

Ten years ago, the idea of a resource center in the community was conceived in a Huddle group in response to the questions: "What is God saying to us? And what are we going to do about it?" Since 2011, Good Neighbor has become a "go to" place for those seeking assistance in the ways we first thought it might be. Through the years, God has guided us in Christian service to respond in ways no one could have imagined. Good Neighbor is a mission of Grace Hills Baptist Church as it extends Christian love to others who are our church family, our friends, our neighbors, and who were once strangers.
