## Special Thanks

Special thanks this month go to Susie and Mark Nilsson.

Susie and Mark gave the presentation at the August meeting on "The Rock Art of British Columbia". Specifically the site they visited was called Gabriola Island or the "Petroglyph Island". This is located off Vancouver Island in Southwest British Columbia.

To say the petroglyphs are unique is an understatement. These petroglyphs are unlike anything that is seen in the southwest. The rock art was carved into horizontal sandstone near the center of the island; however some were caved into stone that lay in the tidal plane off the island. The following are photos of some of the glyphs.





The photos were made of "reproductions" of the real glyphs. This was done as a preservation attempt by the provincial government. The real glyphs are badly eroded due to the weather and climate of the location.

Susie was also honored to be chosen to attend a course for teachers titled" Project Archaeology, Investigating Shelter". It was held at the Montana State University Campus, and sponsored by the Utah Museum of Natural History, and the Smithsonian Institution. The students were given activities to practice the basics of scientific inquiry (Observation, inference, evidence, and classification) using authentic archaeological data. They tried to learn how to think like an Archaeologist. They applied archaeological concepts as they investigated a shelter using primary data sources such as maps, artifact illustrations, historic photos, oral histories. They did a virtual dig right in the classroom, and used the evidence to come to some conclusions about the site.

The students also went on field trips in the evenings. The one most interesting was to the Madison Buffalo Jump State Park. The Archaeological evidence shows over 12 feet deep of buffalo bones at the bottom of the cliff. Archaeologists think this site was used for slaughter for thousands of years.

Project Archaeology is available on- line for teacher professional development. It is a good hands-on activity course that should appeal to educators. Susie was happy to be able to attend and learn what was available to teachers who would like to insert archaeology into their curriculum.

Susie should be congratulated for being on the front lines in our education process. By teaching our youth about the importance of archaeology were will insure the preservation of archaeological sites into the future.
