A Report on Recent and Fossil Molluscan Taxa named for Past and Present Members of the Sarasota Shell Club

This report was compiled by Sarasota Shell Club member Robert Morrison. He received valuable assistance from past and present SSC members Peggy Williams, June Bailey, Lynn Gaulin, Marilyn Barkley, Jay Tripp and Dennis Sargent; from Dr. Edward Petuch, Professor of Geology, Florida Atlantic University; and Dr. Emilio Garcia, emeritus professor, Southwestern Louisiana University.

It is dedicated to the memories of Charlie and Vi Hertweck, inspired conchologists, collectors and good friends; to the Sarasota Shell Club's other "inspired amateurs", some of whom are no longer with us, for their role in advancing our knowledge of the molluscan realm, past and present.; and to Dr. Edward J. Petuch, for his superb field work and tireless pursuit of Florida's geological history for nearly 40 years as told through its fossil mollusk deposits.

A group of "inspired amateurs"

Since 1977, 59 Recent and fossil mollusks have been named for past and present members of the Sarasota Shell Club. Dr. Edward J. Petuch refers to the non-professionals who provide so much of the forward impetus to our knowledge of the molluscan world as "inspired amateurs".

Petuch, a professor in the Geosciences Department at Florida Atlantic University, has described more than 1,200 Recent and fossil taxa (some with Dennis Sargent or Mardie Drolshagen as co-author), has written 12 books and more than 150 scientific papers.

The taxa named for them is comprised of 48 fossils, 10 Recent marine species or subspecies and one Recent terrestrial subspecies. It does not include three additional fossil species, named for Ron Bopp, Robert and Jo Morrison, to be published in future volumes of Dr. Edward Petuch's *Compendium of Florida Fossil Shells*; one Recent Olividae, named for Rebecca Sargent, to be published in a future issue of *Visaya*; and a land snail to be named for Peggy Williams, publication details uncertain.

Of the number already published, more than half are Florida fossil taxa described by Petuch (some with Mardie Drolshagen or Dennis Sargent as junior author), showing the importance of the collaboration that existed between Petuch and members of the Sarasota Shell Club from 1980 to 1993.

A chance meeting

If there is a single event that influenced this fruitful union of a professional paleogeologist and "inspired amateurs" it is a chance meeting in 1976. That was the year that Petuch, who had just received his M.S. degree from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, was accepted into the Ph. D program at the University of Miami's Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Sciences.

And it was the year he met Charlie and Violet Hertweck of the Sarasota Shell Club at the Broward Shell Show in Ft. Lauderdale. That summer he visited the Hertwecks in Sarasota. They invited him on a "Sunday Field Trip" to what was then called the New Burn Shell Mine in north Sarasota county.

In Petuch's words; "I was blown away by the diversity and preservation of the fossils and started to do more research on them. It turned out that most were not even named, so that focused my interest in the direction of paleontology."

Petuch and the Hertwecks became close, one could even say familial, friends. Charlie died in 1987, Violet in 1991. They bequeathed their massive collection of Florida fossil shells to Petuch. "They were some of the rarest and finest specimens I'd seen", Petuch said. Many were described and pictured in his 1994 *Atlas of Florida Fossil Shells*.

At a Sarasota Shell Show in the late 1970s, Petuch met collector and SSC member Dennis Sargent. They hit it off immediately and ultimately formed a research and writing team. Their first major project was the *Atlas of Olive Shells of the World*, published in 1986.

Petuch earned his Ph.D in 1980. His doctoral dissertation was on the discovery of a relict population of Caribbean mollusks thought to have been extinct since the Miocene. That same year, he began his post-doctoral studies at the University of Maryland while working as a research associate at the U.S. Museum of Natural History of the Smithsonian Institution.

Petuch's Study of the N. Sarasota Pits

Petuch made many trips in 1980-82 to study the New Burn pit, known by then as the Warren Bros. pit, later as the MacAsphalt Pit, finally as the Ashland Petroleum and Asphalt Company (or APAC) pit. During his visits to Sarasota, he often was Dennis Sargent's house guest.. He wrote a paper on the APAC pit in 1982, which was published in the *Proceedings of the Academy of Natural Sciences*, Vol. 134.


He built on this work with two of his books: *Cenozoic Seas: The View from Eastern North America* (2004), and *The Geology of the Everglades and Adjacent Areas* (2007), plus numerous papers.

He was often joined in his explorations of the N. Sarasota shell pits by the Hertwecks, Dale and Pat Stream, Marilyn Barkley, Meta Jones, Jay Tripp, Evelyn Bradley and Thomas Ketter. This close association with the Sarasota Shell Club led to his becoming an honorary member of the club for several

years in the 1980s. Dale Stream is the only member of the original "Sarasota Fossil Gang" still actively involved in collecting fossils.

In 2011, in collaboration with photographer Mardie Drolshagen, he began his most ambitious undertaking with the publication of the first of six volumes of *The Compendium of Florida Fossil Shells*.

According to Petuch's 1982 paper, digging of the APAC pit was started in 1970 in N. Sarasota County, near the intersection of today's I-75 and University Parkway. Much of the Interstate Highway system in Florida is underlain with matrix from the APAC pit. Unlike most such surface-mine pits that fill rapidly with ground water, this pit was kept dry by an elaborate pumping system.

Several authors have cited the APAC pit as the single most important source of information about Florida's fossil mollusk history.

Eventually the APAC pit grew to be more than a half-mile long, nearly a third of a mile wide and some 60 feet deep. It was closed in 1993 and was allowed to flood. It was later deeded to Sarasota County. The lake formed by the flooded pits was incorporated into the county's Cooper Creek Park.

In November 2007, Sarasota County renamed it Nathan Benderson Park, in honor of the developer who poured \$1 million into improving it as part of the work done on his neighboring Town Center development.

The lake was the site of the Florida Intercollegiate Rowing Association's 30-event championships on March 11, 2009 and numerous rowing competitions since. Plans have been approved by Sarasota county and \$20 million has been allocated to develop it into an international rowing venue.

Dr. Norman Weisbord, at that time a professor of geology at Florida State University, published the first measured section of the APAC pit in 1972, but the pit was expanded greatly in both depth and breadth after his report was published.

Many of the fossil species named for SSC members were first found in the APAC pits and in most cases, their holotypes

were collected by the members for whom they were named. Many are in the collection of the Florida Museum of Natural History in Gainesville.

In his 1980 paper, Petuch identified stratigraphic units ranging in age from the Lower Pliocene, bordering the Upper Miocene, to the Lower Pleistocene, covering a span of roughly 4.5 million years. From top to bottom these units started with a top layer of superficial sand resembling the Plio-Pleistocene Caloosahatchee Formation. It is underlain by the Fruitville Member of the Tamiami Formation, primarily consisting of oyster beds.

Under that is the ultra fossil-rich Pinecrest Member of the Tamiami formation, which existed during the warmest, most tropical period of the Pliocene. Petuch estimates that it contained at least 600 species of mollusks, many new to science. That number could reach as high as 1,000 once the microfauna is studied.

The Pinecrest Member is underlain by the Buckingham Member of the Tamiami Formation, which includes another 400-plus species of mollusks. At the bottom was the Sarasota Member of the Murdock Station Formation, made up largely of clays and sandy limestone, reaching back to the Miocene-Pliocene boundary.

Other important Fossil Sites

Just across I-75, north of the old APAC pit, is a series of small lakes stretching east almost to Fruitville Road. These mark the location of the Quality Aggregates Pits, another valuable source of Pliocene fossil shells explored by Petuch.

These pits were closed to general collecting, but Petuch was able to make special arrangements with their owner, Hugh Cannon, to collect in them. He named several fossil species for Cannon.

The only active shell pit still active in the area, now operated by SMR Aggregates, was one of the original Quality Aggregates pits. After the ownership of this pits changed hands, Petuch was no longer allowed to collect there.

With access to the SMR pit closed and the old APAC pit under water, Petuch turned his attention to numerous smaller but important fossil digs ranging from north Palm Beach county and including the canal system that fed metro Miami-Dade County, around Lake Ocheechee and up the Kissimmee River. Dozens of important finds, many quite different than specimens collected in the north Sarasota pits, came from these locations.

About the “Inspired Amateurs”

The collection of **Ernest and Evelyn Bradley**, comprising more than 3,000 lots, was donated to the Florida Museum of Natural History. The Bradleys not only collected in SW Florida, but in other areas of the United States and in France and Germany.

An estimate of the total number of fossil specimens in the Florida Museum of Natural History collection is about 5.3 million—ED

Evelyn Bradley was among the first members of the Sarasota Shell Club to collect extensively and document her finds from the N. Sarasota pits in the early 1970s. In 1989, the Bradleys posthumously received the Howard H. Convers Award, given annually by the Florida State Museum of Natural History to recognize outstanding fossil collecting in Florida.

A Clevelander, **Dennis Sargent** started his career as a firefighter in an engine company of the Sarasota Fire Department.

He became the department’s chief training officer, headed up its SCUBA rescue unit, was instrumental in establishing Sarasota’s EMR system and was later a battalion chief in charge of the downtown Sarasota station. He was a Sarasota Shell Club member in the 1970s and 80s and rejoined the club in 2010.

After leaving Sarasota he served as fire chief of Winter Haven, FL., Myrtle Beach, S.C., and Salt Lake City and recently retired as fire chief of Leesburg, FL. Over the past 40 years he has assembled one of the most complete collections of Oliva in the world.

He is researching guidebooks on the Harpidae and Strombidae. In collaboration with Luigi Bozzetti of Italy, in July 2011 he published the description of a new strombus, *Euprotamos kiwi*, endemic to the Kermadec Islands of New Zealand. He recently traveled to New Zealand and Russia with his wife, Rebecca, who is also a SCC member

With Ed Petuch, he co-authored *Rare and Unusual Shells of the Florida Keys and Adjacent Areas*, which was published in 2011. In it they describe seven new taxa, including one named for SSC member Bob Morrison. They have several other active research/writing projects in the works, including a complete revision of their 1986 work on Olive shells. Both are also pursuing individual research projects.


From 1973 to 1985, **Jay J. Tripp** served the Carnegie Museum of Natural History in Pittsburgh as a volunteer, laboratory assistant, curatorial assistant and research associate. She contributed many specimens to the museum's collection and was the author of numerous papers on both fossil and recent species of mollusks.

She was active in the Sarasota Shell Club from the mid-1980s through the 1990s and was also a member of the Sanibel-Captiva Shell Club and the Conchologists of America. She not only had four fossil taxa named for her, but was the sole author of *Busycon* [now *Busycotypus*—ED] *bicoronatum* and the co-author, with Juan Parodiz, Curator of Invertebrates at the Carnegie Museum, of *Calliostoma jayae*, *Cassis ketteri*, and *Siphocypraea trippeana*. Retired, she lives in Bradenton, FL. *Calliostoma jayae*, described in 1977, was the first taxa to be named for a SSC member.

Charlie and Violet Hertweck moved to Venice, FL., in the mid-1970s following Charlie's retirement from the U.S. Postal Service in St. Louis. Vi and Charlie had been members of the St. Louis Shell Club and were known for their award-winning Pectenidae collection. Both were past presidents of the Sarasota Shell Club. Charlie died in 1987, Vi in 1991.

Following her death, the club established the Hertweck Award. It has been presented to the winning entry in the fossil category at each Sarasota Shell Show since then.

Dale Stream continues to hunt fossils in Florida as he has for more than 30 years. He once estimated that he has some 40,000 specimens but even he isn't sure of the exact total. He is a repeat winner of the Hertweck Award.


Over more than two decades, **Bill Clendenin** built a massive world-wide assemblage of mollusks, mostly self-collected. His partner on many of his collecting trips was Dr. Emilio Garcia, authority on Caribbean shells, from the University of Southwestern Louisiana. His primary collection was bequeathed to the South Florida Museum. Thanks to the many hours devoted to its curation by SSC member Lynn Gaulin, it is now housed in a separate room at that institution where it is available for study.

Peggy Williams is that rarity, a native Floridian who lives less than a half-mile from where she grew up. She has been a member of the Sarasota Shell Club since 1973 and has held every one of the club's elective offices. She won her first blue ribbon at the club's show the following year.

She also maintains the club's library and is known for her professionally-conducted shelling tours to U.S. and foreign locations. She has written a book on the Turridae of Florida and the Caribbean.

Before moving to Florida in 1971, **Robert Morrison** was a co-founder of the Cleveland Shell Club. He and his wife, Jo, operated a world-wide specimen sea shell business in Sarasota from 1971 to 1982.

He was a frequent contributor to the *Hawaiian Shell News*, was consulted in the development of the HMS Shell-Grading Standards and was on the judges' panel for the Jacksonville, Central Florida, St. Petersburg, Cleveland, Miami, Palm Beach and Sarasota shell shows during the 1973-1980 period.

Long-time St. Petersburg Beach shell dealer Bob Lipe is quoted as follows in the Conchologists of America's *ListServe* (maintained by the University of Georgia): "*Cymatium rader* is named after my best friend, **Jack Rader** who passed away several years ago. He brought this new shell to my attention and we bought as many as we could to compare a growth series with *Cymatium femorale*. He was persistent that this shell would be named."

"The first ones came out of Honduras, but later the really large ones were found to be living in Brazil. We couldn't believe that such a large shell could escape detection for so many years, but it did." In recent years, specimens have been collected as far north as Miami's Biscayne Bay.

Gary Macintosh and his wife left Sarasota, bought a sailboat and spent years cruising the Caribbean. Gary did a lot of night-diving. Knowing of Peggy Williams' interest in turrids, he sent all the unidentified specimens of that group to Peggy. Phil Fallon, a dedicated researcher into the Turridae, named one for Gary.

[*Fenimorea mackintoshi* Fallon, P.J., 2016—ED].



Petuch calls **Marilyn Barkley** “a sweet lady.” He tells of a time when he and his wife, Linda, were staying with the Hertwecks and “Marilyn came over to visit and brought a few rare shells for my research. (Our son) Brian was only 2-or 3-years-old at the time and ran right over and gave her a hug. She was really touched by his outpouring of love. I think Brian sensed something wonderful in her and responded with the honesty of a child.” Marilyn, a former school teacher, had retired to Longboat Key but maintained her membership in the SSC until 2010.

An Explosion of Cowries

There are several ways to measure the significance of the work that Petuch and his “inspired amateurs” did over the past three decades. Petuch has made many notable contributions to the paleogeological history of Florida through his many books and papers, many of which include contributions from Sarasota Shell Club Members.

Perhaps this example will serve to show how Petuch and the SSC group added to our knowledge of Florida's fossil history.

In 1980, when Petuch began his study of the APAC pit, only eight species of fossil cowries had been found in south Florida. The first to be described, *Akleistostoma carolinensis* (Conrad, 1841), originally from the Duplin Formation in N. Carolina, it was later found in the lower layers of the Tamiami Formation in Florida.

Perhaps the best known of the early Florida fossil cowries is *Siphocypraea problematica*, described in 1886 by Angelo Heilprin from Caloosahatchee River deposits. Later, pairs of

cowries were described by Dr. Axel Olsson and Richard Petit, W.M. Ingram and pioneering American malacologist Henry Pilsbry.

In 1994, when Petuch published his *Atlas*, he listed and illustrated 19 new fossil cowries that had been discovered by him and his “inspired amateurs”.

Fast forward to 2011 and the publication of Vol. 1 of the *Compendium*, in which no less than 105 fossil cowries are listed and pictured.

Of that number, 50 had previously been described (most in other Petuch publications) and 55 were new taxa in the *Compendium*. Fifteen were by other authors. Petuch named fossil cowrie taxa for both Hertwecks, Thomas Ketter, Meta Jones, Dale Stream, Jay Tripp and Marilyn Barkley.

Keewaydin Island - Tuesday, January 4, 2022

Keewaydin, accessible only by boat, has become Sarasota Shell Club's premier destination. We have had incredible luck finding pear whelks, paper figs, true tulips, all manner of cockles and even the elusive golden olives and junonia shells. This trip is definitely not to be missed!

Carefree Learner Trip - Friday, January 21, 2022 8:00 am

Cayo Costa State Park - Tuesday, February 1, 2022

Cayo Costa is an excellent beach-combing location accessible by boat out of Bokeelia. Baby ears, golden olives, and many other species may be found here. It is also great for sand dollars. There is the opportunity to snorkel on the bay side. The more intrepid sheller may rent a cabin or tent site on January 31 for the early morning negative tide on February 1. Calusa shell middens may be viewed both in Bokeelia and on Cayo Costa.

Carefree Learner Trip - Tuesday, February 1, 2022 7:00 am

Peanut Island - Sunday, March 20, 2022

Peanut Island is a unique location on Florida's Atlantic Coast. The island is operated as a city park by Palm Beach and is accessible by ferry. Many species found here are uncommon on the Gulf Coast, or anywhere else in Florida for that matter, including Caribbean Fighting Conchs, Partridge Tuns, and Distorsios. Wading and snorkeling increase your chances of locating rare finds. The negative tide is at 4:33 pm, so you may want to bring your tent and reserve a camping spot, allowing you to take advantage of the 5:05 am negative tide on Monday. Don't miss the nearby Flagler Museum if you have the chance.

Fossil Trip - Silent Auction at the Schmelz's

In leu of a fossil pit exploration this trip offers a chance to acquire choice fossil specimens from the collection of paleontologist, Gary Schmelz (Naples, FL). We will meet at a predetermined place and move onto Gary's home where the silent auction will be held. After that we will have chance to move on to the new Marco Island Museum and then for a neat lunch at the Little Bar restaurant in Goodland. There is no cost to the trip (except the fuel). 

IF YOU'RE ON A SHELLING TOUR

Water, snack, bag or a bucket for shells, water shoes, hand rake, bug spray, water, snacks, towel, sunblock, polarized glasses, rain gear (mainly during rainy months of June-October just in case), small soft coolers (no large coolers) etc.. While we do provide waters it is strongly suggested guests bring water, preferably 2-3 bottles per person and a small snack. If you are leaving the boat on a shelling excursion 1-2 bottles must be carried with the person while walking to help prevent any type of lightheadedness, dizziness or nausea symptoms which can occur with the onset of a heatstroke.

Results of a Diving Trip

Doug Thompson

I have been asked from time to time to submit an article for publication in the club newsletters. Well, I thought this might be a good time to do it. I have attached three photos of the shells I found while diving last week in the Gulf of Mexico south of Panama City and Destin.

Photo #1 shows two dark deer cowries, two different colored true tulips, pink spiny oyster, two Atlantic yellow cowries, a Texas longhorn, and my favorite shell of this area, a Triton Trumpet, and a chestnut turban.

Photo #2 shows six lion's paws, six spiny oysters and two light-colored deer cowries. Photo #3 shows a pink spiny oyster, elongated deer cowry, gorgeous frog shell, two hairy tritons, gold mouthed triton, four tiny spiny oysters nickel size and a yellow tiny rough scallop.

I chose these photos because they show the diversity of live specimens that can be found along with the extremely high quality of the shells living in this area. The areas I was diving

moray eels who will actually come out of their holes when a diver is present. Barracuda, red snapper, black snapper, gag grouper, scamp, flounder, and amberjack are just a few of the fish species usually present when we dive.

I am keeping my fingers crossed this area remains as beautiful as it is for some time to come. I hope the cause of the red tide is identified, located, and eradicated. I will keep you all updated on the conditions here. We are just about to call it a season and wait until Spring to start again.

ranged from 80 - 110' deep and consisted of natural reefs, artificial reefs, and wrecks. The marine life on these spots was thick and thriving. The only negative is the amount of sharks in the area. We see from one to as many as five on a dive. You do have to be careful and wary as they sometimes become aggressive. The bottom around these spots is sand and exceptionally clean. No indications of any red tide effect, although small pockets of it still remain up here.

We have also seen manta rays, eagle rays, lots of dolphins, numerous species of jellyfish and turtles. A couple of spots are covered with






