Back indoors on the north wall of the Rector's vestry we can clearly see the lancet window and its original stone window sill.





The window in the oratory is to be taken out this week, and restored with we iron bars to replace the rusting bars at present in place. The window will then be repointed and the walls cleaned and restored. It will look attractive.



The work of dismantling the brickwork and plaster covering inside the Rector's vestry was completed on Monday . This is the Birdseye view! No birds will be permitted to enter in future however! The lancet window is to be glazed in and protected from the outside!

Meanwhile the work continues and Paul is constantly working on new blocks of sandstone. Here vou see an enormous block of stone (about 3/4 hundred weight) which lies on top of

the Oratory wall and serves as a springer course at the start of the Oratory's unusual stone roof. The block next to it is also very large! They will soon be worked to an angle to follow the stones above them and already in place.


