Meeting Report

The August meeting was a "movie night". We watched a movie titled "Those Who Came Before" which is a companion video to a book "Those Who Came Before" by Robert H. Lister and Florence C. Lister.

"The American Southwest has a human history that goes back at least 13,000 years. The people who lived in this arid and diverse landscape long ago left behind incredible architecture, waterworks, ands finely crafted tools and art. Over centuries, explorers, ranchers, and scholars uncovered many of these traces of southwest prehistory.

"Those Who Came Before" introduces the prehistory of the Southwest from an archaeological perspective and takes the reader on a journey chronicling the stories of discovery, excavation, and research at sites that were inhabited long ago and are now preserved ata many of the southwest national parks and monuments. Complete with maps, timelines, and intriguing historical and contemporary photographs, this synthesis of southwest archaeology offers vignettes of those who came before, and the material and cultural characteristics that both unite them and make them unique.

The enclosed DVD will transport you to some of those places. Filmed on location at National Park Service sites, the companion film illustrates what life was like long ago in the Southwest through photographs, interviews, and trips into the field with park rangers, researchers, and archaeologists."
